



Homemade Chocolate Candy Is Tempting Gift

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

Nearly everybody likes to receive homemade chocolate candies-particularly when they are brightly and cleverly packaged. Here are recipes using semisweet chocolate morsels, ideal for delicious and attractive-looking candies

EASY HOLIDAY FUDGE

(Basic recipe. About 11/4 pounds) Two 6-ounce or one 12-ounce jumbo package (2 cups) semisweet chocolate morsels, % cup sweetened, condensed milk, 1 tablespoon water, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Melt semisweet chocolate morsels over hot-not boiling-wa-Remove from heat. Combine condensed milk, water and vanilla. Add to cholocate; until smooth and satiny. Do not beat.

Spread in greased, 10x5x3-inch pail, or drop by teaspoonfuls on waxed paper-lined cookie sheet. Chill until firm.




