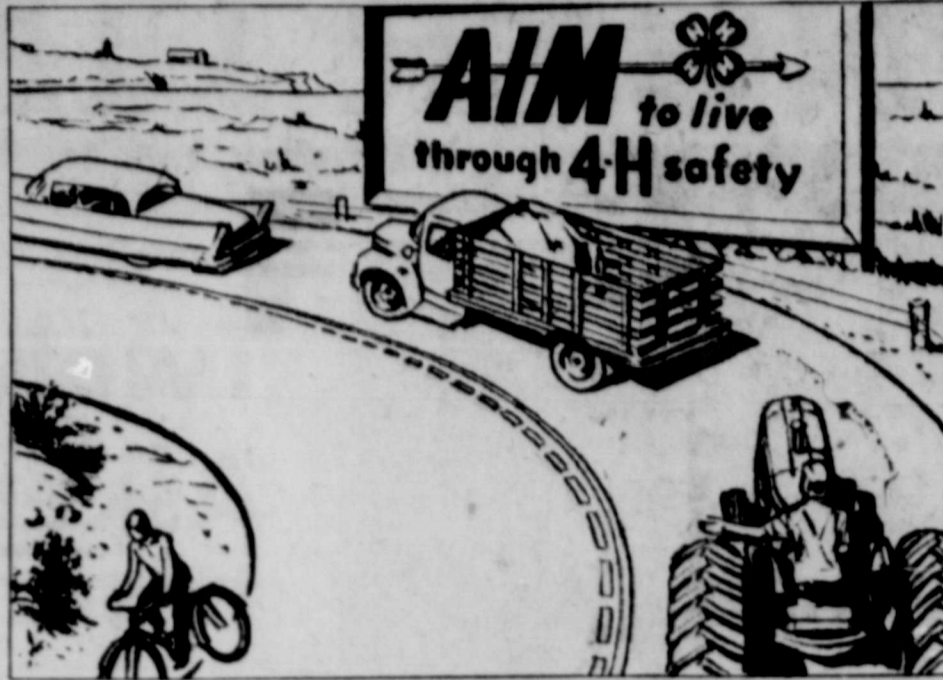

ALMOST ONE MILLION 4-H CLUB MEMBERS are aiming for safer living on highways and farms, in homes and communities. Their efforts are focused on the national 4-H Safety program directed by the Cooperative Extension Service and arranged by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work.

Farm boys and girls enrolled in the program—and their city cousins as well—can take their share of credit for helping to decrease traffic deaths last year. Proof that they're on the job is the record high enrollment reached in 1957 when 815,000 club members between the ages of 10 and 21 took part in some form of safety activity, according to the National Committee.

And hard work does not go unrewarded. At the national level eight top ranking 4-H'ers will receive \$400 college scholarships and an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago next December. The state winner also will attend the Congress with all-expenses paid, and it is estimated that nearly 4,000 youngsters will merit the county safety medal. All awards are provided by General Motors which has supported the 4-H Safety program since 1944.



**YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY**

The purpose of your Social Security office is to serve you. Probably the first contact you had with a Social Security officer was when you completed your application for a Social Security number. Most everyone today, when he gets his first job, will need a Social Security card. Applications may be obtained from the Abilene Social Security office or your local postoffice. If you lose your card and need to replace it, or you wish to make a change in your Social Security record—such as your new name when you marry—you can obtain application for this purpose at your Social Security office or local postoffice. The Abilene Social Security office issued 4900 new account number cards in 1957 and replaced 4746 lost cards.

Any time you need information about your Social Security or have any question regarding the Social Security program your Social Security office is the place to get it. Last year we answered an average of 50 letters per week for general and specific information about the Social Security laws.

We answered several thousand verbal inquiries. We distributed over 10,000 booklets and had over 250 radio programs throughout our 16 county territory. We also made several talks to interested groups during the year.

Eventually you or your survivors will be filing a Social Security claim for benefits. In 1957 the Abilene Social Security Office cleared 5890 original claims for Old-Age and Survivor Insurance and 683 recomputation applications were handled. In addition 614 claims for disability insurance payments were processed and 179 requests for disability freeze action were handled.

In addition to the town where this paper is published, we visited on regular visits, ranging from weekly to monthly, 21 other towns throughout the area to handle claims and inquiries. A schedule of such visits is furnished each postmaster in our 16-county district for your guidance in seeing our representative about your social security questions.

tion passed was the unit rule, making it certain that all of the county's 15 votes will be cast as the majority of delegates vote.

