## Texas Railroads Bring Big Industry to State

AUSTIN — Businessmen with plants valued at \$1,182,124,100 (billion) initially employing 56,974 people were brought into Texas by the railroads of the state during the 5-year period 1953-57. The companies totaled 2,646. Many of the businesses have since expanded to employ several thousands of additional workers. Industrial Development Departments of fourteen railroads participated in the intensive and continuing drive to bring industry to the Lone Star State, it was reported to the Texas Railroad Association.

Plants ranged from small ones employing only a handful of people to huge industrial facilities which started with a thousand or more persons on their payrolls. The huge benefit to the Texas economy of plants located through railroad efforts in salaries and purchases of supplies and raw materials is impossible to estimate, according to economists. Efforts of the railroads to enrich the economy of Texas started nearly 100 years ago and have never abated, leaders of the industry point out. The drive reached its highest point of productivity between 1953-57 and continues at an accelerated pace.

The railroad men who worked for the advancement of the Lone Star State as far back as the early 1870's were called industrial agents even at that early date. The principal objectives in the early days long before the turn of the Twentieth Century was to entice homeseekers to settle in the frontier land which was Texas. The need, then, was people, homesteaders for Texas.

Along with getting settlers to locate, the railroad agents also promoted industry to the extent of small businesses such as grocery and notion stores, livery stables and lumber yards. Quite a contrast with the present when obtaining for Texas a 1,000 - employee manufacturing plant is not uncommon! Texas railroads maintain effective Industrial Development Departments to provide expert and professional assistance to companies seeking industrial locations. Industrial workers are at all levels.

## Roughage Will Increase Milk

COLLEGE STATION, — Increased milk profits may be received by feeding dairy cows all the good roughage they will eat, says A. M. Meekma, extension dairy husbandman. This is true because nutrients in roughage cost less than nutrients in other forms, Meekma adds. He points out that a cow on pasture will give more milk if she receives supplementary feed, but the amount of supplement needed depends on the quality of pasture she is grazing and the quality of other roughage she receives, such as hay or silage.

So far an economical dairy ration, Meekma advises beginning with high-quality pasture or other roughage and adding concentrates which give the most protein value for the least money. Naturally the type of concentrate used will depend on the type which is most plentiful in the operator's particular locality. The husbandman suggests contacting the local county agent for more advice on how to produce and preserve high-quality roughage and on which concentrates to feed with the roughage to make the most economical ration. He reminds that any decrease in the feed bill is an increase in net profit.

