Bennie Cogburn Completes Basic AF Training
 LACKLAND AFB, Tex.—Airman Third Class Bennie C. Cogburn, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Cogburn of 215 S. Madera St., Eastland, has completed his initial course of Air Force basic military training here. He has been selected to attend the technical training course for Aircraft and Engine Maintenance at Sheppard AFB, Texas.
 Airman Cogburn graduated from Eastland High School and was attending Junior College in Cisco, prior to enlisting in the Air Force. Basic airmen at Lackland are selected for specialized training at technical schools on the basis of their interests and aptitudes. They are reassigned to the school after four weeks of basic, and are given additional military basic training long with the technical subjects.

VA Benefits Can be Reduced

An estimated 200,000 servicemen who have GI insurance policies under in-service waiver of premium payments might—in the event of death—lose their survivors to receive reduced benefits payments, says Edward F. Onatol, manager of the VA regional office in Dallas.
 On the other hand, he adds, in some cases an in-service waiver might increase the VA benefits survivors would receive.
 Onatol says the generally higher death payments authorized last year by the Survivor Benefits Act do not apply to the survivors of those who die while their GI insurance policies are under in-service waiver of premium payments.
 However, such survivors may be eligible for the old and generally lesser amounts of death compensation payments.
 "Generally higher" or "generally lesser" do not mean "always," he cautions.
 Several factors determine which is the greater benefit, he says. These include the serviceman's number and kind of dependents, and his basic monthly pay.
 Not affected by an in-service waiver is the payment of the GI policy proceeds to the designated beneficiary or beneficiaries, he points out.
 Servicemen whose policies are still under in-service waiver should determine whether—in event of death—the waiver's existence would be in the best interests of their survivors. If not, they should cancel the waiver and resume full payment of premiums, Onatol advises.

STOCK MARKET REPORTS

 FORT WORTH, Sept. 8.—The opening session on the livestock market at Fort Worth Monday was fairly active and most cattle and calves cleared at fully steady to strong prices. Slaughter cows were scarce, and somewhat higher. Stocker and feeder trade was very active and Cornbelt and Western outlets had to compete with a more determined set of Southwestern stockmen, who in many cases had gotten some good moisture out of Hurricane Ella's visit to Texas.
 Packers were active buyers, since the abbreviated supplies of meat acquired in the previous week left their cupboards comparatively bare.
 Comparative prices: Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings drew \$24 to \$27, and common and medium offerings cleared at \$18 to \$23. Fat cows ranged from \$18 to \$21, and canners and cutters drew \$13 to \$18, a few emaciated canners below \$13. Bulls brought \$17.50 to \$21.50.
 Good and choice slaughter calves cashed at \$24 to \$27, and medium and lower grades bulked at \$16 to \$23. Medium and good stocker steer calves cashed at \$28 to \$32, a few good and choice \$32 to \$35.50. Similar heifer calves ranged from \$30 downward. Lighter weight steer yearlings ranged from \$27 downward, and a heavier steers sold from \$24.50 down. A few medium and plain stocker cows cashed at \$18 to \$20.50.

upon request, from the Director, Texas Forest Service, College Station. In addition, these order forms can be secured from county agents, Soil Conservation Districts, and ASC offices in the West Texas area.

About 50,000 red cedar, 25,000 ponderosa pine, and 15,000 Austrian pine seedlings will be procured for distribution by the Texas Forest Service and will be sold for \$1.25 per hundred prepaid. Landowners in critical areas should establish farmstead or field windbreaks to prevent wind erosion of their valuable top soil," Young reported.

The deadline for ordering seedlings will be March 1, 1959. Seedlings will be shipped about the first week of March, 1959, to locations specified on the application blanks. Information on how to store and plant the seedlings is available upon request.
"The orders will be filled on a 'first come—first served' basis," Young added.

