And whereas both Houses of Congress have, by their joint Committee, requested me 'To recommend to the People of the UNITED STATES, a Day of PUBLIC THANKSGIVING and PRAYER, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful Hearts the many Signal Favours of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity seasonably to establish a Form of Government for their Safety and Happiness."  
"Now, THEREFORE, I do recommend and assign THURSDAY the Twenty-sixth Day of November next, to be devoted by the People of these States, to the Service of that great and glorious Being, who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be: That we may then all unite in rendering unto him our sincere and humble thanks for his kind Care and Protection of the People of this Country previous to their becoming a Nation—George Washington."  
These are more to this proclamation, but that was enough to give me a good idea of the style of writing in those days.

#### Telephone Co. Offers Tri-Cities Exchange

In answer to demands of citizens and civic leaders in the tri-city area, a plan has been presented to permit calling between Ranger and Eastland without long distance telephone charges.  
The Extended Area Service plan was submitted to city councils in Ranger, Eastland and Cisco by W. H. McAnally, manager, and B. H. Bass, district manager, of a Southwestern Bell Telephone Co.  
The plan also calls for elimination of long distance charges on telephone calls between Cisco and Eastland, long distance rates for calls between Ranger and Cisco would not be changed.  
"In making our Extended Area Service studies, we found the 'longy' calling was between Ranger and Eastland and between Cisco and Eastland," McAnally said.  
"We feel the plan we have submitted is the only economical method of providing the service people of this area have requested," he added.  
At present, long distance rates between Ranger and Eastland are 35c for a three-minute person-to-person call and 15c for a three-minute station-to-station call.  
The cost of providing Extended Area Service, which would eliminate these long distance charges, would be the same in Ranger and Cisco: \$4.50 for two-party line; \$5.75 for a residence one-party telephone; \$11.25 for business service; \$4.25 for rural residence and \$8.25 for rural business. These rates would be subject to the 10 per cent Federal tax which the telephone company is required by law to collect.  
Dial telephone rates, to become effective at the time Ranger is converted from manual operation, were approved sometime ago. These rates are \$9 for business service; \$5 for private line residence and \$4 for two-party service.  
This means Ranger and Cisco two-party residence service would increase 50c monthly; one-party residence would increase 75c, and business service would go up \$2.25 per month.  
"This is a small increase in relation to the value of Extended Area Service, which would more than double the number of tele-

#### First Place Pecans Will Go To State Show

All first place entries in the Sixth Annual Eastland County Pecan Show to be held in Ranger on Dec. 12-13 will be sent to Texas A & M College for the state show. It was reported today by show officials.  
Twenty different varieties of papershell or improved pecans are expected to be entered in the show, according to Oscar Schaefer, Cook Community, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, whose organization together with the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, are co-sponsors of the annual affair.  
There is expected to be a large number of native seedling nuts, of both named and unnamed varieties, entered in the two-day show to be held in the Joseph building in Ranger.  
A quart of pecans constitutes an entry. Growers from Eastland and adjoining counties are invited to have exhibits of nuts in the show.  
Varieties of nuts with less than three entries will be judged and ribbons awarded, but no cash prize will be paid. Cash premiums to the extent of \$1 for first place and 75c for second place will be paid where more than three entries are exhibited.  
Over 250 entries were in the 1957 show held at Cisco and it is expected that the show this year will equal or better the total number of entries.

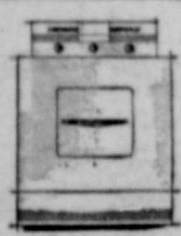

can operate at a reasonable profit and provide Extended Area Service," McAnally said.  
Extended Area Service simply means that a Ranger customer could call Eastland in the same manner

he now calls a neighbor across the street. And he could be called by anyone with a telephone in Eastland.  
Ranger telephone users can now call about 1,500 telephones without paying a long distance charge. Under the proposed plan, a Ranger customer could call some 3,450 telephones without paying a long distance charge.

"This, of course, would make telephone service here even more valuable. It would mean Ranger customers could call and be called by more people," McAnally said.  
"Extended Area Service would serve to tie the tri-city area together. It would mean a larger market and promote growth of the entire area," he added.

The City Councils in the three towns have been requested to make a decision on the plan within the next 60 days.  
"A quick decision is needed in order that additional equipment needed for Extended Area Service can be engineered and installed at the same time new equipment is installed to change Ranger and Eastland from manual to dial service."

"Adding the necessary additional equipment at the time dial equipment is being installed helps keep costs down, and this in turn helps keep rates down. The rates submitted are based on the plan that Extended Area Service can be coordinated with these two dial conversions," he said.

"If the three cities decide they want this service within the next 60 days, we feel that we can have the new service in operation in about 18 months," he continued.  
"Significant amounts of additional central office switching equipment and lines between the cities is necessary to handle the increased volume of calls which will follow the elimination of long distance charges," McAnally pointed out. "This, of course, will make it necessary for us to greatly increase our investment in this area."

**Pilgrims Would Be Shocked If They Know Thanksgiving Day Is Honored**

The Pilgrims would have been shocked to their shoe buckles on Dec. 12, 1621, if they had known that their day of thanks was to become a yearly national holiday celebrated by millions of people in the United States and Canada.

For the Pilgrims were denied that "annual" holidays, and refused to celebrate Christmas and Easter.

According to research experts with The World Book Encyclopedia, the Pilgrims referred to the religious holidays of the Church of England as "Roman corruptions." They believed in celebrating only when Providence granted them a particular blessing.

As if to prove their disdain for yearly, calendar-fixed celebrations, the Pilgrims did not have a thanksgiving celebration the next year. However, other New England colonists picked up the idea and held "thanks days," usually around the end of November.

The Pilgrim-inspired holiday is today a joyous family day celebrated with big dinners and happy reunions, but the history of the holiday in the United States has been fraught with argument.

In 1789 a resolution was presented by a member of the Congress proposing that a day be set aside to give thanks for the Constitution. The resolution was finally adopted, but there was much opposition from those who believed the Federal Government was meddling in a matter that should be the concern of the individual states. Thomas Jefferson called such a Government proclamation non-sensical "Monarchical practice" and ignored thanksgiving during his eight years in office.

Mrs. Sarah Hale, editor of Good Housekeeping, worked for 30 years to promote the idea of a national thanksgiving day. Mrs. Hale had a double-barreled attack—she printed editorials promoting the idea and also included tempting recipes for Thanksgiving delicacies.

In 1863 Lincoln proclaimed that the last Thursday in November would be Thanksgiving Day. Each year afterward, the President of the United States formally proclaimed that Thanksgiving should be celebrated on the last Thursday of November.

However, some descendants of the original New England Puritans refused to observe the holiday, claiming that Thanksgiving should be inspired by the Deity, not by politicians.

The most recent Thanksgiving controversy arose when Franklin D. Roosevelt switched the date of the holiday from the fourth to the third Thursday in November. He hoped to help business by making the shopping period longer between Christmas and Thanksgiving.

Newspapers and magazines carried editorials advising readers to ignore the President and some
