ANY predictions have been made that Adolf Hitler, Nazi Fuchret, will commit suicide when his twisted mind realizes the hopelesswas of his cause. Few, however, know that Hitler once raised a revolver to his head as he groaned, "Everything is ruined. I am going to end it all." A woman took the gun away from him. In fact, violent death occurred in hitler's own residence when he discovered that his sweetheart had rallen in love with her vienness voice teacher. The night she told Hitler's, but Hitler said she had killed herself. Hanfstaengi writes that a party leader who refused to accept the suicide explanation subsequently was murder.
