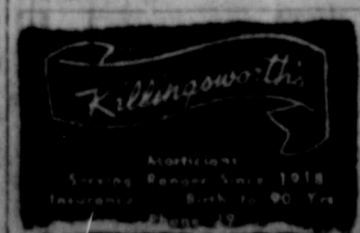

## Vets Urged to File Now For Fall Semester

(Editor's Note: An eight-point check list for veteran planning to start to school this fall was issued by the Veterans Administration in Dallas.

Veterans who plan to attend Ranger College—which starts its fall semester September 8 with registration—under the Korean GI Bill are urged to take action now in order to avoid the last-minute rush later on.)

With some 600,000 veterans expected to be in training this fall, VA Regional Offices will be operating at top speed to process their papers. By filing their applications now, veterans will save themselves unnecessary delays. Edward P. Onstot, manager of the VA Regional Office in Dallas, said.

To help veterans get started the right way, VA issued this eight-point check list:

1. Since veterans are allowed only one change of course, they should give plenty of thought to their goal and the training program leading to the goal.

2. Veterans not sure of their training goal may request VA vocational counseling.

3. Veterans should be certain their course has been GI approved by the State in which the school is located. VA Regional Office in Dallas and not Washington, D. C., can furnish information.

4. Veterans should complete arrangements for admittance to their school before filing applications with VA.

5. The application for GI training should be completely filled out. (Continued on Page Two)

## Bulldogs Will Begin Grid Workouts Aug. 25

Now that Ranger High School Coaches have returned from the annual Coaches Clinic, conducted last week in Houston, plans will get underway for fall football workouts to start Monday August 25, on the football field.

Coach Harold J. Barrett and O. C. Warden, assistant, returned Sunday morning from the coaching school where they heard lectures given by Jess Neely, head coach at Rice, and David Nelson of Delaware University. They saw films on football fundamentals, gained ideas on defensive and offensive plays, and saw the All-Star football and basketball teams in action.

Work-outs will start each morning at 8 for about two hours, and again in the afternoon at 6 for two hours. Sessions will include calisthenics, group drills, scrimmages, and wind sprints.

Coach Barrett said the boys should be in top condition for work-outs, because they promise to be hard. About 32 boys are expected to work out for both teams, he added.

Next year's team will be inexperienced and the line will be especially "green", Barrett said. If two or three sophomores turn out to be good players, the team will be adequate, but if they don't the team will be hurting, he added.

Ranger was rated sixth by coaches in this district at the coaching school. Cisco and Coleman were selected as co-favorites to win district honors, and Fallinger was rated runner-up. Winters was selected for the next spot, then Ranger, and last—Eastland.

Five starters graduated and they will be hard to replace, indicated Barrett. Among the players lost are David Whitton, who made the first all-state team (in the sport's writer's selection) and who will be attending Hardin-Simmons University on a scholarship this fall; Jerry Underwood and Robert Field, who will attend Abilene Christian College on scholarships; Wayne Jowers and Doane Yarborough.

Some of the "promising" sophomores could push some of the lettermen out of this position. Barrett said. Probable positions were listed as follows: Charles Walford, left half; Jerry Busham, fullback; Lee King, quarterback; Walter Hutchings, end; Jerry Anderson, "ad; Charles Vuale, center; David Russell, guard; Joe Bradford, tackle; and Tommy Ford, guard. All are returning lettermen, except Montgomery.

Playing the other tackle position will be Ronnie Dasekovich, Jimmy Robinson or Earnest Stephens.

Other sophomores to participate in work-outs will include: Bert Young, Richard Robie, Edward Mendez, Richard Wilhelm and Chuck Garrett.

The "B" team will be made up of freshmen and some sophomores.

Managers of the team will be Tim Covington and James Henry, both sophomores.

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## Local Citizens Urged To Help Foundation

(Editor's Note: This is the first of an urgent appeal being made to Ranger citizens to participate in the statewide "Citizen's March" for the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation—now the Texas Rehabilitation Center—which is in jeopardy because of a shortage of operating funds.)

Gonzales, Aug. 11.—An urgent appeal for willing workers from Ranger and Eastland to give a single evening of effort to an emergency state wide "Citizen's March" for the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation (now the Texas Rehabilitation Center) is being made by R. I. Payne of Dallas, Foundation president.

Unless financial help is forthcoming in the very near future, the Texas rehabilitation center is having to close its doors.

