The Rangers left town Wednesday morning, after less than a week of light work-outs, and are expected to arrive back in town tomorrow at 2 p.m.

Dr. Price R. Ashton, college president, said this season will probably end up as good or better than the season when the Rangers won six games.

Head Coach David Slaughter said, "If we play as good ball as we did against Henderson County, we stand a chance to win."

He adds, "On Halloween, instead of going out to ask for candy or cookies or apples, the young people carry contribution cartons and ask for gifts of cash to help feed hungry people overseas. September 30, 1958 was \$4,166,240, compared to \$5,514,756 for the first three quarters of 1957. Gross income for the third quarter was \$6,223,409, up from \$4,958,602 in the second quarter and \$5,827,295 in the third quarter of 1957.

In more recent years, he has done graduate study at Union Theological Seminary and Columbia University in New York.


Prior to World War II, Dr. Matsumoto was vice-president of Goshen Christian University in Seoul, Korea. Later he became president of the Hiroshima Girls' School. He was at his post when the atomic bomb fell in 1945. Dr. Matsumoto's wife and more than 300 students of the school were killed.

After World War II, Dr. Matsumoto was one of three Japanese scholars appointed to make a new translation of the New Testament. The translation was subsequently published by the Japan and American Bible Societies. In 1956, Dr. Matsumoto went to London to serve as a chaplain among the Japanese community in that city.

The five schools about which Dr. Matsumoto will be speaking to American Methodists are: Aoyama Gakuin, Kwansai Gakuin in Nishinomiya, Ghinsei Gakuin in Isahaya, Nagoya Gakuin in Nagoya and To-O-Gijuku in Hiroasaki.


