Christian Science

How selfishness is overcome through the acknowledgment and understanding of God as the only Mind is a topic to be dealt with at Christian Science services Sunday. Three Maple Flavored Marvels!



Smart hostesses have discovered that maple and cream combine perfectly for year 'round desserts. Four maple-blended syrup over a dish of ice cream... sprinkle with nuts... and enjoy a "bit o' heaven"! Maple Sherbet is another "easy" dessert. Just mix a cup of maple-blended syrup with a cup of buttermilk, about a tablespoon of lemon juice and a dash of salt. Freeze about 2 hours, then beat until smooth, but not melted. Fold in one cup of whipped cream and freeze again. Serve with more maple-blended syrup—often!

Maple Freeze
1 cup maple-blended syrup
3 egg yolks, well beaten
Few grains of salt
3 egg whites
1 cup whipping cream
1 teaspoon vanilla
Chopped canned salted nuts

Heat syrup in top of double boiler. Pour hot syrup slowly into beaten egg yolks, stirring constantly. Return to double boiler and cook over hot water until mixture is thickened and will coat a silver spoon. Remove from heat. Cool to room temperature. Meanwhile add salt to egg whites and beat until stiff but not dry. Fold egg whites into syrup mixture. Whip the cream; add vanilla. Add to syrup mixture. Pour into freezing trays of refrigerator and freeze until firm. Serve with salted nuts as garnish, if desired. Makes 8 servings.

TALES OF LOST TREASURES IN AND AROUND EASTLAND COUNTY

In his book of the oil boom days at Ranger, the penitentiary House included on page 2 a concise and vivid paragraph concerning the buried treasure legends of this county and what the people did in an attempt to recover them.

That they succeeded in doing so Mr. House does not say. But then on the other hand, neither does he state that they failed either. It is simply a matter of speculation as to whether the treasures were found or that they still remain hidden in the ground yet awaiting someone's happy discovery.

Down on Nash Creek near Kokomo church are four old Oak trees that bear some mighty strange "markings". After seeing them, a person easily would be led to believe that they were just as bona fide as the old Oaks were themselves! The Oaks are all in a line with one another and the first three unmistakably point out the fourth which bears the sign of a leaning cross carved in the thick bark. The cross "leans" off to the left and—as do the other markings—points also. Only this time not to another tree but to a particular spot on the ground a few feet away. At this spot can be found a considerably deep hole where somebody apparently has been digging for treasure or for

buried should the diare arise. In the meantime—the four old Oaks with the strange carvings and Nash Creek are but standing pioneer monuments to the passing unheeded generation of today.

Record On Success Heard In Lions Meet

"The Strangest Secret" and "Pay the Price"—a recording by Earl Nightingale—held the rapt attention of members of the Lions Club Thursday noon in a program presented by Walter Arterburn. Arterburn, who was introduced by Wilson Guest, explained the purpose of the record and concluded by stating the philosophy would boost business in Ranger.

Only five people out of 100, reaching the age of 65 or over, were financially successful. The reason for this was explained in the recording as being the lack of goals.

One person out of 20 reaches success, the record stated, and conformity is one reason for this low percentage. The key to success is goals, implanted in the mind (as crops are planted in the soil), it continued. "We become what we think about," Nightingale said. "Believe and succeed."

In the second recording, a 30-day test was suggested, emphasizing the importance of writing down goals in order to keep them constantly in mind. The five-part test was listed as (1) understanding goals emotionally as well as intellectually; (2) courage; (3) positive thinking and imagination; (4) saving 10-percent of earnings; and (5) action.

Control of the mind and pushing out negative thoughts are necessary, the record proceeded. Inspiration is necessary. The method is simple yet difficult to realize, but purpose and faith can help obtain success, Nightingale concluded.
