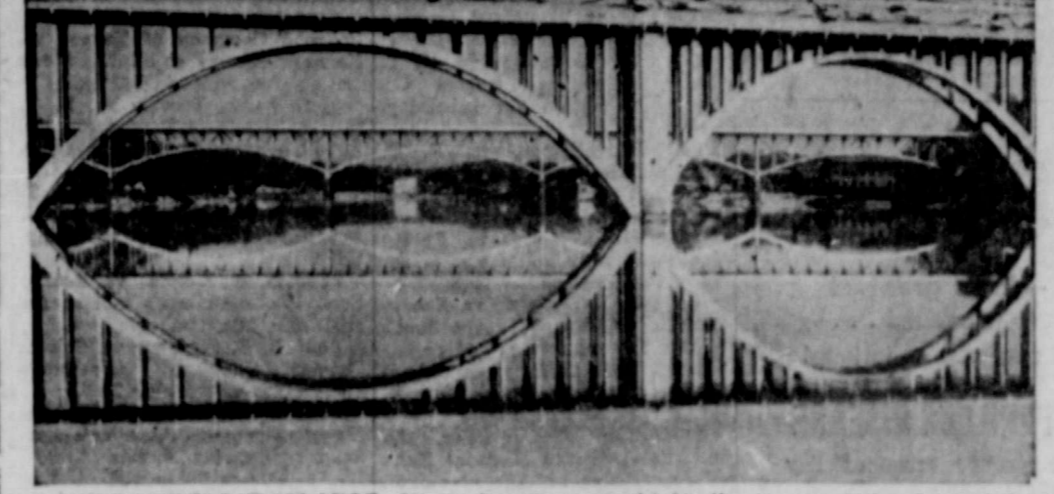

STOCK MARKET REPORTS

Slaughter lambs were fully steady to strong in Fort Worth Monday and some spots were 25 to 50 cents above the low close of last week. Good and choice slaughter Spring lambs cashed at \$19 to \$20.50 and good and choice old crops sold from \$17 to \$19, the higher figure for woolled lambs. Shorn old crops sold from \$18.50 downward. Stocker and feeder lamb lambs drew \$16 to \$17, and feeder Spring lambs sold from \$17 to \$17.50.

Cattle and calves were active and generally steady to strong. Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings bulked at \$25.50 to \$27.50 and plain and medium butcher cattle sold from \$17 to \$25.

Pat cows sold from \$18 to \$20 and canners and cutters drew \$13 to \$18. Bulls cashed at \$18 to \$23.50.

Good and choice slaughter calves cashed at \$26 to \$30 and plain and medium butchers sold from \$22 to \$25. Cull and common kinds cashed at \$17 to \$22.

Good and choice stocker steer calves cashed at \$30 to \$34 and heifer calves ranged mostly from \$31 downward. Stocker steer yearlings of lighter weights sold from \$32 down and feeders of around 650 pounds sold for

