





The Air National Guard had its official beginning with the organization of New York's First Aero

quadron in 1915. It is made up of more than 550 regiments. In all, there are approximately 4800 company-size units and detachments throughout the United States and its terriunits located in communities throughout the nation.

Some 70,000 officers and men are in the Air National Guard. The National Guard today adds up to a large, voluntary military organization, trained to the cap-ability of being combat ready within a short time after mobilization. It is geared to peace and yet pre-

pared for war.

The Guard has recently become the first reserve component in the U. S. to be assigned an active role in guided missils, Army National Guard missiles.
