There are some important matters which should have the earnest consideration of our ctitizens; action should be tak- <br> ${ }^{\text {First, }}$, sudan's hog and chicken ordinance has been suspend- ed for the remainder of 1933 . This is a serious error. and the commission should be consultcommission should be consult- ed and asked to reestablish the ordinance and place same in force and see that it is obeyed Second, there is the question of occupation tax, which we understand has never been en- forced. We are of the opinion that the occupation tax should be paid. (It is an Ordinald be paid. (It is an Ordinance and according to law should be collected.) We cannot see where the business men have a right to say whether this tax be patd to say whether this tax be pald or not. as it is up to the city officers to collect occupation officers to collet occupation taxes. This tax if collected would work two wiuld work two folds good; first, it would protect the merchants from street peddlers and auctioneers; second it would go a long way toward improving our streets our streets.
