CHRISTMAS SEASON — is here, with only 20 shopping days left. One of the largest crowds of people in years was downtown Saturday to see the arrival of Santa Claus in a helicopter. A huge line formed at the City Hall for the passing out of candy.

In the finals — it'll be Terrell and Brady, with the state championship in AA going to Terrell.

College Women Attend Meeting

Mrs. James P. Morris and Mrs. R. A. Jameson were in Fort Worth Friday, Nov. 28, to attend a joint luncheon meeting of the Texas Personnel and Guidance Association and the Texas Association of Women Deans and Counselors at the Texas Hotel.

The principal speaker was Dr. A. Q. Sartin, chairman of the Department of Personnel Administration of Southern Methodist University, who spoke on "Working Effectively with People."

Approximately 75 deans of women and counselors from junior and senior colleges and city high schools attended the meeting. Mrs. Morris is Dean of Women of Ranger College and Mrs. Jameson is Girls' Counselor.

Six Poison Bait Stations Set Up Throughout Area

Rats are suspicious animals and approach unfamiliar objects with caution says John Love who lives in the Cheaney Community and is president of the Farm Bureau, the organization sponsoring a rodent campaign over the county.

"For this reason bait should be placed behind a box, board, bale of hay or other object," Love says.

The material should also be placed near the wall. This provides a sense of security.

"The Fumarin in the bait material of cornmeal, rolled oats, powdered sugar and peanut oil is an anti-coagulant similar to Warfarin. The material causes a thinning of the blood with eventually a continuing hemorrhage that results in death.

"Mice are not as suspicious as rats and will eat a great variety of food and objects."

Love suggests that where mice are a problem in the residence that a few pounds of material be placed at various points under the house if it is at all possible.

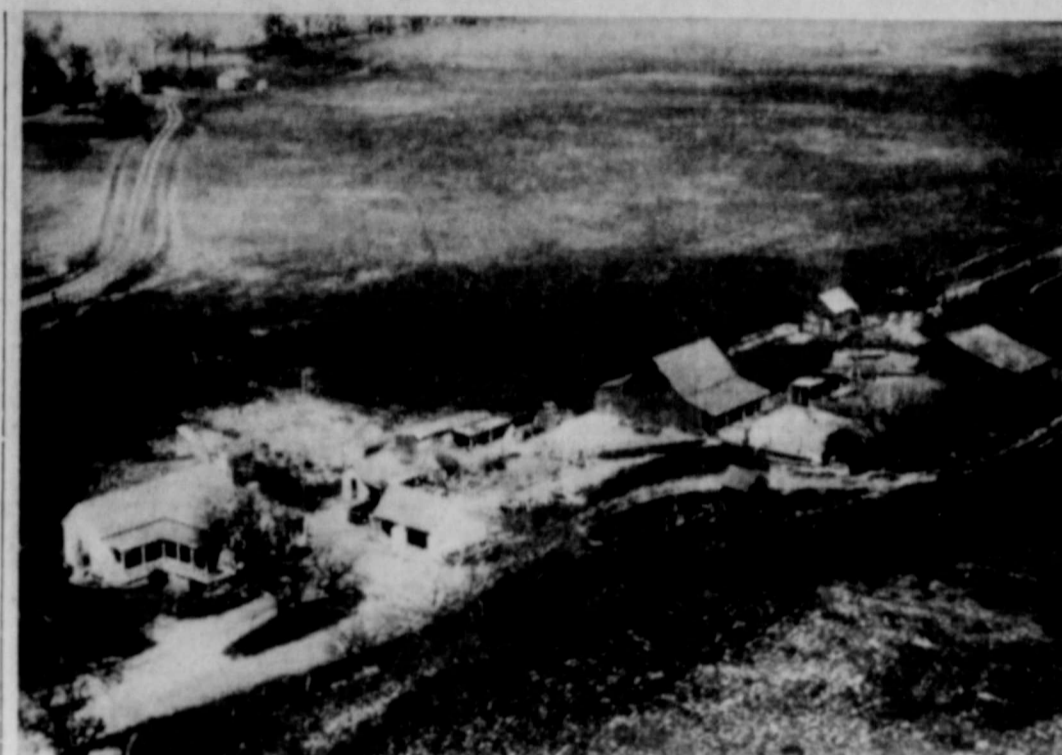
The Farm Bureau has set up bait stations at the Perkins Implement Co. in Eastland; Cisco Locker Plant; Herman Schaefer's farm near Nimrod; the J. D. Caldwell farm just south of the Frank Gray Memorial Park near Gorman; the Arthur Wright farm southwest of Long Branch, and at Love's place in the Cheaney Community. The initial shipment of 1,000 pounds will be replaced as soon as it is gone. Other bait stations will be set up soon and will be continued as long as necessary, Love said.

