Second County Rat and Mice Campaign Underway

The second rat and mice control campaign for the year got underway this week when the Eastland County Farm Bureau set up several bait stations over the county for the convenience of their members as well as for the general public according to John Love, Cheaney, President of the sponsoring organization. Fumarin treated bait will be used in this campaign, same as for the first campaign waged last August he said. The need for killing the rodents now is perhaps as great if not greater than it was in August according to Love. As winter approaches rats and mice will begin migrating from the woods and fields into houses, barns, cribs, grainaries and other places in even greater numbers looking for food and shelter.

The fumarin treated bait can be obtained at a reasonable cost at not only Loves Place in the Cheaney Community but also at the J. D. Caldwell farm near Gorman; A. Z. Myrick's Locker Plant in Cisco; Arthur Wright's farm in the Long Branch Community; Penman Schaefer's place in the Sneed Community and at Perkins Implement Store in Eastland. Other bait stations may be set up later if necessary.

Busiest Peanut Week In 8 Years Reported

Last week was one of the biggest weeks from the standpoint of peanut receipts in Eastland County since 1950, according to reports. The heaviest movement of peanuts in the county since that time was reported. About half of the Ranger area peanut crop has been received, according to T. C. Wylie, vice-president and general manager of the Ranger Peanut Co., Inc. Wylie said that peanuts filled up one warehouse, with a capacity of about 800 tons, last week, and part of another warehouse, with a capacity of about 1,000 tons.

Recent rains have slowed down the peanut movement, but no crop damages have been reported. If the weather stays dry, the movement should continue to be heavy this week.

Ten Turkeys To Be Given Away Saturday

A ten turkey give-away is set this Saturday afternoon in downtown Ranger as the second special event of the local merchant's Fall Campaign. Sponsored by the trade extension committee of the Chamber of Commerce, the event will be staged from different buildings up and down Main St. from 2 to 4 p.m. Saturday. Two of the ten turkeys will be released from a building, every 30 minutes during that time. No one will know from which building the turkeys will be released at any one time, and the turkeys will be released from a different building each time. Those catching the turkeys may keep them.

Tornado Hits Docks; Damages Strawn Area

A tornado early Monday morning skipped over Lake Leon, ripping off the roof of one boat dock and overturning another. About 7:25 a. m. Monday the twister had reached the southwest section of Strawn where it did considerable heavy damage. Last report indicated that the tornado had struck about two and one-half miles east of Strawn damaging cars and trucks near the H. C. Vandavee & Son Aggregate Co. The roof of a boat dock, belonging to E. N. Varner, who lives near the lake, was ripped off by the tornado winds Monday morning. About the same time a twister up-turned the Joe Jackson dock and left the all-steel structure upside down and partly in the water.

Varner reported that he felt the boat dock lift up about six or eight feet when the tornado struck and carried away the roof. High winds preceded the tornado's path and continued over the area for most of the day. The boat dock belonging to Joe Dennis and Onus Dick was also overturned and completely demolished. Found upside down in the water the dock was considered a total loss. No other reports of damaged docks were received by press time. Preceding a cold front, high winds and "freak" weather conditions were reported over most of the state Monday, some doing considerable damage. Havoc was wrought by the high winds in Strawn, but no injuries were reported. The roof and neon sign at Andy's, belonging to Andrew Mar-

ine of Strawn, was damaged in the wind. A metal roof with a pipe frame was carried across Highway 14, from the the Pruitt Recreation Club, about 200 yards, scattering debris in the area. (Continued on Page Four)

Gospel Caravan Services Tonight

A Gospel Wagon Caravan has stopped in Ranger for evangelistic services tonight at 7:30 in Little League Park. In the evangelistic party are 14 persons dressed in pioneer clothing. They are Rev. and Mrs. Harry Peyton, their 11-year-old son Benny, Mr. and Mrs. Glen Rolan of Bluefield, W. Va., S. K. Gibson of Roanoke, Va., Harry Huffman, wife and son, and Harold Meadows of Forest Hill, near Hinton, W. Va. Rev. Juddie Peyton, his wife and daughter, are also traveling with the caravan to serve as advance agents. The covered wagon caravan is enroute from Hinton, W. Va., to Los Angeles, Calif., a 2800 mile journey in four months. The group was in Gordon Monday and will proceed to Eastland Wednesday and arrive in Cisco Thursday for services at 7:30 p.m. Inter-denominational gospel services are held along the caravan route. Rev. Peyton is an evangelist with churches in Hinton, Roanoke, Va., and others in outlying communities. He left Hinton Sept. 6 in three covered wagons. With minor exceptions, the wagons are replicas of the Conestoga wagon used by the "forty-niners" in crossing the plains and mountains to California over 100 years ago. However, the wagons are equipped with gas stove and air mattresses. Rev. Peyton became a minister at the age of 18 and has been in Hinton since 1930 working continuously in the ministry. Mail Early Campaign For Christmas Season

