Dimmitt Will Host Bus Load of Foreign Students June 27-28-29

Dimmitt will be host on June 27, 28 and 29 to thirty-four traveling foreign students on their swing through this area. The students, mostly from the West Coast and Arizona area, will be taking the tour through the United States that winds up their year's stay in this country. Miss Pia Nasman, the foreign student from Finland, now in Dimmitt, will make a similar trip but will not be on this particular bus. There will be two busloads. One will stay in Hereford, however. Current plans are that the buses carrying the students will stop at a terminal in Clovis where Dimmitt and Hereford residents will meet them. They will be brought to Hereford and Dimmitt where they will spend the night in local homes. The following day — June 28 —

they will be given a tour of the county, mostly through grain elevators, farms and other agriculturally-connected interests. They will be given also a box lunch at the city park before continuing their tour. That night they will return to the homes of their hosts and then attend a teenage party being planned by Dimmitt youngsters for the visitors. Early the next morning the thirty-four students will be taken to Clovis where they will be placed on the bus to continue their trip. There are presently 54 families who have asked to keep a student overnight. These reservations are being handled by superintendent Paul Hilburn, who said this week that since there were already more families signed up than necessary it was doubtful if any more were needed. He indicated that some of those who had asked for a student might be away on a vacation or be otherwise unable to take the youngster, but the twenty extra families would surely be plenty. The foreign students will be taking part of an expense-paid six weeks trip over the United States where they will spend each stop much as they will in Dimmitt.

Beecher, Nelson To Boys' and Girls' State

Beth Beecher has been selected to attend the American Legion Auxiliary Bi-annet Girls' State and Donny Nelson has been chosen to participate in the American Legion Boys State, to be held in Austin in June. Both are junior students in Dimmitt High School. Miss Beecher is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Beecher and Nelson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow Nelson. Boys and Girls State is referred to as the Mythical 51st State where boys and girls have the opportunity to learn city, county and state government procedures through participation in hypothetical governments. Slogan for these occasions is "Learn by doing." Boys State is set for June 3 and Girls' for June 13. Both representatives have been very active in school activities which also are designed to help one "to learn by doing" and therefore should help them to qualify for offices of leadership in the Mythical 51st in June. Nelson has been a member of the student senate, has played football and basketball and has been a class officer. Miss Beecher is a member of the Bobcat Band and is a drum major and a class officer. Candidates for Boys and Girls State are chosen first by the school faculty who selects three boys and three girls. The Student Senate also selects three candidates. The group goes before a board of examiners composed of representatives from the American Legion and Legion Auxiliary who were J. R. Brown, Edd C. McLeroy, Jack Flynn, Mrs. Vernice Green and Mrs. Peggy Webb. Leadership, scholarship, honesty, character, personality, co-operativeness and physical fitness are the main points upon which the candidates must be judged. Each candidate is required to explain why he would like to go to State and what qualifications he feels he has to offer as a candidate.

Nazareth Organizes Fire Department

The Nazareth Fire Department will sponsor a dance in May 24 to help pay for equipment. Music will be furnished by Clyde Miller and his band. The dance will be held in the Nazareth Community Hall and the public is invited. Nazareth organized a fire department through civil defense at a meeting April 28. Officers are Dean Klemm, fire chief; Al Mauer is assistant fire chief; Kicky Hoelling, captain; Gene Kern, lieutenant; and Cecil Hoelling, secretary. Lew Hinkman, Edwin Huseman and Joe Drerup are the by-laws committee.

May 31 Is Grain Deadline

Wednesday, May 31, is the final date to file an intention to participate in the 1961 feed grains program, according to Charlie Hill, ASC secretary.

"Producers wishing to participate in the program are urged to sign up now," Hill said, "because if everyone waits until the last day we will not be able to get to everyone." The filing of an appeal does not extend the deadline date of May 31 to sign your application."

