

Boynton Is Named An All-American Player

George "Buzz" Boynton has been named for the Third Annual National Junior College All-American All-Star Squad of 1958 at the halfback position.
He is the first football player at Ranger College to make All-American and to play in the East-West All Star Football Game to be played in Memorial Stadium at Stockton, Calif., on Saturday, Dec. 20. Boynton has accepted and said, "I'm really honored. It's the biggest honor I've had in my life."
Dr. Price Ashton, College President, said, "It's pretty wonder-

ful for the boy and it's certainly wonderful for the school."
Head Coach David Slaughter commented, "As far as we're concerned, he's definitely an All-American for us." Coach Jim Puryear added, "It's a fine honor for the boy and the school."

Nation-wide publicity will be given to the halfback, who is a standout on the football field and a popular student at the college.
Boynton is vice-president of the Sophomore Class, president of the "E" Association recently organized for lettermen, and a two-year letterman in basketball and foot-



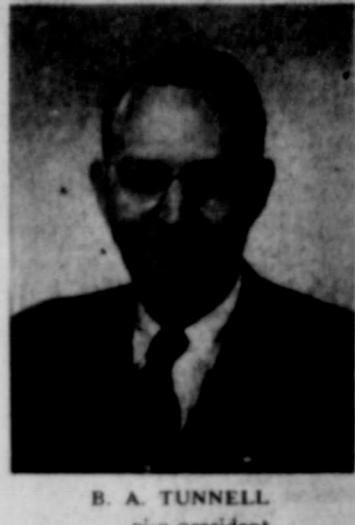

He said that 19 assignments had previously been made for the show, that signs had been placed on Main St. and the Joseph Building advertising the show, and that the building has been cleaned in preparation for the event.
Galloway reported that the largest crowd in 12 years turned out for Santa's landing here by helicopter Saturday and that more candy was given away than ever before.

In Eastland, entries may be made at Cooper's office on the second floor of the courthouse. They may be left at the Chamber of Commerce office in Ranger.
A copy of the rules and regulations of the show is enclosed with each letter.

All pecans entered in the Sixth Annual Eastland County Pecan Show at Ranger, Dec. 12-13, must be grown by the person entering them, according to officials.

The show to be held in the Joseph Building is being sponsored by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association.
Growers of both native seedlings and paper-shell or improved varieties of one or more trees are invited to exhibit their pecans. A quart of pecans constitute enough for an entry. The owner gets them back at the end of the show unless they win first place in their division, in which case they are sent to the state pecan show held each year at Texas A & M.

Entries are accepted on only from Eastland County but from adjoining counties. The grand champion entry at the 1957 show was of the Mahan variety. It was entered by a grower near DeLeon and it was the first time an entry of Mahans had won the grand championship.

Entries are accepted in the show as late as 9 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 13th, the day they are judged by

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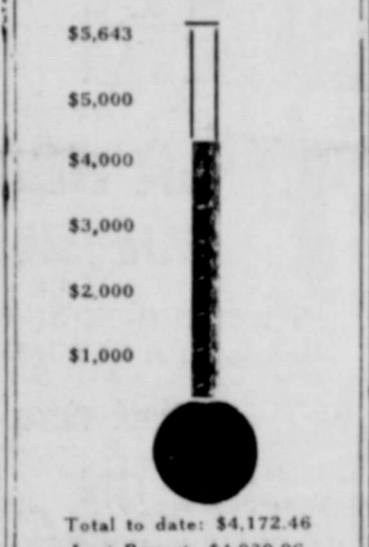
Community Chest Drive Extended

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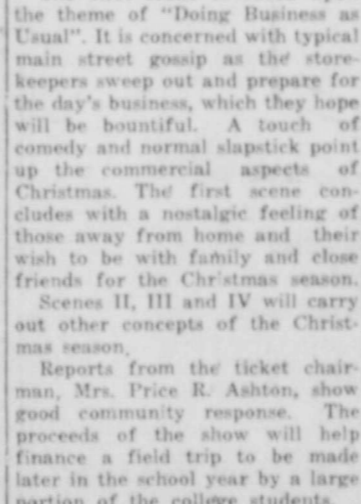
Teacher of the Week