The second approved resolution called for the abolishment of all voting precincts in the county with less than 50 votes. The resolution did not specify if the votes to be considered were cast in the general elections or the Democratic primary election.

The resolution will be presented to the County Commissioners Court for action. Two years ago a similar move was ignored by the Commissioners Court.

Blevins told delegates Saturday, however, that some of the smaller precincts have actually asked to

be done away with. He pointed out that the July primary would cost between \$5000 to \$6000, and that such money would have to be paid by candidates. He termed the cost of running for office in Eastland County as almost prohibitive.

The only "no" vote of the day came on this resolution, however. It was cast by Scott Bailey, Cisco teacher. He told a reporter it would be unconstitutional to abolish the precincts before two years from now, when the precinct chairmen's term of office would end.

If the July primary votes are used to determine which precincts would be abolished under the 50-vote rule, 12 of the county's 26 precincts would be done away with. They would be Pioneer, Alameda, Long Branch, Okra,

Sranton, Nimrod, Dothan, Romney, Pleasant Hill, Staff, Cook and Sabanno.

However, if the last general election was set up as the determining election, it would mean Pioneer would not be abolished, but that Kokomo would.

**ABOUT YOUR HEALTH**

Many Texans like to spend their vacation time with an extended trip to far away places.

There are several risks in travel to strange places, but knowledge teamed with common sense can make your trip both safe and pleasant, provided you take the trouble to follow a few simple rules.

Immunization requirements for foreign travel vary from country to country and should be determined in advance so that you have ample time to receive the proper immunizations.

By all means you should be protected against typhoid, smallpox, and polio. Your family doctor, local director of health or the State Department of Health can advise you on these recommendations.

While it is probably safe to drink water in the big tourist hotels and the big cities every-

where the traveler who gets off the beaten path should, in most areas be careful.

The only safe water should be filtered and treated in an approved manner and approved by the local health department.

Coffee and tea are not necessarily safe because of boiling, and carbonated or noncarbonated soft drinks from unfamiliar sources should be avoided. And don't forget that ice cubes from polluted water can contaminate any drink.

Unless you are sure that the local milk is absolutely safe, and that the custards, ice cream, etc., are made from safe milk, you had better steer clear of them.

There is no rule that cooked food is safe, but you should be especially careful of uncooked foods: refrigeration standards may be poor and especially in sub-tropical climates, foods will spoil quickly. Many local farming habits bring sewage into close contact with vegetables, so eat only fresh vegetables and fruits that you are sure of.

Bathing in salt water is usually safe unless the water is grossly contaminated with sewage. Water infester with dangerous fish,

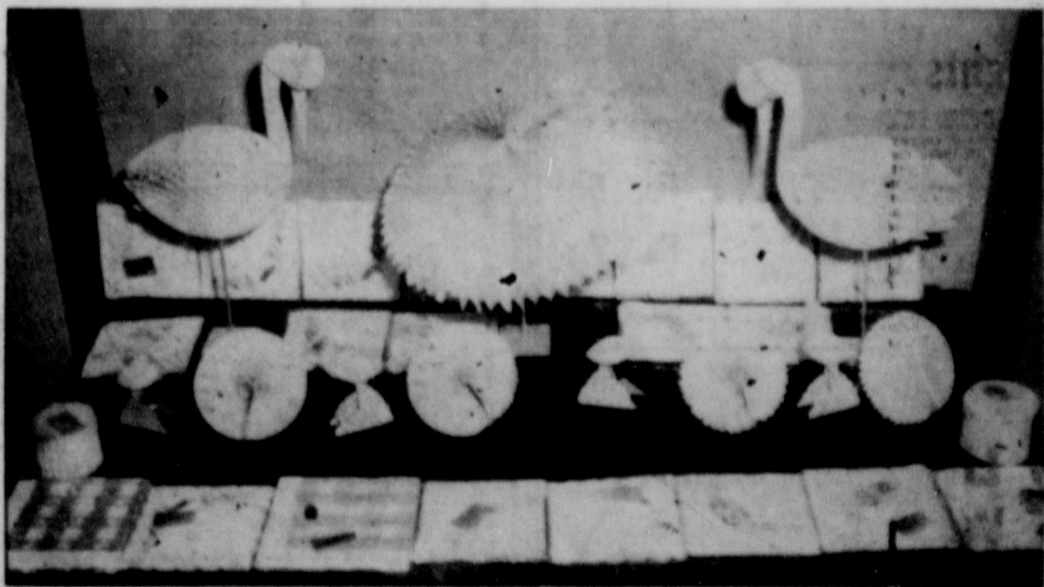