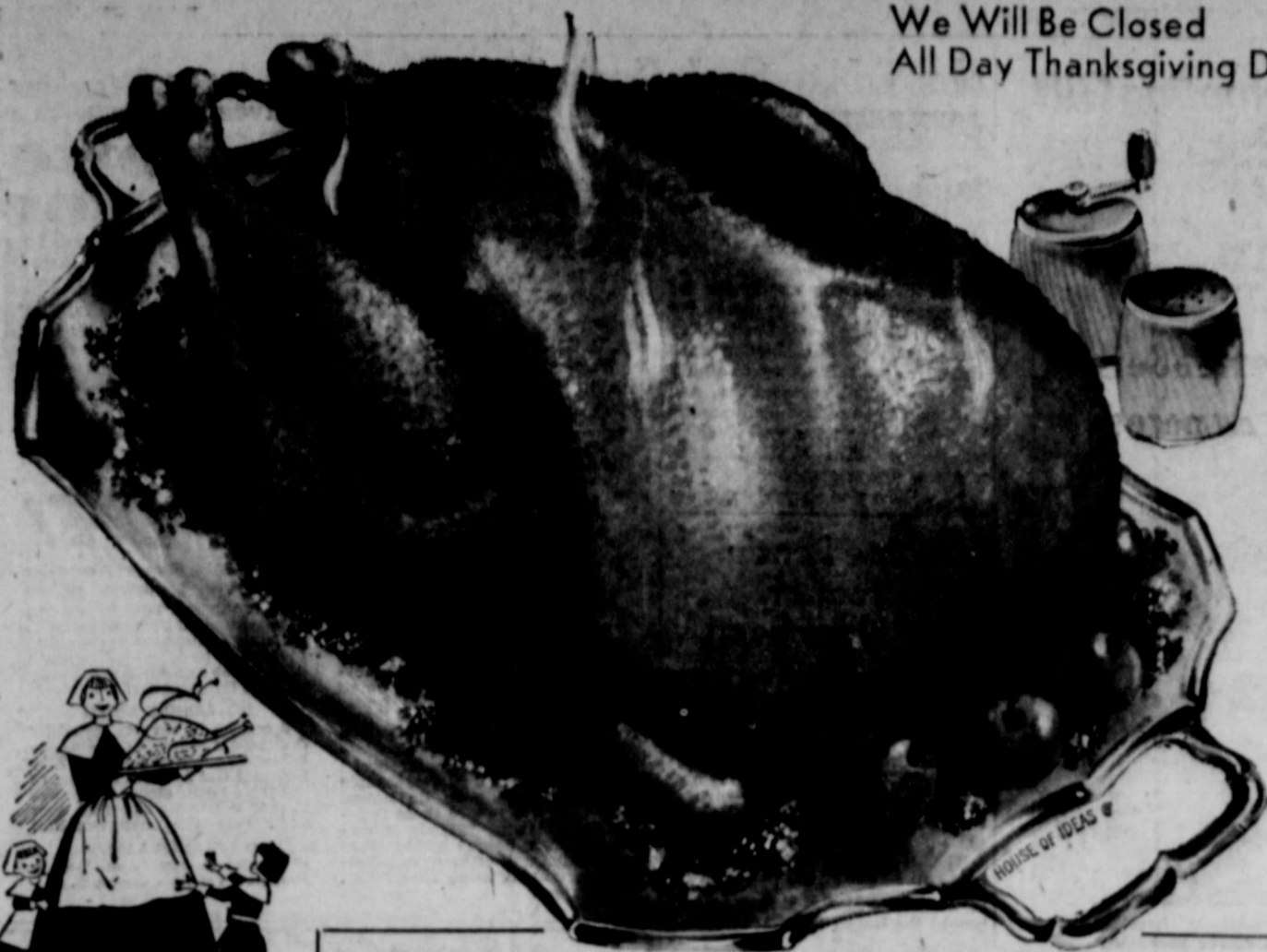

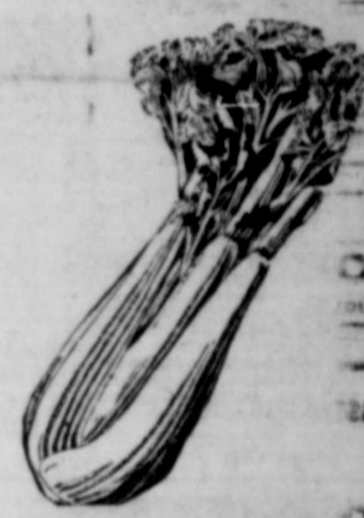

### Homemade Chocolate Candy Is Tempting Gift

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

Nearly everybody likes to receive homemade chocolate candies—particularly when they are brightly and cleverly packaged. Here are recipes using semi-sweet chocolate morsels, ideal for delicious and attractive-looking candies.

#### EASY HOLIDAY FUDGE

(Basic recipe. About 1 1/2 pounds)

Two 6-ounce or one 12-ounce jumbo package (2 cups) semi-sweet chocolate morsels, 3/4 cup sweetened, condensed milk, 1 tablespoon water, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Melt semi-sweet chocolate morsels over hot—not boiling—water. Remove from heat. Combine condensed milk, water and vanilla. Add to chocolate; stir until smooth and satiny. Do not heat.

Spread in greased, 10x5x3-inch pan, or drop by teaspoonfuls on waxed paper-lined cookie sheet. Chill until firm.

#### VARIATIONS

**Fudge Rounds:** Chill until firm enough to handle. Form in balls. Roll in sugar, either plain or flavored with cinnamon or quick chocolate flavored mix.

**Sugar Plums:** Chill until firm enough to handle. Form in balls. Insert a blanched almond in each "plum," wide-end up.

#### NUT-MALLOW FUDGE

(About 1 1/2 pounds)

Three-quarters pound (48) marshmallows, 1/4 cup butter or margarine, 1 tablespoon water, 1/2 teaspoon salt, one 6-ounce package (1 cup) semi-sweet chocolate morsels, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup chopped nuts (optional).

Combine marshmallows, but-

ter or margarine, water and salt. Bring to boil over medium heat, stirring constantly.

Boil one minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat.

Add semi-sweet chocolate morsels, vanilla and nuts; stir until smooth.

Pour into greased pan, 10x5x3-

inches. Chill until firm.