"We earnestly hope there is a civic, church, woman's, Scout, or school group in Ranger or Eastland which would like to volunteer for this one evening Citizen's March," Payne said. If so, its officers are urged to contact the Foundation's executive director, Walter H. Ritcher, P. O. Box 58, Gonzales, as soon as possible.

"It would be a tragedy," Payne observed, "if these remarkable facilities, built by and for all Texans, were lost to the thousands of citizens crippled in accidents, by strokes, arthritis, cerebral palsy, and many other handicapping conditions."

Only about 30 percent of the patients at the center are still polio victims, and there are few agencies, such as polio's March of Dimes, which can help financially.

Hub Jones and J. C. Crider of Lubbock pulled in 12 bass, weighing between two and four pounds each, casting.

Annual fishing permits at Lake Leon will go on sale, in the area next Friday, according to an announcement from E. H. Mills, president of the board of directors of the Eastland County Water Supply District.

Permits will go on sale at all boat docks, bait houses and other businesses that ordinarily sell them.

This year the permits are white with the expiration date printed upon them. Previously the permits had the date written on the salmon-colored slips.

Saturday's rains measured .47 of an inch in the Ranger area, and farmers hoped for more to come.

Monday, temperatures soared again and no rain was in sight. "We need a good rain all over the territory," said T. C. Wylie of the Ranger Peanut Co. He said at least a one-inch rain is needed for a "bumper" crop of peanuts, and the rain is needed now.

At the present time, peanuts look rather "sick," Wylie added.

 and signed. It should be sent, along with a photostat or certified copy of the veteran's separation paper, to the VA Regional Office serving his area.

3. The application should go to VA as soon as possible. This will enable VA to iron out any snags before school starts.

7. Veterans with dependents should have the necessary proof of dependency ready when VA requests it. For a wife, this would be a photostat of the marriage certificate; for a child, a photostat of the birth certificate.

8. Veterans should take along enough money of their own to tide them over the first two months of training. It takes that long, ordinarily, for a veteran's first monthly GI check to reach him. The reason is that payments are made only after each month of training is completed, and not before.

Further, before VA may make a payment, it must receive a certification signed by the veterans and his school, stating that he has been in class all month. The law allows VA 20 days after receipt of certifications to get checks in the mail.

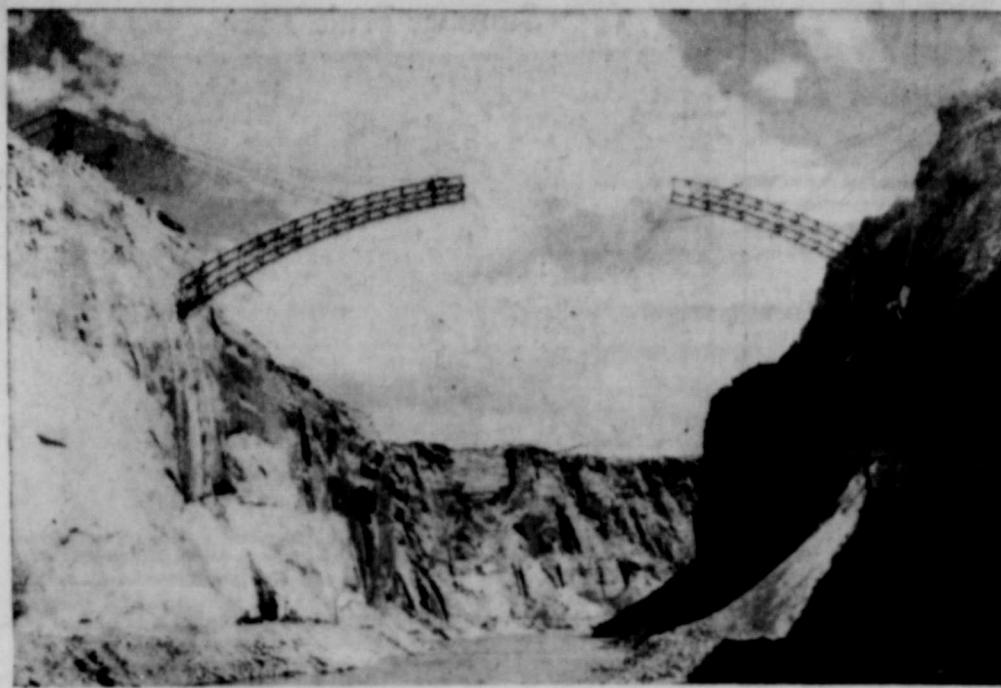

From Lyndon Johnson  
Dear Friend:  
The work of this session of Congress has resulted in a record of productivity that compares favorably with the record of any Congressional session in our history. As this is written, there are still important measures to be enacted before adjournment. But the record already made is one that does credit to our representative form of government.