Christmas Leave Policy Announced

Those who enlist in the U. S. Army can spend the Christmas holidays at home. The U. S. Army has announced this Christmas leave policy for young men who enlist or re-enlist in the Regular Army during the period of Dec. 12 to Jan. 1, according to SFC G. H. Barnes.

Enlistees may request sufficient leave time to spend the Christmas holidays at home before reporting to their basic training center. In some instances this leave may extend past New Year's Day.

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AUSTIN — Shooting from automobiles constituted the major game offense during October, according to the monthly report of the director of law enforcement of the Game & Fish Commission. There were 69 fishermen arrested for not having licenses.

Among other violations there were 34 for killing doves during closed season and 33 for exceeding the bag limit on doves.

There were 23 who jumped the season on quail, and 26 caught hunting with unplugged guns. Headlight hunters also accounted for 25 arrests.

In all there were 457 persons arrested. They paid fines and court costs amounting to \$10,956.87. Five persons also served jail terms.

Ranger College Rangers, who finished up the season in second place in the conference standings, placed three men on the All-Texas Junior College Athletic Conference team selected by the conference coaches in a Dallas meeting held at the Baker Hotel Friday.

Ranger also placed three other players on the second team and made three honorable mentions. Coaches David Slaughter and Jim Puryear were among the group casting their vote in Dallas. None of the coaches could vote for their own players.

Henderson County Cardinals, who fell victims to the Rangers but came in first place with Navarro, placed four men on the first team, three on the second team and gained five honorable mentions.

Navarro placed three men on the first team, three on the second team and gained two honorable mentions.

Blinn Junior College, which finished the Rangers 9-0 had two men on the first team, one on the second team and five on the honorable mention list. Blinn came in third in conference standings.

Cisco Junior College, last in the conference, placed one man on the second team and two honorable mentions.

George "Boaz" Boynton, who has been named for the Third Annual National Junior College All-American All-Star Squad of 1958, made the first team half-back position. Two other halfbacks were named in the five-man backfield. Boynton has been nominated three times this season as the back of the week.

Jerry Blakely drew the full-back position. He has also been outstanding in the Ranger backfield this season. James Stanford, a consistently strong lineman, placed at the guard position on the first team.

Jim Clark, who has played most of this season at the slot position, was named as an outstanding end on the second team. Tackle Wiley Wyman, out for several games with injuries, also placed with Charles Duggan.

Miss Nancy Ann Roberts Becomes Bride of Richard Bumpass Friday

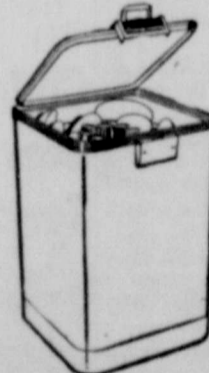

 county laws, apply to mink, beaver and muskrats. Mink may be taken Nov. 15 through Jan. 15, and they may not be hunted with dogs. Muskrats may be taken Nov. 15 through March 15 with traps only, except by person on their own premises at any time and by any means.
 Fur trappers and buyers are required to have special licenses. A resident trapper's license costs \$1; a nonresident trapper's license is \$200. There is a \$50 fee to trap beaver and otter outside the county of residence. Permits for "live sale or propagation" cost \$5. Buyer's licenses are \$5 for retail and \$25 for wholesale buyers.