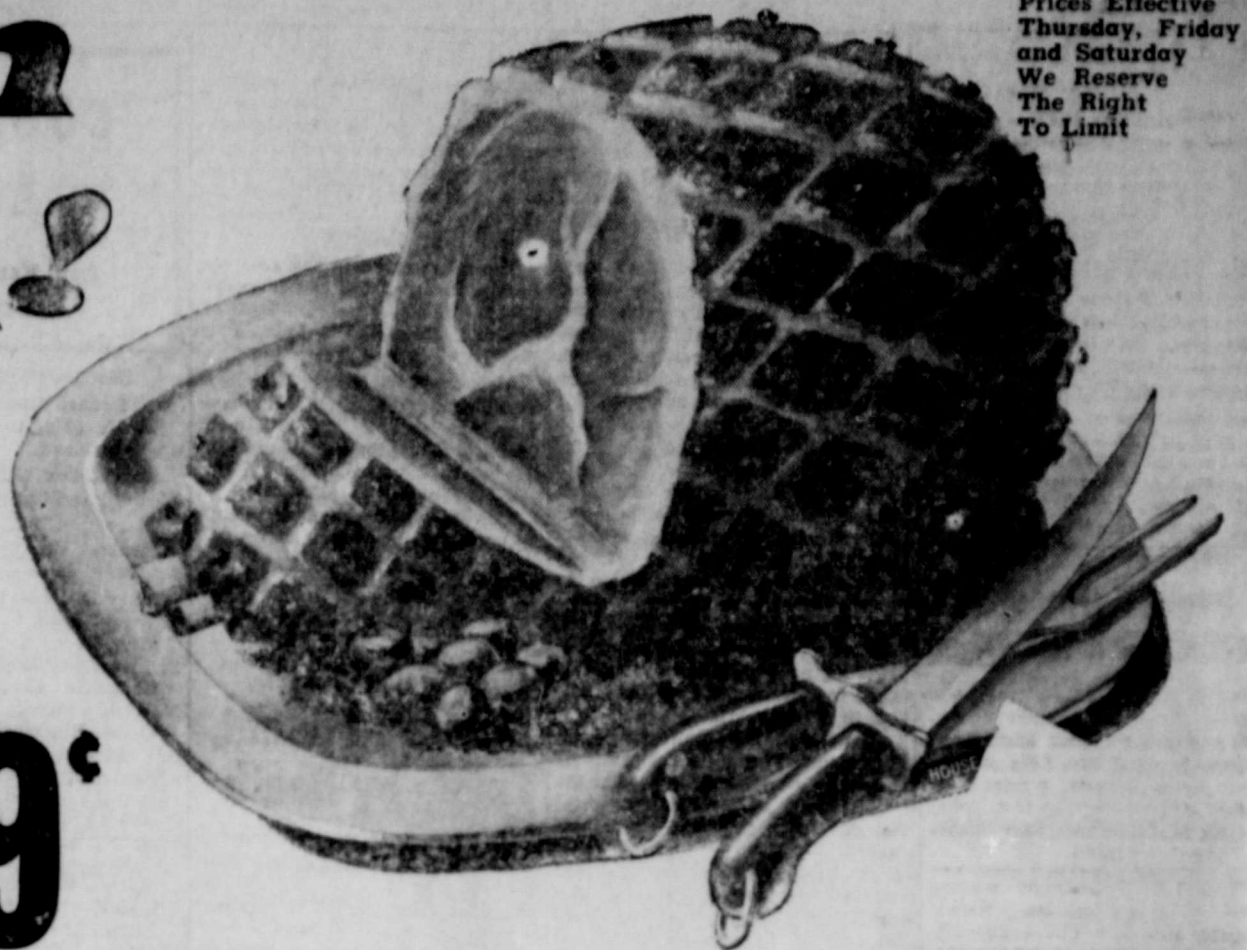

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The Subcommittee for Review of the Mutual Security Programs, (commonly known as Foreign Aid), of which I am a member, has issued an interim report revealing startling mismanagement on both the part of our own Government and governments we are supposed to be helping.

Since soon after the end of the so-called Marshall Plan, I have been voting against Foreign Aid. My opposition is not that of an isolationist by any means. Rather, it is because of the scope and operation of programs launched in over-ambition.

The report of our committee will show that the Executive Department has come to Congress year after year with a system known as "illustrative programs." This simply means that they believe certain things can be accomplished in certain foreign nations by the appropriation of a certain number of dollars. After the money is appropriated, they then send the experts to the countries to be aided for the purpose of planning projects to fit the money.

A sawmill in Pakistan which has not yet been started, and, in fact, the engineering is incomplete. The sum of \$611,500 has been obligated for the purpose. There is still no proof that it is a practical operation.

Many expenditures around the world have been made under pressure of "doing something." In many instances, "doing something" to stem the tide against Communist influence, but we have now become a sort of victim of blackmail by many countries. They tell us that unless we continue to pour out our dollars they may yield to Communist influence. This is becoming an old story.

It seemingly becomes the duty of the "experts" to figure out projects which will cost the amount of money appropriated. In many instances the Congress has appropriated too much money, and projects are overplanned. Obviously it results in a waste of the taxpayer's money, as well as placing a burden on the economy of the country to be benefited. Our Subcommittee has found that in numerous instances officials of certain foreign countries were not interested in carrying forward the projects of our own Government, but as it often the case in our own Country, evidently they felt that they would take whatever they could get, and as much of it as possible.

As an example of some of the things found by our Committee, funds were appropriated in 1952, with additional amounts being appropriated in succeeding years, for

There is need for world cooperation against the influence of Soviet Russia. We can not sit still and assume that all people around the world are going to love us, but on the other hand we can not buy their loyalty and respect. Our failures, in my considered opinion, result in our not understanding the needs and aspirations of other people, as well as failing to have them understand us. This can not be accomplished by dollars alone and, in fact, in some instances it has been our handicap.

By our foreign aid we have created jealousies among nations. By our lavishness, we have created a feeling of obligation on the part of many nations, which is never conducive to friendship and understanding.

