Conrad Miller Is Distinguished Student at A&M

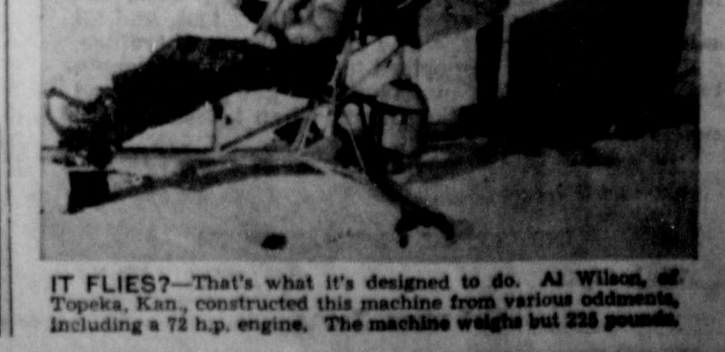
COLLEGE STATION — Conrad D. Miller of Eastland has been designated a distinguished student at Texas A. & M. College for the fall semester, 1958.

June Grad Program Launched
 The Marine Corps Recruiting Service initiated a special program for June high school graduates Sunday, March 1, it was announced today by Sgt. Franklin L. Jackson.
 The program, called "June Grad," is designed to fit into the full schedule of the high school senior without causing any loss of time from classes or pre-graduation activities.
 To qualify for "June Grad" a senior must make application, take his physical and mental examination before June 1. If he is accepted, he will be enlisted and may delay his reporting date for active duty up to four months. If he desires to go right after graduation, he may leave on the day of his choice.
 The Recruiting Service also announced that the Buddy System would be in effect and that those graduates who desired to enlist and be guaranteed the opportunity to serve through Boot Camp together would be enlisted on the same day.
 Early enlistment in the program will give the graduate priority in the May and June aviation quotas. Seniors seeking information on the special program should be sure and tell the recruiter they are interested in "June Grad."

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The boy next door says he will cut your grass for a dollar, and you say, "Go ahead."

You two have a contract—an offer and an acceptance.

Or take an "unilateral" contract—an offer by one party which anybody can accept.

One man may say "I'll give five dollars to anybody who finds and returns my lost wallet." If you do, you can claim the five dollars. The man made an offer at large, and you accepted it by finding and returning the wallet. So there is a contract.

An auctioneer invites offers in the form of bids. The fall of the auctioneer's hammer signals his acceptance of one of the offers—and there's another contract.

Some mail order people try to make their "offers" look like your "acceptance"—but you need not accept unordered things sent you through the mail on in any other way.

Suppose a firm mailed an unordered book to you with a letter setting its price at \$25—this is an offer to sell.

The letter might add that if you don't mail it back within ten days the firm would "assume" you had accepted it.

Have you accepted it? Not if you put the book on the shelf unread; or if you return it; or if you refuse to accept it from the mailman.

But if you read but did not pay for the book, or gave it away as a present, by your act you may have accepted the offer and may have to pay for the book.

It is hard to prove unwritten agreements; and people may in good faith forget or misunder-

stand what they agreed to do. When you make a business deal, make sure the offer, the acceptance, and every promise in your agreement are written down. If they aren't they're not in the contract.

No contract can stand up in court unless one party makes a firm offer and the other accepts it.

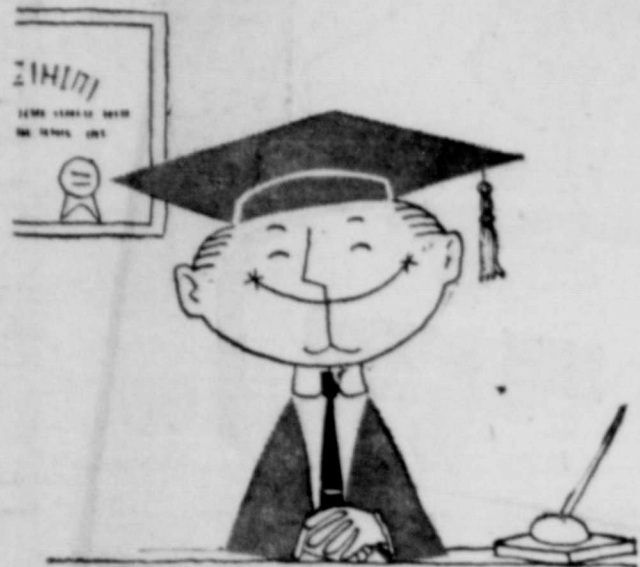
