### **Poppy Day Sales Set Saturday**

(Editor's Note: Renger American Legion Auxiliary members will be stationed throughout the town Saturday with baskets of poppies which they will ask everyone to wear in remembrance of those who fought in the World Wers.

Poppy sales will be used for the welfare of the wars' living victims, as well as the remembrance of those who gave their lives. The following is given by Mrs. H. C. Croom, president of the Auxiliary, pertaining to Poppy Day.)

### By Mrs. H. C. Croom

Soon we will all be asked to wear a little red poppy, which is symbolic and sacred to Americans everywhere. The tiny little red flowers that were made by our disabled veterans, home from the wars and now confined in hospitals, has become our national memorial flower.

Dating back to the war in 1918, when contending forces had trampled the ground for miles along the front; blown full of ugly craters made by exploding mines, and bleached by clouds of poison gas, many thousands of our American lives were given that peace might be restored. Those whose lives were spared saw only one touch of life and beauty in the region. This was the little red pop-

They bloomed profusely along the ragged shell holes and in the fields raked by machine gun. But more precious Dies Monday; still they clothed the graves of fallen comrades. It seemed as if the gallant spirit of the dead had passed into the Services are Set blood-red blossoms and were sending messages of courage and hope to those left behind, so it became a symbol to them

The crepe paper poppies which we are asked to wear this November day of remembrance may be ill-fashioned and unskillfully made. Let's treasure it more because it represents the faltering steps on the road to recovery for some man that risked his life so that we could keep ours, and our country free.

It is our earnest and sincere hope that every man, woman and child in Ranger will wear a poppy on Poppy Day and remember that had it not been for what the poppy symbolizes we might be having to put away the Poppy which is so dear to our hearts, and instead be compelled to use the swastika.