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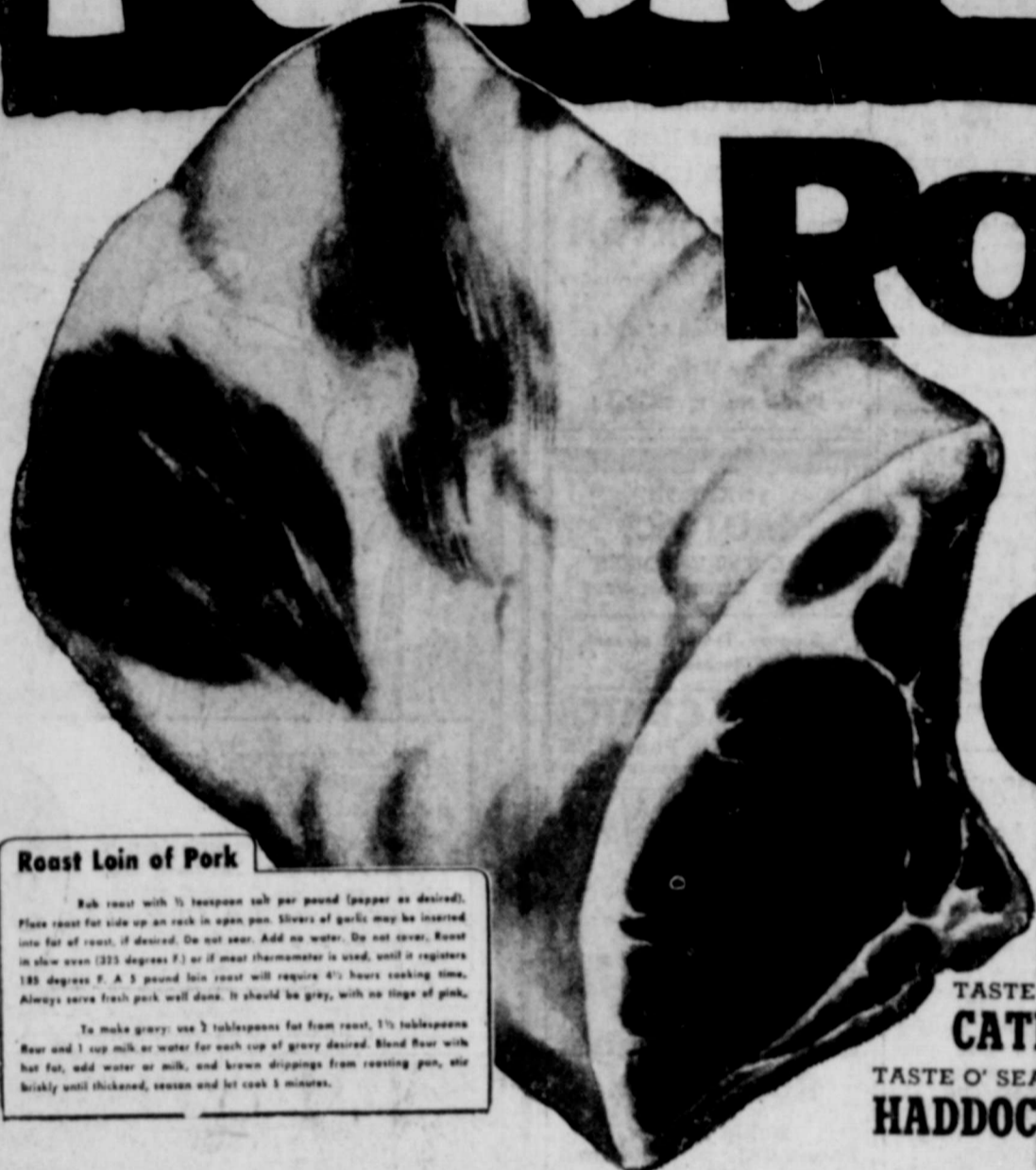
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Roast Loin of Pork
 Rub roast with 1/2 teaspoon salt per pound (pepper as desired). Place roast fat side up on rack in roasting pan. Slices of garlic may be inserted one inch apart. If desired, the roast may be broiled. Broil in shallow pan (225 degrees F.) or if meat thermometer is used, until it registers 180 degrees F. A 5 pound loin roast will require 4 1/2 hours roasting time. Always serve fresh pork well done. It should be gray, with no trace of pink.
 To make gravy: use 2 tablespoons fat from roast, 1/2 tablespoon flour and 1 cup milk or water for each cup of gravy desired. Blend flour with hot fat, add water or milk, and brown drippings from roasting pan, stir briskly until thickened, season and let cook 5 minutes.

