Officer Calls Highway Crash Near Tragedy

A tale of a near tragedy was told this week by Highway Patrolman Al White, of Eastland.

A "routine" highway crash about a mile north of Ranger on Farm Market Road 717 caused heavy damage to a truck-tractor and tank trailer and injured the driver, but White said it could have been much worse.

The driver of the truck-tractor locked his brakes and jackknifed his vehicle in an effort to avoid a collision with a pickup truck. He missed the pickup, but overturned the truck in doing it.

J. B. Craig, 55, of 615 Breckenridge Street, Ranger, was treated for minor injuries at Ranger General Hospital and later released. Driver of the pickup truck was Robert Jackson of Route 3, Ranger.

Craig was hauling a load of crude oil, just out of the ground. He said it was more flammable than gasoline. About half of his load poured onto the highway and into a ditch, but somehow didn't catch fire.

Kite Warning Issued by Texas Electric Manager

Texas Electric Service Company today appealed to parents to caution their children about flying kites near electric wires.

"The windy season brings kite flying time and this traditional sport is one that is lots of fun for children if it is done safely," Al Larson, Texas Electric Service Company manager, pointed out. "Many youngsters don't realize the dangers in this innocent pastime of certain rules are not observed, the most important of which is to never fly kites where there is the possibility of them getting tangled in electric power lines."

Other dangerous practices in connection with kite flying include using metallic cord for the kite string, making the kite frame of metal, flying kites in the rain when even a cotton string can become a dangerous conductor of electricity, and trying to retrieve a kite in case it does get caught in electrical wires, Larson stated.

"Local youngsters who fly kites have been careful and cooperative in the past, and we've had no serious mishaps in several years, but each year, over the nation, there are many cases of injuries to kite flyers," Larson said. "If kites are made right and flown right, kite flying is an enjoyable, wholesome sport."

To further impress children that safety is all-important in kite flying, Texas Electric Service Company is providing posters for all school bulletin boards and announcements for school principles.

was just a simple minded boy, refused to give him back his treasure.

But Percy was not the kind to be badgered about. He sought the services of a lawyer to sue for recovery of the ring and its jeweled set. The results of his suit have immortalized Percy's name in the common law.

The goldsmith and his apprentice claimed that since Percy had only found the ring, he had no better right to it than they did. The court felt differently about the matter and ordered the diamond returned "because the finder of a lost article has the right to hold it against the whole world except the true owner". This principle established by Percy's case remains as effective today as it was over two centuries ago.

However, as far as the owner who lost the property is concerned, the finder of lost goods is merely regarded as a depository, holding the goods for the true owner.

The courts draw a distinction between "misaid" and "lost property." Lost property is property which the owner casually and thoughtlessly parts with, like the dropping of a wallet, in the hurry to get on a bus. Misaid property, on the other hand, is property which the owner has purposely laid down and then forgotten, leaving it where placed. An example of this would be a handbag placed on a shop counter while a customer examines merchandise. A finder must leave misaid articles with the proprietor of the place where found.

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

Can you remember when lawn parties were held and the front yard was adorned with Japanese lanterns? (They were first called Chinese lanterns but, after the Russo-Japanese War, the name was changed).

What was a Japanese lantern? It was made of colored paper, accordion-pleated and shaped round east and west and oblong north and south, illuminated by a candle.

The Chinese are credited with the invention of gun-powder and, when I was a boy, at Christmas-time I would receive a package of "Chinese fire-crackers". This package had lettering in Chinese—at least I suppose it was Chinese for I must confess I could not read Chinese and can not, now either. There were about 50 fire-crackers in a package and the cost was five cents.

You stuck a match to the fuse, waited till you were sure it was burning, then you tossed it and usually the cracker went off in mid-air with a mild "bang."

There is an expression that is coming more and more into use—and which, to me, sounds lacking in real interest: a sort of mechanical remark. Someone asks, "How are you?" and the reply often is, "I'm fine—and you?" Personally I think, "I'm fine; how are you?" sounds more cordial.

Another expression I do not fancy is "Thank you" when the accent is a rising one on the "you", which is pronounced "yuh". If you are thanking someone, why shouldn't the emphasis be on "thank" or on both words equally?

"Moby Dick" is considered by red-winged blackbirds, chicken bones, ducklings and cliff swallows.

FAVORITE RECIPES

We think you folks might be interested in some of the recipes for these unusual dishes, so we have taken the privilege to print them here.

Williamsburg Peanut Soup
2/3 cup finely chopped celery
3 tablespoons minced onion
2 tablespoons butter
1/4 cup flour
1-1/2 teaspoons salt

Tossed Green Salad
No recipe needed on this one! The magic touch that makes it better is the use of peanut oil in the french dressing. The reason peanut oil is better: It has superb clinging quality. The trick is to finger-toss the salad after adding peanut oil french dressing. That will make each tiny particle of the vegetable sparkle and shine. It holds evenly the flavor of the spices on each bit of the salad.

Virginia Ham and Peanut Topping
The trick here is the topping. Any kind of ham can be used. In this case the ham was from peanut fed hogs. The ham was skinned and scored, in 1-1/2" rectangles, one hour before it finished cooking. Then it was spread with topping made of: 1/2 cup orange marmalade and 1 cup peanut butter (for a 10 pound ham.) The topping is spread and rubbed into the scored fat, then popped back into the oven to finish baking. This produces a tasty crust that seals the sweet juices and adds flavor to the ham.

