

Families Can Save Money By Producing Food
 College Station.—Studies show that families can reduce the amount of money spent for food by producing some of it themselves and, at the same time, probably be better fed, says Cecil Parker, extension farm management specialist.
 However, adds Parker, there are some factors that should be considered in deciding whether it is desirable to produce rather than buy the home food supply.
 One thing to consider is could the land, labor and capital used for home production be more profitably used for producing commercial crops. It is also possible that the time required could be used in a way that would pay more than enough to buy what might be raised.
 The family also must decide if they would eat better by raising their own food supply and if they would get more of the protective foods such as milk, eggs, vegetables, meats and fruits.
 There are also some production factors, points out Parker. For example, does the family have the skill and knowledge for this type of production and are they willing to be tied down by the routine work? A sufficient water supply should be available in case of an extended dry spell.
 Some other questions the family should ask are: Is there a possibility of a 4-H club demonstration related to the food supply? Is there an opportunity to sell any surplus that might be produced? Is there a market accessible that carries a good variety and quality of foods at a reasonable price?
 Parker says whether a family decides to produce their own food, and if so, the kind and amount of food they decide to produce, will depend on their own situation and the values they place on the above considerations.

Sponsored proposition of uniform flag decoration for the City of Ranger. Arranged with city for alteration of upper floor of City Hall for use of American Legion quarters and for assembly hall for mass meetings.

Sponsored and inaugurated movement whereby Fourth of July celebration became a community affair.

Members of the Carl Barnes Post are now raising among themselves and their friends a fund with which to remodel and furnish the quarters on the second floor of the City Hall Building they are soon to occupy. (1924)

When the post was first organized the oil field was filled with ex-service men, but because their work kept them away from the city much of the time it was not possible for many of them to join.

While a large number of these men have moved to other fields there are, it is estimated, between 200 and 300 former soldiers in and about Ranger who are eligible for membership in the post.

Here are Jobs For Gardener

COLLEGE STATION - There are still a few jobs which the home gardener can do now. And doing them will help make the gardening job easier next spring and will add useful life to needed equipment, says R. G. Hancock, extension horticulturist.

The garden site can be cleared of old plant growth including weeds and grass and if the plants were not diseased the materials should go into the compost pile, says the specialist. The compost can be used next year for mulching and adding organic matter to the soil. The plant residue may also be plowed under as another method for clearing the garden area.

Dusters and sprayers should be given a thorough cleaning and stored for the winter. Sprayers should be washed out to remove all spray residues and a weak vinegar solution will help. After the cleaning job, Hancock suggests coating the tank and other metal parts with a thin covering of oil. The duster should be cleaned with a stiff brush. The outside metal parts may be oiled but oil on the inside of the duster will tend to cake the dust that will be used next season.

Most gardeners have left-over chemicals which can be used next season if they are properly stored. Hancock advises storage in a dry place and in air-tight containers.
