C. - There is yet to be appropriated approx-inately \$10 billion to complete the Budget for the fiscal year 1959 This time last year, when economy was popular, the Congress had cut approximately \$4 1/2 billion from the President's request. Thus far this year, the Congress has even upped the Fresident's request, and very likely there will be other increases before the session ends.

These increases are made in the face of declining income, and wen if no tax reductions are made, there is good prospect of ending up with a deficit of \$8 to \$10 billion. Any deficit, of course, entributes to more inflation. Even when the congress cuts appropriations to the various de-
