Fourth Annual "Muster Day" observance is set at the National Guard Armory Sunday, from 2 to 4 p.m., with open house.

A Battery Sweetheart will be selected by a group of judges in a contest scheduled to get underway at 2:30 p.m. A total of eight candidates have been named to vie for the title, and the winner will compete for the Division Sweetheart.

Although the Guard recognizes Washington's Birthday as Muster Day, it actually traces its foundations back long before Washington. The 101st Engineer Battalion and the 182nd Infantry of Massachusetts were organized in 1636—nearly 100 years before Washington's birth. The Puerto Rico National Guard traces its history back to the year 1510.

The Army National Guard is made up of 21 infantry divisions, six armored divisions and hundreds of other combat and support type units. These include air (Continued On Page Four)

Lake Leon Will Host Fishing Rodeo

Lake Leon will host the annual fishing rodeo of the Fort Worth Anglers Club on Sunday, April 19.

Directors of the Fort Worth Club decided in favor of the lake in a Thursday night meeting. Earlier they had been asked to stage the event at Lake Leon by

a Ranger delegation.

Members of the club will participate in the all-day fishing event, seeking two sets of trophies and prizes to be offered for the best bass and crappie catches. Membership cards will be made available to area residents, through the Chamber of Commerce offices at

Eastland and Ranger and at the commercial boat docks around the lake. The cards will enable the holder to fish free of charge that day and to compete for awards.

"This is the best publicity Lake Leon has ever had," said R. V. "Rip" Galloway, manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce.

Details of the fishing tournament will be worked out, but trophies will be offered in two divisions (for bass and crappie) and area merchants may offer merchandise prizes, Galloway indicated.

Andy Anderson, sports editor for the Fort Worth Press, is president of the Fort Worth Anglers Club. He notified Galloway that Lake Leon has been selected as the rodeo site. Last year the event was staged at Possum Kingdom.

Lester Crossley, Ranger city manager, presented Lake Leon's bid for the site at a Fort Worth meeting of directors earlier this month. Other members of the delegation were W. J. Sipes, James A. Smith, Jack Ralls and Eb Richardson.

At that time, directors said there was a very good chance that Lake Leon would be chosen, but made no definite commitment until Thursday night.

Moisture and Cold Spell Are Welcomed

"Just what we needed only not quite enough." That is the general opinion concerning wet, icy weather which has hung over Eastland County since Thursday.

The unforecast cold spell, which brought .54 of an inch of moisture to this area, was welcomed for several reasons. The most important two reasons were: (1) The moisture was much needed; and (2) the cold spell kept fruit trees in this area from budding out.

Fruit trees in the county were on the brink of budding out after near 90-degree weather earlier in the week, agricultural experts agreed. The cold spell held them back and may save them from a later freeze.

Traffic was back to normal Friday afternoon in Eastland County after being icy from freezing rain, sleet and snow. The temperature began to rise Friday after a high reading of 31 degrees Thursday.

The temperature was to continue to rise today (Saturday) and Sunday.

The moisture was the most recorded in a given period this year and heartened area farmers and ranchers. It also gave some relief to parched rangeland which has resulted in severe grass fires recently.

No serious accidents were reported during the cold spell although highways and streets were termed "extremely dangerous" by traffic enforcement officers.

The moisture pushed the total moisture for the month to .97 and for the year to 1.03 inches. Average rainfall for February is 1.38 inches.