In any field of national security, as I pointed out in my News Letter last week, Congress took definite steps to strengthen our defenses and to improve our position in the Space Age.

Also, we met the threat of economic recession with a series of legislative measures prudently designed to combat the slump in business and to provide jobs for people who need them.

Effects of much of the legislation enacted during the last seven months will be felt for years to come. Space does not permit the listing of all the important bills passed, or even of most of them. But among the outstanding ones are these:

\*Resolutions calling for speeding up on previously authorized military construction and public works projects.

\*A new highway bill setting up a program to bring better roads to all our people and provide many, many new jobs.

\*The biggest health research program in history.

\*Extension of unemployment compensation—a lifesaver for people who had been laid off from their jobs.

\*A housing bill to stimulate home building. Its good economic effects already are being felt throughout the country.

\*We authorized construction of a long list of water control and conservation projects in Texas.

\*The Senate passed, and I hope the House of Representatives will approve, a farm bill of great importance to Texas cotton and rice producers, to wool producers and to other farmers.

\*A bill creating a permanent Small Business Administration with

greater lending authority and lower interest rates.

"A bill to save the country's railroad from bankruptcy."

When will Congress adjourn? Guesses are plentiful, but no one knows the exact date. There is still work to be done. Action remains to be completed on proposed legislation of importance.

These past seven months have been all business so far as Congress is concerned. The concluding days or weeks of the session may be expected to follow the pattern that has been set. That means we will be working right up to the hour of adjournment, on matters affecting the well-being of the American people.

That is precisely as it should be.

#### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #48—Number Five on the Ballot.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by charter or ordinance a general law city operating under the general law may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for an election to be held by the voters of the State of Texas.

**SECTION 1.** That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 12 of Article XI and to read as follows: "Section 12. A home rule city may provide by charter or ordinance a general law city operating under the general law may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby."

**SECTION 2.** The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of the State at the General Election to be held the first Tuesday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that a home rule city may provide by charter or ordinance a general law city operating under the general law may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for an election to be held by the voters of the State of Texas."

**SECTION 3.** The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

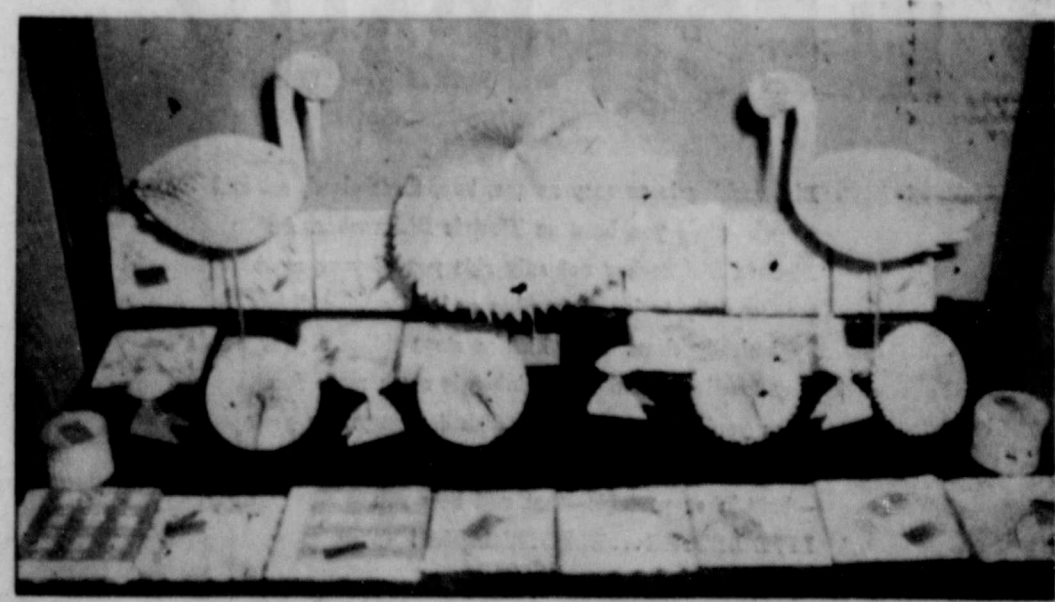
