INDEPENDENCE DAY comes Saturday. And that reminds us that it's time to review the four freedoms.

Of course we all realize the need for laws to help protect these freedoms. But sometimes we forget that too many laws hinder man's freedom. And in a democracy—it's the people who supposedly make and un-make their own laws. So—let's preserve our freedom especially the Constitutional four based on the Bill of Rights.

Freedom of the Press—means that a newspaper has the right to print (or right to refuse to print) anything that it thinks warrants publication.

Of course the newspaper must avoid slander—just like all other means of communication. Other than that, it SHOULD have a free hand.

"Should" is used because the newspaper is often—very often—hampered from performing its duty.

On a national level, newspapers must observe security restrictions for obvious reasons. And newspaper men have proved, over and over again, that they can keep confidential information safe until it is time to "break the news". You can trust him with your secret.

On a local level, newspapers must keep the confidence of sources, of the public and officials. But they must keep the right to print any information—to report any crooked policies, any public scandals, any crimes—and to report accurately and truthfully, no matter who is involved. Some people would like to deny newspapers of this right.

Others feel—and their number is large—that the newspaper should or MUST use "hand-outs", publicity releases, "canned" stories and prepared releases exact.

Thirty Eastland County Students Attend NTSC

Eastland County was represented by 30 students at North Texas State College in the school year just ended, the registrar's office has announced.

During the nine-month session, a total of 7,837 different students were enrolled. They came from 211 of the state's 254 counties, from 32 other states, and from nine foreign countries.

Dallas County again sent the largest number to NTSC, 2,149 students. Other counties represented by large groups were Tarrant 889, Denton 881, Collin 163, Grayson 156, Cooke 134, Harris 131, Ellis 122, McLennan 113, Wichita 10, Gregg 101, Montague 20.

Wise 84, Galveston 76 Navarro 61, Smith 53, Parker and Taylor 58 each, Kaufman 57, Bowie 51 and Harrison 50.

These record figures reflect the steady increase in enrollment at the college in recent years.

Jellyfish Found Again In Lake Leon By Rhodes

Those jellyfish are back in the news again. For the second year in a row what is believed to be fresh water jellyfish have been discovered in Lake Leon.

Gene Rhodes made the discovery this year. He brought in about a dozen specimens to prove it. Rhodes said he noticed a big school of the small jellyfish near his boat dock, and scooped up several.

He picked them up with his hands and they did not sting him, so he doubts that they are dangerous.

The "fish" Rhodes brought in are about the size of a dime and are round. They are almost transparent and swim by retracting and expanding. They have hairs all around the circle and look much like artist drawings of flying saucers.

They do meet the definition Webster gives for jellyfish: "Any of various marine free-swimming coelenterates having a body of jellylike consistency; a medusa. Many have long tentacles with stinging hairs."

Nation Celebrates Birthday, Saturday

Today all of Ranger is preparing to celebrate the independence of the nation in which they live.

Many will be traveling less than 100 miles to visit friends and relatives. Others will travel greater distances. And flocks of visitors are expected to arrive in Ranger for the holidays.

It will be a time of picnics, family reunions, boating, fishing, swimming and other sports. And Cisco is preparing to hold a celebration at the lake.

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Ranger Will Have Dial System in April

Ranger will convert to a dial telephone system about the first weekend in April, W. H. McAnally of Cisco, district manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., told members of the Lions Club, Thursday noon.

The actual conversion takes less than one minute, following over a year of preparation, McAnally said.

Introduced by James Townsen, McAnally outlined the conversion program now in progress. He said that the new telephone building, now being constructed at Pine and Austin, should be completed about the middle of October.

Western Electric will send specialized personnel here in December, for preliminary work, and then start installing equipment about Jan. 4, 1960, McAnally added.

About the middle of March, installations will be complete, he stated, and a two week testing period will follow the conversion. The present system will remain in operation until the minute of the switch-over.

McAnally emphasized that the 17 operators now working in Ranger will have a chance to work in Cisco, if they so choose, following the conversion.

Rates will be slightly higher, he stated, with an increase of 50¢ per month for one-party telephones and 25¢ per month for two-party. Cost of the conversion is \$177,000, McAnally said.

McAnally began his talk by briefly outlining the history of the local telephone company. He said the first company was established in Ranger in 1903; Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. bought it and facilities in 1919 for \$18,500. In 1920 the company had 230 customers; in 1930, 1,017; in 1940, 522 customers; in 1950—1,347; and presently there are about 1,600 telephones in use in Ranger, McAnally said.

In a brief business meeting Charles Milliken, past president, gave financial and attendance reports for the past year. He said that attendance averaged 66 percent of the membership.

Lester Crossley is president of the club, following installation of officers last Thursday noon.

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Since January ... Ranger Records 28 Accidents

Ranger has chalked up 28 automobile accidents in the first six months of 1959, just eight short of the total number of accidents reported in 1958, according to a report released from Chief of Police Don Butler.

Five persons have been injured in automobile collisions within the City limits, so far this year. This figure compares to seven injuries in 1958.

Ranger has recorded one traffic fatality, occurring within the city limits, thus far. No fatalities occurred in 1958. Fatally injured in a crash on Feb. 13, was Arthur Reddell of Ranger.

Property damage for the first six months of '59 is well over half the total damage listed for '58. Last year damages were estimated at \$1,715; this year's damages are estimated at \$1,034.

Butler urges slow, safe driving—especially during the coming Holidays when state officials are predicting heavy traffic accidents and fatalities.

At the same time, Butler urges area residents to obey all "Stop" signs and to proceed with caution.

Butler's caution comes in the wake of heavy traffic conditions, expected all over the state, during the Holidays. The Ranger area has

recorded two automobile accidents already this week, one resulting in a fatality.

The second accident occurred about 12 miles east of town Thursday night about 9:30, when a car over-turned. No one was injured.

Occupants of a '52 Plymouth escaped injury when the car over-turned about 12 miles east of Ranger about 9:30 p.m. Thursday, although the vehicle was declared a total loss.

The accident occurred on a section of Interstate 20 (U. S. Highway 80) where road construction is now in progress, on the cross-over from the new to the old pavement.

Driver of the car was James Russell, a student at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene. It is believed that he was accompanied by one or more passengers in the vehicle.

A report was unavailable this morning from Highway Patrolman Les Strawn, who investigated. Russell told by-standers that he lost control of the car when he hit a hump on the road at an angle. The car then flipped over and landed upside down on the edge of the pavement.
