Members of the City Commis on are expected to call the elecion upon receipt of the petitions. A notice of at least 20 days must be given before a local election can be called, with a maximum of 40 days.

The petition reads. "To the Honorable City Commissioners of the City of Ranger,

Eastland County, Texas: "We, the undersigned qualified voters residing within the corporate limits of the City of Ranger Eastland County, Texas, and con stituting at least 25 percent of the number of qualified votes cast at the last regular municipal elec-tion held in the City of Ranger, Eastland County, Texas, hereby petition the City Commission to submit to the voters of said City, the question whether the City Ordinance provided for parking meters should be repealed. Said or-dinance being attached hereto and made a part hereof."

Attached is a copy of City Or-dinance No. V-10-235 which authorizes the use of city meters.

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

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


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Missionary From Gorman Drowns In Africa