Suggestions for packaging: Use a decorative skillet that will make a wall plaque later; a "dustpan" that is really a wall plant holder; a divided dish, and a handsome basket with your confections, swathed in cellophane.

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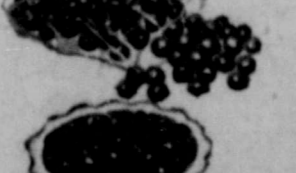

Under the old law, the mother of a child adopted by her deceased husband could not get widow's benefits if their marriage had not been in effect for at least a year before his death.

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

One of the most romantic places in Richmond is the Wickham-Valentine house. It is a two-story brick mansion built in 1812 for a lawyer who was the chief attorney for Aaron Burr when he was tried for treason.

There is a spiraling stairway with no visible means of support. Chunks of wood were crackling and blazing in a fireplace although it was June—in order to give this added touch of authenticity to the scene.

Furniture of long ago fills the rooms, showing how the people lived—the aristocracy, anyway.

It was in 1803 and, on the wall, was his portrait, painted while he was in the city. The handsome son of Irish wrote the words and music of "Irish Melodies"; furthermore, he sang and provided his own accompaniment. Perhaps he had played on this very instrument—and even perhaps from this copy of his songs. It was pleasing to think so.

"This is Hollywood Cemetery," the guide said. I was startled—and displeased,

low, that a city as rich as Richmond should have a name that stands for glitter, tinsel and make-believe.

"Jefferson Davis and presidents of the United States are buried here," he continued.

And then I realized that this was an old cemetery, named long before there was a Hollywood in California, and named for the same reason: the presence of a group of holly trees.

The cemetery was dedicated in 1849, coincidentally the year of the gold rush to California.

Sleeping there are Monroe, Tyler, Commodore Matthew Fenton Maury, the fiery John Randolph of Roanoke and many Confederate officers.

"That is Fickett's grave", the guide said, indicating a pyramid of gray rocks. "A life-terminer gained his freedom by volunteering to put the top stone in place."

Monument Avenue is a vista of beauty, long lines of trees adorning the boulevard, making an impressive background for the statues of J.E.B. Stuart, Lee (on Traveller), Davis, Stonewall Jackson and Maury. Those who died in battle look northward, their faces to the foe; those who died after the war look south, to the land for which they fought.

Quota Penalties To be Determined In Referendum

How farmers vote in the cotton marketing quota referendum to be held throughout the Nation's cotton-growing area on Dec. 15 will determine whether quota penalties will apply, the kind of allotment program in effect, and also the level of price support for 1959 crop cotton.

The referendum therefore is of vital concern to every cotton grower, says Searcy M. Ferguson, Chairman of the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The marketing quota program will be in operation for next year's crop, the chairman explains, if at least two-thirds of the votes cast in the referendum are in favor of the program. In that case, farm operators will have an opportunity to elect a choice between (A) complying with their "regular" farm allotments — with price support available at not less than 80 percent of parity for the 1959 crop of upland cotton, or (B) complying with an increased farm allotment 40 percent larger than the

"regular" farm allotment — with support at a level 15 percent of parity lower than under the first choice; quota penalties will apply to any cotton produced in excess of the chosen allotment.

If more than one-third of the votes are against quotas, there would be no quota penalties, only the "regular" allotments would be available, and the price support level to eligible growers would drop to 80 percent of parity.

All farmers who were engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1958 will be eligible to vote in the referendum.

The referendum will be held between the hours of 8 a. m. and 6 p. m. on Monday, Dec. 15.

4-H Clubs Aim For Better Care Of Farm Tractors

Letter case and maintenance for farm tractors is being emphasized by the 4-H tractor program which gets underway in the state next week. We have designed the program this year to reach more people in the areas where farm tractors are most numerous by doubling the number of training schools for adult 4-H club leaders, said W. L. Ulich, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

He said 30 training schools would be held to train local 4-H adult leaders in such fields as safety, the importance of kinds and uses of lubricants and the proper maintenance of cooling, ignition and fuel systems of farm tractors. The leaders in turn will instruct 4-H members in the communities and counties.

"This is a care and not a repair program," Ulich emphasized. It has been proved that much of the money spent for tractor repairs could be saved if operators would follow a well-planned maintenance program.

Primary objectives of the program are to provide increasing opportunities for adult leaders and 4-H club members to learn to operate and care for tractors, skillfully, safely, and economically, and to share their knowledge with other club members and tractor owners and at the same time develop their leadership and citizenship abilities. The program is nationwide and its sponsors provide awards on the county, state and national levels for outstanding achievement.