Peanut Biscuits
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
3/4 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon shortening
1/2 cup ground peanuts
2/3 cup milk
Sift flour with baking powder and salt. Cut-in shortening and ground peanuts with pastry blender. Make a well in the mixture and add about 2/3 cup milk (enough to make a soft dough); add milk slowly and stir with fork until soft dough is formed. Toss dough onto lightly floured board; knead for 30 seconds; roll or pat into sheets 1/4-inch thick. Cut into small rounds; brush the top

with butter and bake in 425 degree oven about 15 minutes or until lightly browned.

Peanut-Banana Pie
CRUST... 1/2 cup peanut butter, tablespoon honey; combine with 3/4 cup graham cracker crumbs; blend thoroughly. Pour mixture into greased 9-inch pie pan and press firmly against bottom and sides of pan. (An easy way to press crumbs into shape is by using a greased-bottom 8-inch pie plate.) Bake in 325 degree oven, 10 minutes. Cool in refrigerator until set—at least 2 hours. After which filling was added.

FILLING... Open one 6 ounce can evaporated milk and pour into mixing bowl. Place in freezing compartment of refrigerator and chill until ice crystals form

around edge of bowl. Meanwhile dissolve 1 package lemon flavored gelatin in 3/4 cup hot water. Refrigerate. When cool and partially set (about the consistency of unbeaten egg white) whip with rotary beater or electric mixer until fluffy. Whip milk until stiff, add dash of salt and fold in the gelatin. Add 1 cup mashed bananas, 1/4 cup lemon juice and 1-2 cup powdered sugar. Pour into chilled pie shell and refrigerate until firm. Before serving sprinkle top of pie with crushed peanut brittle or chopped peanuts. Makes 9-inch pie or enough for 8 servings.



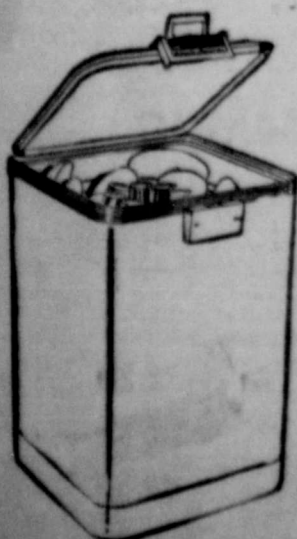

Pedestrians Can Cause Accidents

"Pedestrians must accept their share of the responsibility, along with motorists, if we are to reduce the overall toll of traffic fatalities in 1959," J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, said today.

"This is especially true during winter months," Musick said, "when a driver's visibility is frequently reduced to only the traffic directly ahead."

The safety expert pointed out that more pedestrian fatalities occur in urban areas during the winter months than in any other season. This is because winter months mean slippery streets, longer hours of darkness and poorer visibility.

"Pedestrians should observe extra caution in crossing streets, obey all traffic signs and signals and make sure they are seen by motorists as they step into the street," Musick warned.

- Musick outlined five cardinal rules for safer wintertime walking:
1. Cross at intersections and obey all traffic signs.
 2. Be wary of slippery streets and take your time in crossing.
 3. At night wear or carry something light in color as a warning to approaching cars.
 4. Be courteous and give the driver a break in winter weather.
 5. Accept your responsibilities for keeping yourself alive.

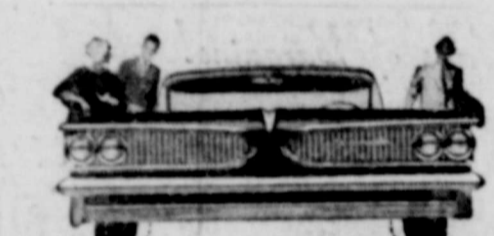

You bought your family many more—and vastly more important—gifts this Christmas than those you wrapped in bright paper and ribbon.

You doled out hard-earned tax dollars to buy the gifts of good health. Let's see precisely what you got for your money.

Your gift budget this year included more than \$10 million to buy and equip 29 medical care facilities, such as hospitals and diagnostic centers, in areas without them. Your shopping counselor was the Division of Hospital Services at the Texas State Department of Health.

You paid \$13 million to build 13 new sewage treatment plants to give your family the gift of clean, uncontaminated streams. Helping you make the right choice was the Department's Division of Water Pollution Control.

The bill came to \$230,000. The State Health Department helped you shop for just the right plan for each city.

It cost you \$242,000 to buy a half-million children the gift of protection from polio this Christmas. If your own children, or you yourself, were among them you can consider yourself fortunate. Many disclaimed the gift, and now Christmas holds no meaning for them.

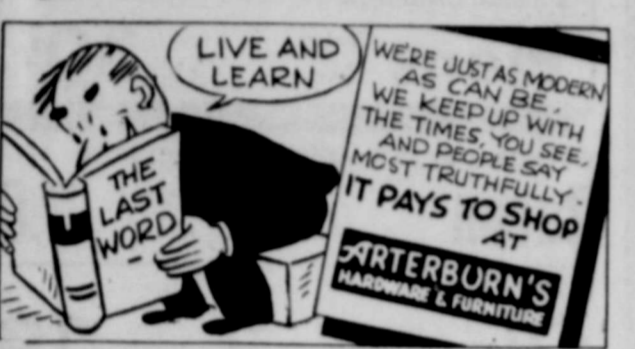