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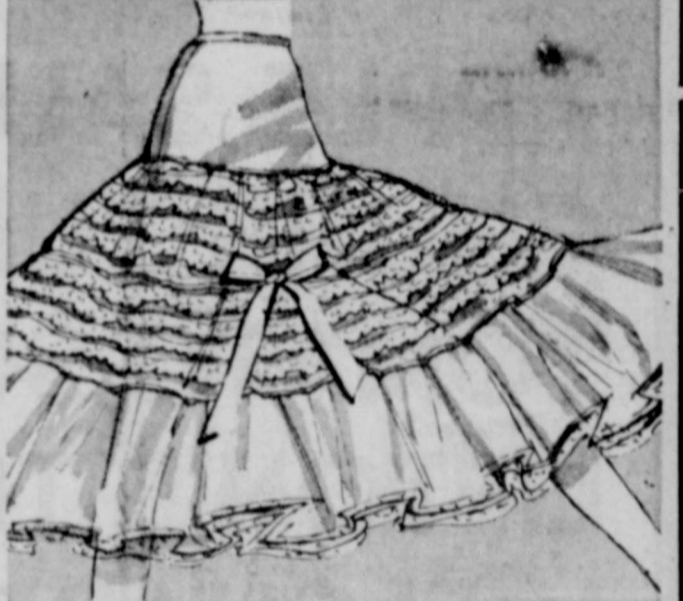

Voluntary Home Mortgage Program Assists Families

The Voluntary Home Mortgage Credit Program has demonstrated its ability to assist the low and medium income families in small towns to obtain FHA financing.

The Program statistics reveal that a very high percent of the loans placed were for persons in the \$2500 to \$5000 per year income group. The majority of loans were for purchase of home in the \$7000 to \$9000 price range.

These figures were furnished by C. J. Hermann, Executive Secretary of VHMCP, Region IV, which comprises the states of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Louisiana, Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas. The Regional Office is located at 1114 Commerce Street, Dallas.

"At this time," Hermann stated, "due to the unrealistic VA interest rate, we have no lenders participating in the Program making GI loans." Hermann commented, however, that there were many lending institutions participating in the Program making FHA loans.

"I'm afraid people in the small towns are not taking advantage of the splendid mortgage plan offered by FHA," Hermann added. "It is possible and even probable that FHA mortgage loans can be obtained in the smaller towns provided they meet FHA minimum standards."

VHMCP is a Program designed to assist individuals in small towns (under 25,000) to obtain FHA insured loans if there is no local source for such funds. The Program does not make loans, but only serves as a clearing house to bring together willing lenders and qualified borrowers.

New Salary Requirements To Go In Effect

On Feb. 2, 1959, new salary re- quirements for the exemption of executive, administrative and pro- fessional employees from the Fair Labor Standards Act will go into effect. This information was re- ceived in Dallas this week by Regional Director William J. Rogers of the U. S. Department of Lab- or's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions.

Under the revised salary tests, an executive employee, to be ex- cepted from the Act's minimum wage and overtime provisions, must be paid a salary of at least \$80 a week instead of the \$55 now required. Administrative and professional employees, to be so exempt, must be paid at least \$95 a week instead of \$75, as at present. This amended scale will apply in the continental United States, Alaska, Hawaii, the Canal Zone, Guam and American Samoa.

In Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands the salary test for execu- tive employees will be raised from \$30 to \$55 a week on a salary basis, and that for administrative and professional employees from \$200 a month to \$70 a week on a salary or fee basis.

A special provision for employe- es qualifying for the exemption under shortened duty tests will be increased from \$100 to \$125 a week, and will be applicable everywhere.

Rogers emphasized that the re- gulations do not require employers to pay these salaries to persons doing executive, administrative or professional work. The new salary tests are for exemption purposes only. If an employee who is cover- ed by the Act does not meet the salary tests, as well as the duties and responsibility tests, he does not qualify for the exemption. In such a case, the employer may of course continue to pay the employ- ee on the basis of a salary, but the Act's minimum wage and overtime pay requirements must be met, unless some other statu- tory exemption is applicable.

The Act requires payment of a minimum wage of \$1 an hour and at least one and one-half times their regular rate of pay for all hours worked over 40 in a work week to nonexempt employees en- gaged in interstate commerce or in the production of goods for in- terstate commerce, including any closely related process or occupa- tion directly essential to such pro- duction.

Donald Webb Completes Seven Month Navy Tour

LONG BEACH, Calif. — Don- ald R. Webb, fire control technic- ian third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. James R. Webb of 401 W. Sadona St., Eastland, and husband of the former Miss Lola C. Williamson of Saint Jo, returned to Long Beach, Calif., Nov. 29 aboard the destroyer USS Mans- field after a seven-month tour of duty with the U. S. Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific.

The Mansfield took part in "Operation Hardtack" in July at the Atomic Proving Grounds sur- rounding the Marshall Island of Eniwetok and Bikini, thus giving the crew a first hand insight into atomic warfare. The ship later op- erated out of Yokosuka, Japan, providing an escort for the attack aircraft carrier USS Shangri-La, and on Aug. 29, rescued a pilot from that carrier who went down at sea.

On Sept. 7 the Mansfield joined Task Force 72 off Formosa and provided convoy escort duties for ships relieving bombarded Matsu and Quemoy. The destroyer later joined another task group for more air operations with the Shangri-La.

The Mansfield departed Japan for the U. S. on Nov. 5.