All our efforts in this respect have not been failures. There are visible successes, and strangely enough, some of the greatest successes have been in those places where our expenditures were most modest.

Before going to Ethiopia in 1949 Dr. Andrew J. Bennett, a great agriculturist and conservation advocate told the Congress he did not want hundreds of millions of dollars — not even millions — but only a modest amount with three or four well qualified and dedicated young men. He went to Ethiopia and accomplished more in 14 months with an expenditure of a few thousand dollars than has been accomplished in many countries during the last ten years. If his untimely death had not occurred in an airplane accident, he would have proved the correctness of his approach in other places. Dr. Bennett's idea of economic Foreign Aid is the kind I believe would win friends and influence people.

The President has just submitted his request to Congress for a total of \$3,930,000,000 for Foreign Aid for the coming fiscal year.

On the sweet side, there are special recipes for different kinds of coffee cake, fruit filled rolls of all kinds, kolaches and yeast donuts.

Limp, over-cooked, drab-looking vegetables have little appetite appeal, and little food value. The skillful cook will save color and food value by proper cooking.

Here are some pointers to remember in cooking vegetables: Use fresh, crisp vegetables. Cook in as little water as possible. Cook vegetables in their skins whenever possible. Cook only until tender, don't overcook. Cook most green and all yellow vegetables in a covered pan. Never use soda in cooking vegetables.

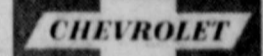

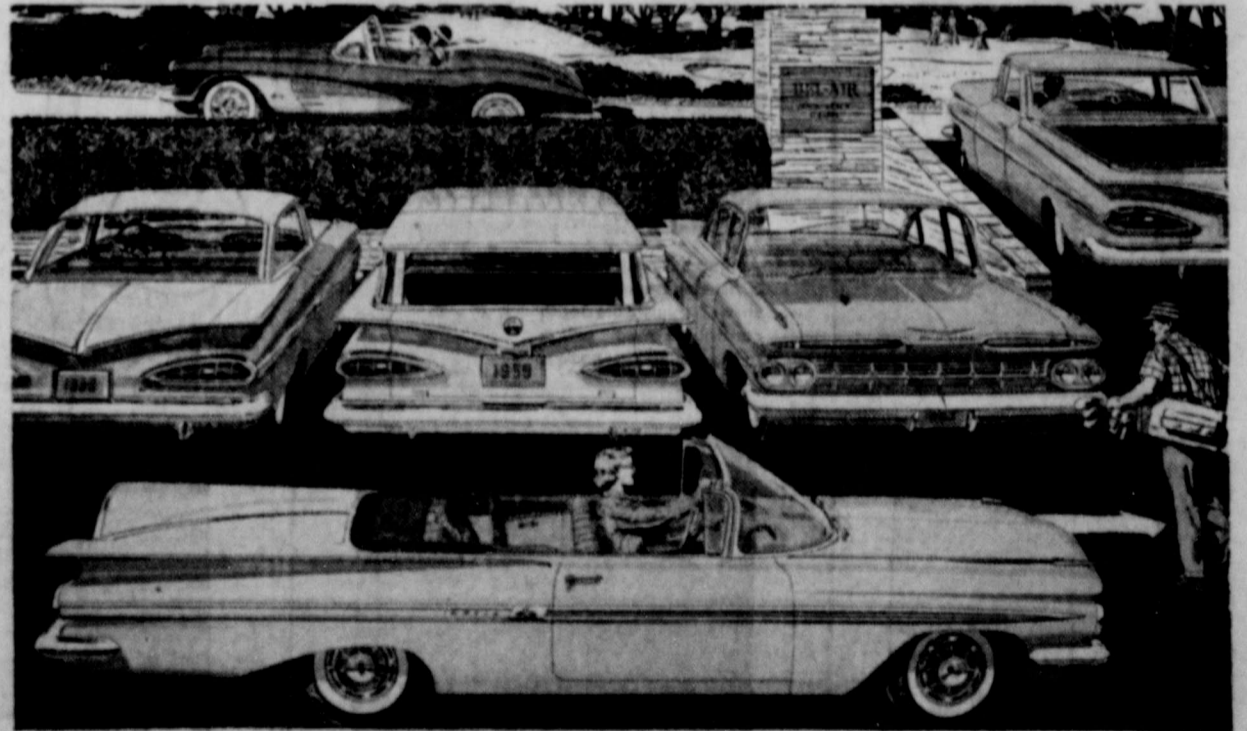
