

Battle moves, so far, have included two protest meetings against the school board, a n c large newspaper advertisement booming for both sides.

The second protest meeting held Monday night in City Hal auditorium, drew about 100 peo ple amid an atmosphere of calm ness and deliberation-but deter-

The school board wants to build an 18-room grade school, consolidating both North Ward a n South Ward pupils on the South campus. Counting the east side school, that would leave two city grade schools .

Opposition springs from the pro posed elimination of the North Ward school, from the estimated 10 per cent tax increase necessary to pay off the bonds. Feeling on both sides is countywide, for the tax would be hiked at the ounty level, and county pupils at nd the city schools.