The ASC office will be open during the noon hour Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The ASC office will be open on Memorial Day, May 30. Also about the feed grain program, Hill stated that "We have put out some information that may be in error concerning the following example where a farm has both an irrigated and dryland rate. For example we might say a farm has a 200-acre feed grain base, with 100 acres dryland and 100 acres irrigated. If the producer signs up to divert 80 acres under the ir-

rigation rate his farm will only have another 20 acres which he may irrigate. If the other 100 acres of dryland is irrigated by the producer, then the payment will be adjusted to the dryland rate."

Hill also pointed out numerous other points on which he had been questioned most. These include statements that:

Land from which a 1961 crop is harvested cannot be used as diverted acreage. Fallow strips in regular patterns of strip-crop planting such as four rows cotton then four or five rows fallow cannot be accepted as diverted acreage.

Land diverted under the 1961 feed grain program may be planted to legumes or grasses or it may be summer fallowed if prior approval of the county committee is obtained.

Land that has a small grain crop growing now may be used as diverted acreage provided the small grain crop is shredded or plowed under prior to maturity.

Turn rows in the operation of mechanical harvesting equipment may not be designated as diverted acreage.

Irrigation ditches, regardless of their width, cannot be designated as diverted acreage. Areas designated as diverted acreage must be areas of regular shape with no more than four sides and contain no less than five acres except where the base is less than 25 acres. One side or one end of the area shall be parallel with the rows or field boundary. These restrictions may be disregarded when the area is an entire field or when the area is between adjacent terraces or between the field boundary and a terrace within that field.

The diverted acreage and the permitted acreage for feed grains will be determined at the time cotton is measured. Each farmer should take time and make careful measurements of both feed grains and allotment crops. "Due to the increase in the amount of acres to be measured, it is likely that your farm cannot be measured as early this year as it was in the past," Hill said.

LCC Professor To Speak At Baccalaureate

C. L. Kay, vice-president for public services, Lubbock Christian College, will be the featured speaker for Dimmitt High School's baccalaureate services on Sunday May 21 in the high school's auditorium at 8 p.m.

Mr. Kay is a graduate of Eastern New Mexico University and taught at West Texas State before coming to LCC as Dean of Student Life and professor in history. He has spoken to over 200 organizations in the past three years, and made over 300 speeches. Organizations he has addressed include Parent-Teacher's Associations, youth banquets, Chamber of Commerce groups, Texas Press Association and the New Mexico Convention of American Legion. He is author of a weekly column entitled, "The Spirit of America."

Mr. Kay is also a recent winner of the George Washington Honor Medal by the Freedom Foundation of Valley Forge for a speech entitled, "The Battle Ahead."

It is graduation time in Castro County and the three high schools — Hart, Nazareth and Dimmitt — are sending about eighty-three youngsters out into the world.

JayCees to Sponsor Hypnotist Show At School Auditorium on May 26th

Ever wonder if you could be hypnotized? Ever been curious about what you could be made to do if you did?

There's a man billed as Merlin the Hypnotist who will offer to answer these questions at the High School Auditorium in Dimmitt, on Friday, May 26, beginning at 8 p.m.

Sponsored in Dimmitt by the Dimmitt JayCees, he will call a number of volunteers from the audience. While under hypnosis, they will shiver with cold, see a motion picture and other uncanny demonstrations which Merlin achieves through the power of suggestion.

A feature of the show is to make a volunteer stiff as a board, then stretch him between two chairs — his head on the edge of one chair, and his heels on the edge of the other. Then Merlin stands on the person's stomach. After it's all over, the volunteer remembers the demonstration as though it had taken place in a dream. To demonstrate the power of post hypnotic suggestion, Merlin tells the volunteers that their right foot will be fastened to the floor when they try to leave the stage. They find it impossible to leave the stage until Merlin breaks the spell.

Merlin is one of the few magicians who has mastered mass hypnosis, which is generally considered to be the most difficult of all of the magicians' accomplishments.

Instead of escaping from a thoroughly examined and padlocked box, as the Great Houdini used to, Merlin locks a young lady in the box, and then in a matter of seconds, the lady is out and Merlin

is in. The box is unlocked, the lid removed, and out jumps Merlin.

