

Serve Cucumber With Polynesian Meat Balls

If you like to give meat balls a very special treatment, this Polynesian recipe, enhanced by sweet sour cucumber peels, will certainly interest you.

Polynesian Meat Balls (5 servings)

One cup soft bread crumbs, 1 teaspoon sait, is teaspoon pep-per, is cup chopped onion, is cup milk, I tablespoon soy sauce. 1 pound ground beef, ¼ cup sugar, 11½ tablespoons corn-starch, ¼ teaspoon ground gin-ger, 1 cup pineapple juice, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, 1 (8-ounce) can water chestnuts, drained and cut into 14-inch slivers, 2 (1 choppen onion, I cup coarsely

salt, pepper, onion, milk, 2 tea spoons soy sauce and ground beef. Shape into 16 balls, using about 2 tablespoons of mixture baking pan and bake in a mod browned, about 30 minutes. Combine sugar, cornstarch and ginger. Add pineapple juice, vinegar, remaining teaspoon soy

Combine bean sprouts, onion and green pepper. Simmer until onion is tender. Drain off liquid.


