DE WITH CUBA

Last week I discussed pending negotiations of trade policies concerning Red bloc countries in Europe. This week I want to discuss problems that are very close to shore and which I feel should be made known to the American people.

January 3, 1961 this government severed diplomatic relations with the Castro regime in Cuba. For years the Cuban economy had been measurably subsidized because of an agreement under which this country was buying approximately thirty percent of our domestic sugar needs. This purchase amounted to approximately three million tons of sugar per year from Cuba. At a price of \$100 per ton, this would mean that the country was spending over \$300 million a year for Cuban sugar. This Cuban sugar quota allocation had been withdrawn on July 6, 1960. This constituted a partial economic embargo. Subsequently, restrictions on exports to Cuba were laid down which prevented the

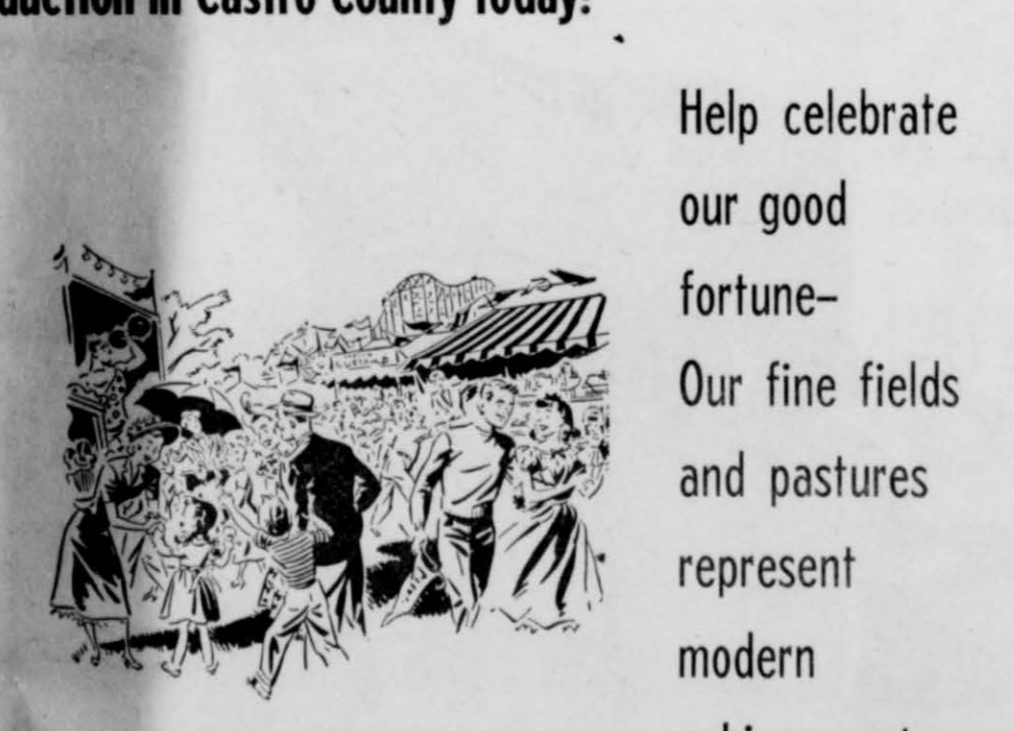

Senator YARBOROUGH'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Texan:

My amendment to provide a possible death penalty for aircraft hijacking was passed by the Senate and the House passed it in almost identical form by a resounding 375 to 3 vote.

There are some minor differences in the Senate and House versions but the essential features of the bill are intact.

The bill would provide for a death penalty on recommendation of a jury if force, violence or the threat of force or violence had been used to seize a plane. There is an optional scale of lesser penalties, down to 20 years imprisonment.

If an airplane crew member is attacked, for example the attacker could get 20 years imprisonment or a \$10,000 fine.

By this legislation, Congress is serving notice that the atrocious crime of plane hijacking is going to be something far more dangerous than a swift flight to the sheltering arms of the Cuban Communist regime of Fidel Castro.

Piracy on the high seas was a heinous crime. But it was nothing compared to the danger in the skies when armed men who know nothing of flying seize control of a plane and crew.

The spectacle of scores of our citizens held captive on planes moving several hundred miles an hour, 4 or 5 miles above the earth, and with the pilot helpless at gunpoint, demanded preventative legislative action.

The legislation will serve as a powerful deterrent to would-be plane hijackers. The El Paso hijacking incident may never have occurred if the men who plotted to seize the plane had known they would face the possible death penalty.

Another measure which I introduced in the Senate has also been approved by the House. My bill, now to be law, is important to the Gulf Coast shrimp industry.

The bill clarified a flaw that might have seriously interfered

EXPORTS
The Congress declares that it is the policy of the United States to use export controls to the extent necessary (a) to protect the domestic economy from the excessive drain of scarce materials and to reduce the inflationary impact of abnormal foreign demand; (b) to further the foreign policy of the United States and to aid in fulfilling its international responsibilities; and (c) to exercise the necessary vigilance over exports from the standpoint of their significance to the national security. (Emphasis supplied.)