Another feature of the show is Erna, the Princess of Magic, who has mastered the Hindu Basket mystery.

Board Commissions Architects to Draw New School Plans

The Dimmitt School Board has commissioned the architectural firm of Atchison, Atkinson and Cartwright of Lubbock to study the needs for a new high school building here. Their findings will be presented to the board along with a construction plan fitted to the needs of the school system.

After these plans are presented, preliminary work leading to an eventual school bond election will be done. One school spokesman emphasized that there are no definite plans yet for a building program, that this is more of a study than anything else. School enrollment is growing rapidly and the heavy influx into the two lower schools in recent years is reaching the high school level with a resulting crowded situation. A general overhauling of the present 30-odd year-old high school building will soon be an absolute necessity school board members believe.

Post Office to Conduct USDA Stock Survey

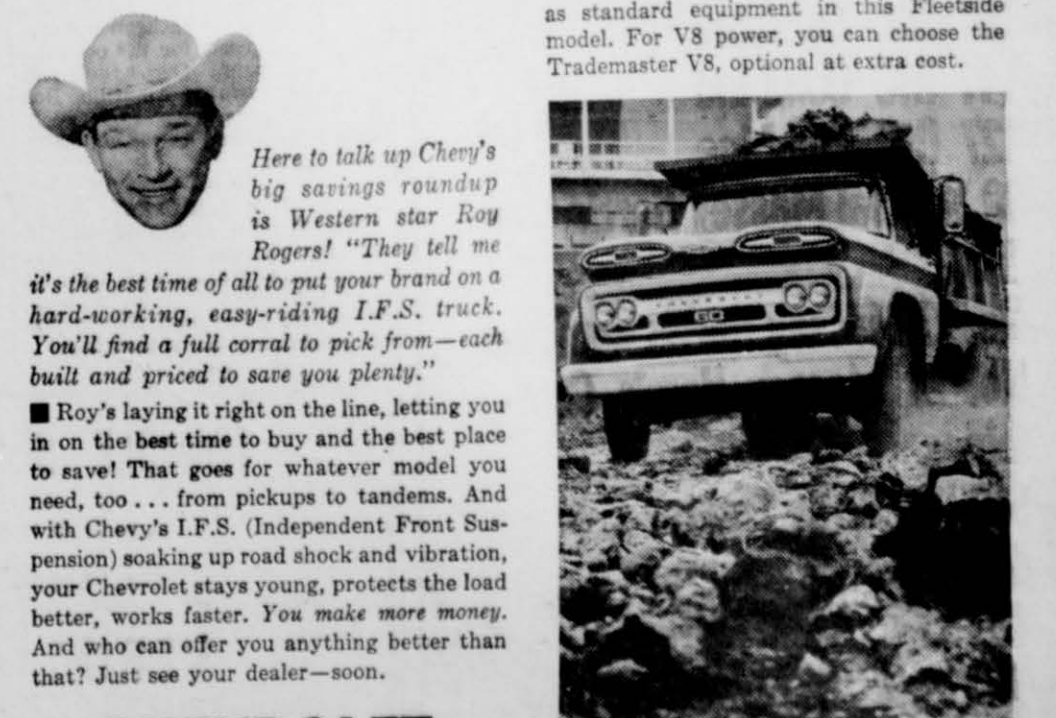
Postmaster E. L. Davis reminds rural patrons of the Dimmitt Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey Cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a envelope of boxes along their routes.
"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Davis explains. "It's important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a true sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."
Carriers assisting with the survey are Mrs. Jesse Fort, Rts. 1 and 5; Mrs. E. L. Carpenter, R.2; and Raymond Hesse, R. 4. Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the state's milk production, call and pig crops and the number of hogs and calves.
Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Davis concludes.

Notaries Public Must Re-Qualify Between June 1-10

Secretary of State Frank Lake announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1963 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1961 and June 10, 1961.

Lake emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for com-

missions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between April 1, 1961 and May 20, 1961. Application during this period will assure prompt action before the rush procedure of re-appointing present Notaries.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.