Acting Postmaster Eva White said today, "Christmas may seem quite a way off, but nevertheless, we're starting our annual 'Mail Early For Christmas' Campaign immediately, because there's every indication that the 1958 Christmas season will set an all time mailing record." The Postmaster said further that right now is the time to plan your Christmas card and gift mailings. The first thing to do is to check your Christmas card list very carefully—make sure that each address particularly on mail to larger cities includes full name, street and number, city, zone and state. She went on to say that by a little advance planning, a lot of lead ache can be avoided when the Christmas rush is on. The Postmaster suggests stacking up on heavy paper, sturdy corrugated cartons, strong cord, and paper.

Use adhesive tape, for use in securely packing and wrapping your Christmas gifts. Remember, she said, that you can include your Christmas card or letter inside your gift package if you'll just add the appropriate First Class mail stamps to the postage for the package itself. "Be sure to use only First Class four cent, or seven cent Air Mail postage on Christmas cards," Mrs. White said. All cards sent by First Class mail may include a personal handwritten message, whereas a signature only is authorized on cards that are mailed at the three cent, Third Class rate. The Postmaster says it's especially important to include your return address on every Christmas card envelope. Besides being socially correct, this is a big help to both you and your friends in locating your mailing lists up-to-date. (Continued on Page Four)

## Grain Production Gains Over 100 Million Bushels

**COLLEGE STATION**—Grain sorghum has taken a place of prominence in Texas agriculture. Annual grain sorghum production in Texas has been more than 100 million bushels five times since 1949 with a maximum production of 238 million bushels in 1957. The average annual monetary value of the crop in Texas since 1949 has been 130 million dollars and it is the second crop in Texas in money value, being exceeded only by cotton. Sorghum as a grain crop in the United States is exceeded in production only by wheat and corn. As a world food grain, sorghum ranks third behind rice and wheat. The chief use for sorghum grain in the U. S. is feed for poultry,

cattle, sheep and swine. The grain, which contains 12 percent protein, 3 percent fat and 70 percent carbohydrates, compares favorably with corn as a feed grain. The starch from the grain can be used for food products, adhesives and sizing for paper and fabrics. Sorghum is grown for grain on substantial acreage in about 135 Texas counties. Cultural practices are similar to those required by other row crops such as cotton and corn. The method of seedbed preparation and later cultivation depends largely on the soil, climate and kind of equipment available. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has released a bulletin entitled "Grain Sorghum Production in Texas." This 35-page publication contains discussions on practically every phase of grain sorghum production. It may be obtained from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. Ask for Bulletin 912.

