A NEWSPAPER'S JOB is to report. This means that a good reporter (or editor) simply reports the news — without comment, without taking sides, and without expressing his opinion.

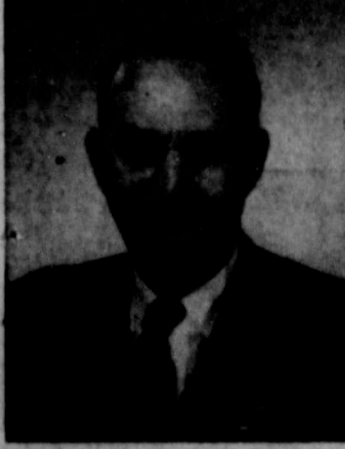
Adjectives and adverbs must be avoided like the plague, and controversial stories must be reported without comment or taking sides.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—It is often my feelings that the success of the Congress may be measured by some of the things it does not do, as well as some of the things it does.

Someone suggested a few days ago that the last action of the Congress before adjourning should be a bill repealing all laws passed during the last two weeks of a session. Legislation is being ground out in the closing days until it is virtually impossible to give proper study to every measure.

However, the congress has just passed a measure which is highly justified. Some may recall that in this column a few weeks ago was discussed the virtual impossibility of deporting aliens who are found to be undesirable, as long as the alien had money and could hire a lawyer to keep his case in the Courts. Many of these cases have been in Court for ten years or more, and the undesirable alien is still here.

The bill passed provides for one appeal from a deportation order direct to the United States Circuit of Appeals, and if the Circuit Court and the Supreme Court uphold the order, the only other action available would be to seek release on a writ of habeas corpus on an issue that could not have been raised at previous hearings. This measure should prevent the

legal merry-go-round by which subversives and criminals with money can bring endless court actions and stave off deportations for years.

Another partially won victory for those of us from oil producing areas is a section in the new Reciprocity Trade Act, giving the Administration a mandate to substantially curb damaging oil imports. Now that the Congress has acted, the Administration is on trial to carry out in good faith the reduction of foreign oil imports, which has been a factor in the adverse conditions now being experienced by the independent domestic oil industry.

Another prediction made in this column some months ago is, unfortunately, proving true. Inflation is the most serious domestic problem confronting the nation. The administration is grinding itself for a new anti-inflation battle. Its tools will again be tighter money and an effort to cut Federal spending.

On the matter of cutting Federal expenditures, there is agreement on the need, but many doubts about the deed.

Since the congress is adjourning and much of my time will be spent back at home, this column will be discontinued for the remainder of the year.

**STATE SOMETIMES "INHERITS" PROPERTY**

Made your will? If not, the State of Texas may wind up as owner of your estate upon your death. Under our statutes, the estates of persons having no heirs who die intestate revert, or "escheat", to the State.

Such provisions have been carried over from the English common law. There, under such circumstances, the estate escheated to the British crown. The theory of the process is that the sovereign (or State), having been the original owner of all lands before they were parceled out to individuals, is entitled to a return of such lands when the possibilities of legal inheritance have been exhausted.

This idea has been expanded to include personal property as well as real estate. It also applies in the case of a person absent for a term of seven years and not known to exist who leaves no heirs and no will.

Presumably, there is hardly a person who does not have some individual or charity that he would prefer to have his estate rather than have it go to the State by default, so to speak. Yet, surprisingly, estates worth many thousands of dollars do escheat to the various states from time to time.

Now, before you shrug the matter off with the idea that those statutory provisions could not possibly apply to you, better think a minute. Suppose you and your spouse have no heirs besides each other and your children. Many people do fall into this category.

In event of a catastrophe resulting in death for you and your entire immediate family, no legal heirs would remain. Therefore if you had no will, your property would go to the State. In preparing a will, it is possible to provide

for such an eventuality. In this hypothetical case, you would probably want to designate some friend as executor, to take care of all necessary arrangements and then distribute the estate according to your wishes.

On the other hand, if you have plenty of possible heirs, a will could be used to designate which of them shall participate in the division of the estate. And even if you wish your property to be distributed entirely in accordance with our statutes of descent and distribution as explained in previous columns, a will can perform useful functions. Among other uses, a will could provide for an orderly and economical partition of your property, preventing any waste of the assets by heirs impatient for a settlement.

and court proceedings, all escheated lands are set apart to the Permanent Free School Fund of the State, and may be leased and sold by the Land Commissioner under certain regulations. Escheated personal property is sold by the local sheriff under a court writ and the money received therefrom paid into the State Treasury.
