Ranger's progress during 1958 can be measured in terms of increased bank deposits, increased business (during the last half), gains in utility connections, and community betterment projects.

As previously noted, bank deposits showed a sizable increase in '58 of \$77,987. Savings at the First Federal Savings & Loan Association increased \$33,455.

Boosting Ranger's prosperity was the three million dol ar peanut crop, a good agriculture year, and Fall Campaign events successfully staged by the merchants. Ranger also had its share of well-planned community projects



According to the last census (1940) Ranger's population was (1989. Cisco totaled 5,230, Eastand numbered 3,626, Gorman had 1,317 residents, and Rising Star, 1.289.

Although Ranger's school en-rollment dropped in September of '58 as compared with a year ago (from 816 to 799) the current school census may show an increase. Students at the high school and junior high have been added about as fast as others have with-drawn, making the enrollment around 346 students.

September enrollment figures showed the high school to have 223 students, with 123 in junior high. A total of 266 students were nrolled at Hodges and 187 at Young school.