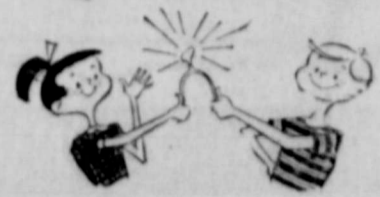

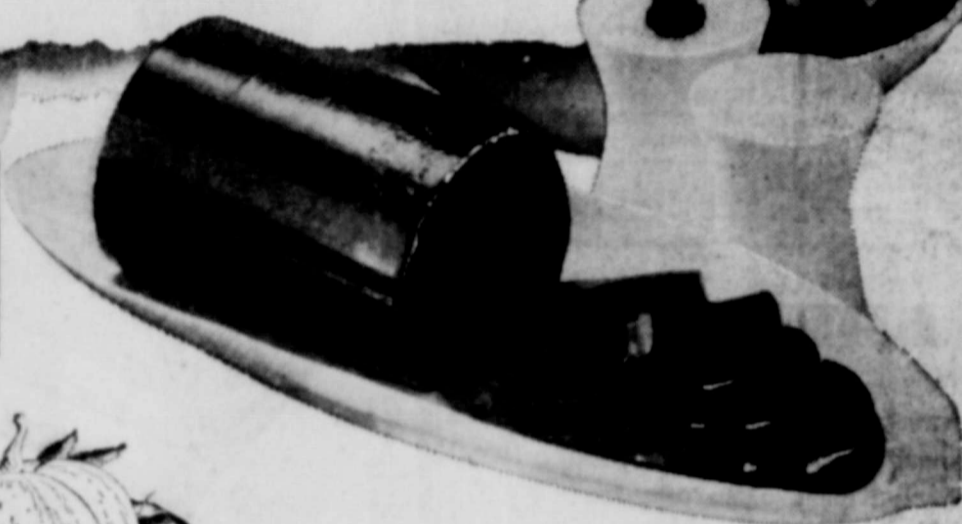

### Debeak Poultry To Prevent Cannibalism

COLLEGE STATION — Even in the best of poultry families, a bad actor may develop. And once the cannibalistic habit is acquired, there's trouble ahead unless the delinquent is given immediate attention, says Ben Wormell, extension poultry husbandman.

There are several things which may cause feather-picking or cannibalism in a poultry flock. Limited feeding and watering space, crowding, lack of proper ventilation, irritation caused by lice or mites or the energy level of the diet and the form in which it is fed, may all be factors in causing the trouble.

At this season when pullets are being housed, a careful watch for feather-pickers or for those being attacked should be kept, advise the specialist. There are some management practices which will tend to keep the trouble at a minimum and these are listed by Wormell as a comfortable, well-ventilated house; plenty of well distributed feed and water space; no external parasites; feeding diets higher in fiber, and the feeding of mash instead of an all-pellet ration.

The surest way to combat the trouble is to debeak the birds. Wormell suggests that the local county agent be contacted for details on carrying out this operation.

**IT'S THE LAW in Texas**  
A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

Possibly the most mystifying of all traffic rules to the average driver are those relating to "Right of Way" at an intersection. In reality, however, these rules are quite simple. In trying to understand the laws regulating intersecting traffic, it is best to start off with the premise that all streets are of equal dignity, legally speaking. Traffic signs and signals may vary this rule somewhat, but when in doubt it is safer to assume that all drivers crossing your path have a claim to the right of way equal to your own.

Obviously, however, in many cases one driver or the other will be legally entitled to the right of way. When it becomes necessary to determine right of way in a particular situation, the driver who reaches the intersection first, or who is going to get there first, is ordinarily favored.

But when two automobiles are an equal distance from the intersection, that one approaching from the other driver's right normally has the right of way.

Some intersections are known as "courtesy corners," having a stop sign or a flashing red signal facing each direction of approach. The first driver reaching the corner and coming to a complete stop will normally have the right of way over other vehicles not already in the intersection. However, don't depend too much on the other fellow's courtesy, and be sure to keep a "proper lookout" and your car under "proper control," as explained in a earlier column.

At intersections involving one through street and another street having a stop sign and coming to a full stop is ordinarily said to have the right of way over vehicles approaching on the through street but not already in the intersection.

However, this last rule must be qualified by saying that you should not proceed, cross or turn onto the through street until you can do so without interfering with oncoming traffic. In other words, if an approaching car will arrive within the intersection before you are completely clear, wait just a little longer. The same rules apply to entering a highway from a side road containing a stop sign.

Many drivers violate the rule of right of way covering left-hand turns at intersections. When turning left, you should always be on the inside (or center) lane, displaying the proper hand signal. You must allow all cars coming from the opposite direction, already in the intersection, to pass through before completing your turn. Even when the intersection is cleared, do not proceed unless other oncoming traffic is far enough away to be able to see your

signal and slow down to allow you to turn with safety to the left.

Stay in the inside lane until your left-hand turn is safely completed, and only then gradually over to the right-hand lane if you wish. When turning right, stay in the right-hand lane at all times. Do not swing wide into the center lane, as to do so is unnecessary, unlawful and dangerous.

Many detailed rules and suggestions for safe driving are included in the official "Texas Driving Handbook" which is available to any person requesting same from the Department of Public Safety, Drivers License Division, Austin, Texas.