Act spells out a declaration of policy, which I quote as follows: The Congress declares that it is the policy of the United States to use export controls to the extent necessary (a) to protect the domestic economy from the excessive drain of scarce materials and to reduce the inflationary impact of abnormal foreign demand; (b) to further the foreign policy of the United States and to aid in fulfilling its international responsibilities; and (c) to exercise the necessary vigilance over exports from the standpoint of their significance to the national security. (Emphasis supplied.)

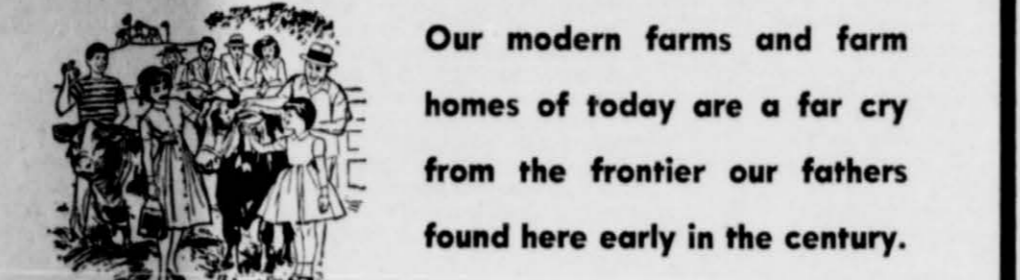
passer H. Res. 403 (Kitchin, D. N. C.), which was passed by the Rules Committee on August 23, 1961. This is a resolution creating a Select Committee to be composed of five Members of the House of Representatives for the purpose of assessing the accomplishments under the Export Control Act in a number of particulars, especially, "The problems involved in the control of trade between the United States and foreign countries, particularly the foreign countries comprising the Sino-Soviet bloc." This resolution was introduced by Congressman Paul Kitchin of North Carolina on August 3, 1961, and was approved by the Rules Committee on August 23, 1961. It is expected that it will be presented to the House and passed before the end of this Session.

With relation to the proposed export to Russia of the machines for the production of miniaturized ball bearing, there was an export license issued in February of 1960. However, this license was subsequently suspended and the matter was refiled. After considering all facts involved, the Secretary of Commerce revoked the license as of March 2, 1961. These machines were not shipped to Russia, according to the United States Department of Commerce, and will not be shipped.

Now, with relation to the shipment of wheat and other subsidized agricultural products at bargain basement prices, I have been advised by the Department of Commerce that the only authorization for the sale of surplus commodities to the Eastern European Soviet bloc was on three conditions. First the sale must be at prevailing world market prices. Second, the merchandise must be paid for in dollars or in currency convertible to dollars. Third, exporters must obtain commitments from importers in the bloc countries that the commodities would not be re-exported to another country. Whether or not these conditions are distasteful to potential exporters and importers is not readily discernible. However, the Department of Commerce advises me that as a matter of fact, it has not received one single application for an export license to sell subsidized surplus agricultural commodities to any country in the Soviet Bloc. Hence, no subsidized commodities have been shipped to the Soviet Bloc, no export licenses have been requested and none has been granted for such shipments.

This information that has come to me from the Department of Commerce is, in my opinion, information that is of vital importance to the people of our area, including the many who have written me on both subjects.

About Your HEALTH

A weekly public service lecture from the Texas State Department of Health.

More than 9,000 Texas men and women were fatally stricken last year by strokes. That is one of the most ominous words in the language today. What does it really mean?

The medical term is "cerebral vascular accident," because it is caused by cerebral vascular disease. The body's cerebral vascular system is the brain's network of blood vessels. Thus, cerebral vascular disease refers to diseases of vessels in the brain.

Brain cells require a good blood supply in order to work properly more so than most other body cells. When something happens to that blood supply, the brain itself is impaired.

That something could be a hemorrhage, thrombus, embolus, compression or a spasm. Each one of those key words is a major cause of strokes.

A hemorrhage (bleeding) is the result of a break in a brain artery which allows blood to escape and damage surrounding brain tissue. Another name for strokes of this type is "apoplexy."

A thrombus is caused by a clot of blood forming in a brain artery, stopping the flow of blood to the part of the brain it supplies. But when a clot is formed in a diseased heart or elsewhere in the body and pumped to the brain to plug an artery, it is called an embolus.

A tumor, swollen brain tissue, or a large clot in another vessel may press upon a brain vessel to stop the flow of blood. This is called compression. A spasm is caused when a muscular artery constricts or tightens up, reducing the flow of blood to a particular brain area.

Most strokes do not produce immediate death. A large number of victims live for many years. An estimated two million people who have had strokes are alive in the United States today—many of them disabled because of it.

Present medical knowledge can prevent some but not all strokes. Certain conditions causing cerebral vascular disease—high blood pressure, for example—can often be helped by modern treatment, and several conditions associated with blood clot formation respond to anti-clotting drugs. Too blood vessel defects with which some children are born can now be corrected by surgery.