In Texas the 4-H tractor program is sponsored cooperatively by the Humble Oil and Refining Co; the National Committee on Peps and Girls Club Work, Inc., Chicago and the Agriculture Extension Service with assistance from the machinery industry of the State.

Breeding Program Determines Beef Producer's Success

College Station.—The success of a beef cattle producer may well be determined by the success of his breeding program.

The practice of mating outstanding bulls with outstanding cows of many bloodlines to establish our present beef breeds, is still the best method of improving beef cattle. Use of production information, such as regularity of calving, weaning weight, gaining ability, conformation, finish and carcass information, makes it possible for a breeder to select animals that are: (1) outstanding producers, (2) will develop into outstanding

producers or (3) select matings that should result in animals capable of outstanding production.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has released two bulletins that can be very helpful to anyone desiring information and advice on developing an aggressive breeding program. The bulletins are B-993, "Breeding Programs for Commercial Beef Herds", and B-999, "Breeding Programs for Registered Beef

These publications discuss selection of cows, selection of bulls, evaluation of calves and yearlings and other related topics. They are available from local county agents or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

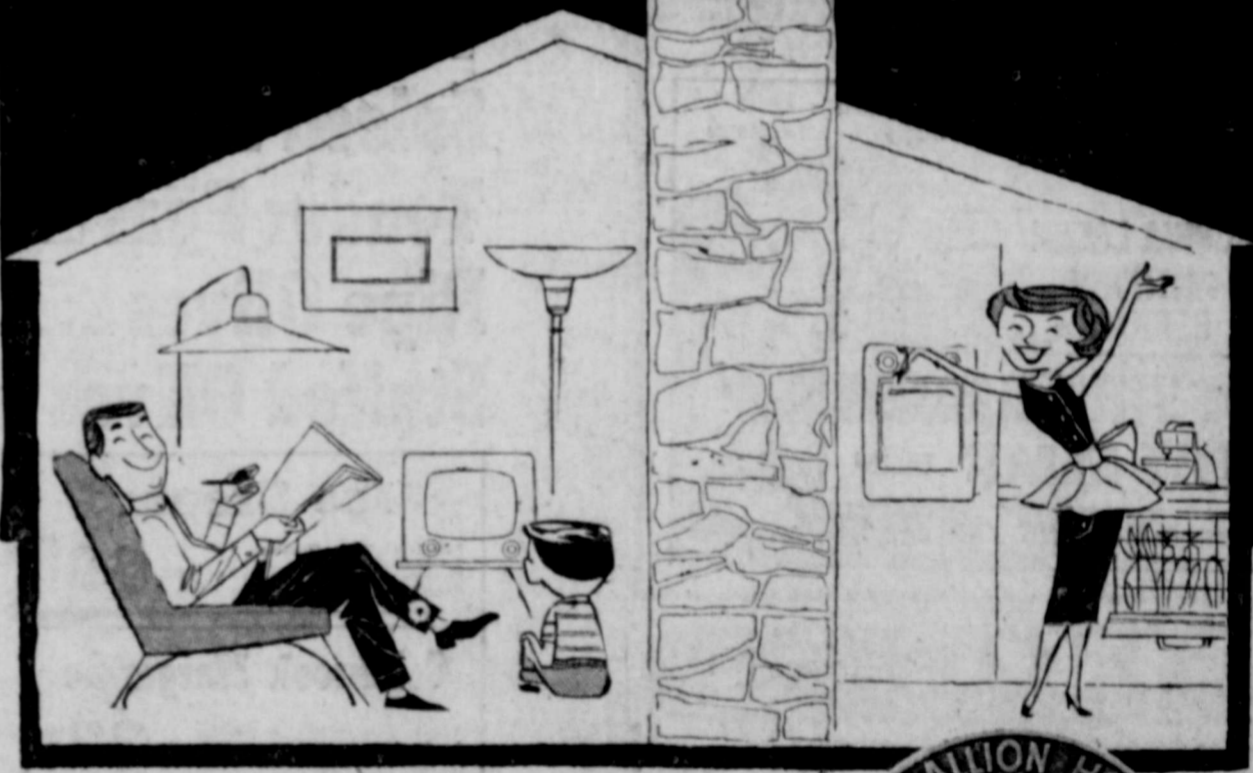
