



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

faculty was increased to eight teachers and the pupils numbered. 350, with 90 students in high

And then came the boom . . .

Oil Boom Changes Ranger went into a state of fast change with the discovery of oil, and the public schools somehow managed to star sbreet of the "rising tide", although the boom brought about many problems.

V. V. Cooper contributed two new school locations, as plans were made for a record enrollment. And then came the "deluge.

Enrollment figures reached 1300, with a teaching force of 26, and school funds were inadequate to continue operating efficiently. But the school board agreed to borrow the money to operate for nine months and the new buildings

were paid for. School valuations increased to \$14,000,000 (from less than half a million), and the enrollment increased to 2,050 students.

Funds were voted to build school buildings at a cost of \$300,000. and the size of the district was increased to 25 souare miles. The increase brought the tax valuation up to \$7,000,000.

As the schools boomed with Ranger, members of the school board were: John M. Gholson, president; M. H. Hagaman, secretary; J. H. Hankins, Lee Williams, Cooper, T. G. Deffebach and E. H. Mills.