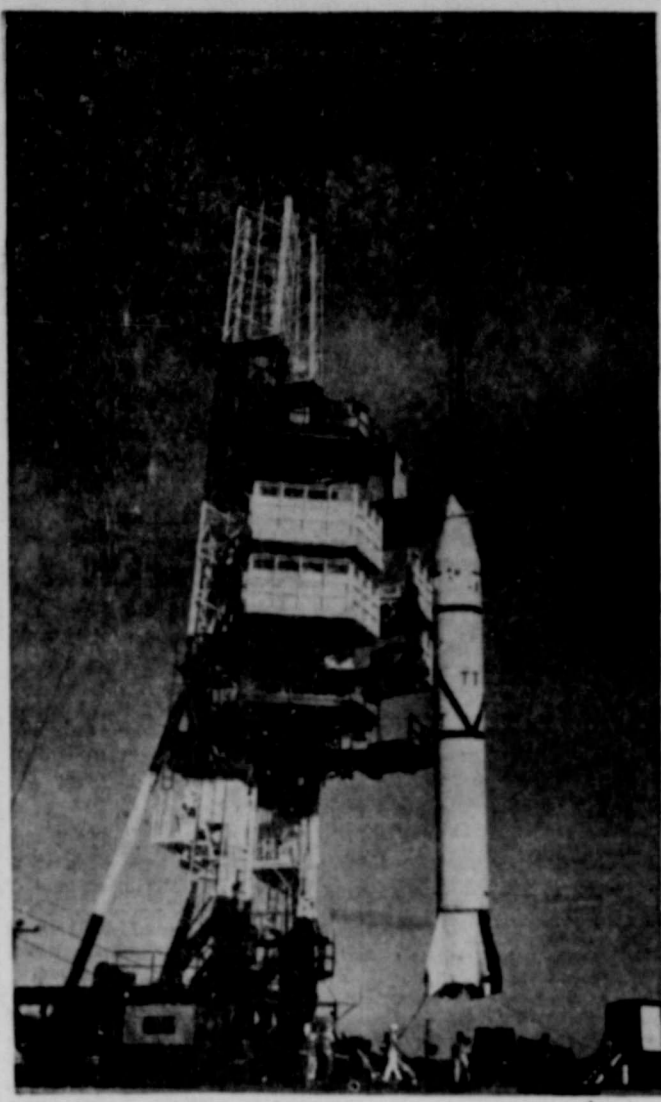

What Makes Some W. Texas Towns Shrink While Others Grow? Read On!

ABILENE (Spl.)—West Texas' population has increased a whopping 45.4 per cent since 1950, a survey by one of the Southwest's leading population analysts reveals.
The survey, made by Dr. R. L. Skrabanek, a sociologist on the staff of Texas A & M College and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, was published in the current issue of West Texas Today, monthly magazine of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.
Dr. Skrabanek's survey, which covers the entire 132-county region served by the West Texas Chamber, shows that West Texas now has a population of nearly three and one-half million people compared with less than two million in 1950 and slightly more than two and one-third million in 1950.

Heaviest gain in population since 1950 was scores in the Permian Basin area of the region. The Midland-Odessa-Big Spring area has increased its population by 104 per cent since the last U. S. Census, Dr. Skrabanek states. Although, as Dr. Skrabanek points out, "not all areas of West Texas have shared equally in this growth," each of the WTCC's 10 administrative districts has gained population since 1950... ranging from 12.9 per cent for the district with least gain to the Permian Basin district's tremendous 104 per cent.

"Naturally the question arises as to why certain areas are being drained of people while others are increasing their numbers so rapidly. There are dozens of minor reasons but it is relatively easy to determine a few that get to the heart of the matter quickly," Dr. Skrabanek stated.
"With but few exceptions, factors that have caused rapid population increases in certain areas of West Texas are oil and gas developments, irrigation and the presence of large population centers with job opportunities that attract a lot of people. On the other hand, those areas that are heavily dependent on farming and

over 80,000; McLennan (Waco) by 60,000; Ector (Odessa) 60,000; Wichita (Wichita Falls) 56,000; Potter (Amarillo) over 55,000 and Midland (Midland) almost 50,000.

Not to be overshadowed, however, are some of the less populous counties. Leading the list is Andrews County which boomed from 1,300 in 1940 to 5,000 in 1950 and an estimated 14,000 in 1958. Other counties which increased by an estimated 60 per cent or more in the last 8-year period are: Castro, Crane, Culberson, Hale, Moore, Farmer, Reagan, Reeves, Upton and Yoakum.
West Texas population in 1940 was 1,925,093; in 1950, the population was 2,364,988 (an increase of 22.7 per cent over 1940); and the region's population in 1958 is estimated at 3,438,064 (an increase of 45.4 per cent over 1950).

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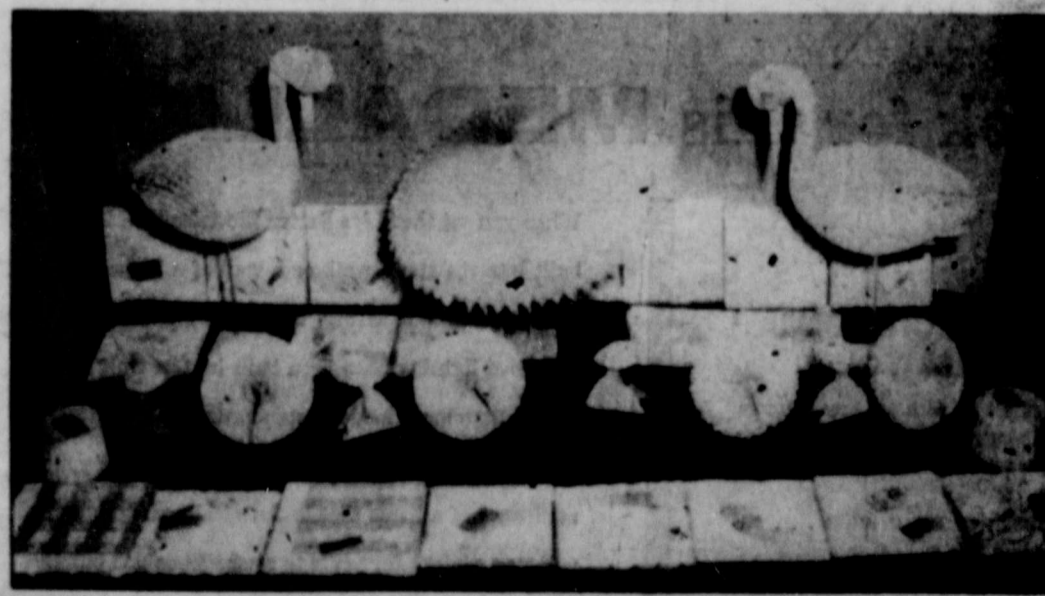

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
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
