Nothing can live without food, suitable temperature and an appropriate amount of moisture. This applies to man, animals, fish and plants. It also applies to bacteria! The range of needs for bacteria is slim, but when they are present bacteria can be very prolific, multiplying themselves by the millions in mere minutes. That is why food poisoning is so much more common in warm weather—and why you need to be especially careful now about preparing food and storing it. The main rule to remember is that bacteria which are apt to cause food poisoning thrive best in lukewarm foods. Thus if you make it a hard-fact habit to keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold, the chances of bacteria getting a foothold are slim. However, there are certain foods that have proven to be more susceptible to bacteria's growth and the resulting food poisoning conditions. For instance, eggs and milk mixtures, including custards and meats, either in salads or sandwiches, and potato salad—one of the popular picnic foods—are often quickly suspected when food infections occur in summer. Making sandwiches and wrapping them in wax paper to let stand for hours before eating is just asking for trouble. So keep them well refrigerated. Potato salad can give lots of trouble. The best way to avoid it is to chill all the ingredients before mixing, and then store the salad in SHALLOW containers in the refrigerator. Deep bowls retain the room temperature in the center portions. Everyone loves a picnic. Enjoy them, but a portable ice box and a thermos bottle are musts if you are going to minimize the chance of summer food poisonings. (This is a weekly feature of the Public Health Education Division of the Texas State Department of Health.)

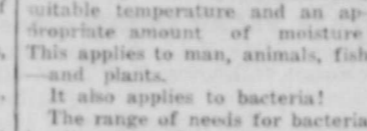

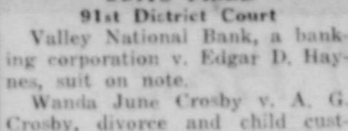

(Continued from Page One) from \$28 to \$46. After Aug. 1, it would range from \$24.95 to \$38.83.

Comprehensive insurance rates will drop 15 per cent in Gulf Coast Counties, 14 per cent in central counties and 10 per cent in the extreme western, northwestern and Panhandle counties.

Rates for \$50 deductible collision insurance will drop 14 per cent in Dallas County and 16 per cent in Tarrant County. In other parts, the reduction will be from 10 to 15 per cent.

Comprehensive insurance for the eight-cylinder Bel Air, cited above, in Tarrant County is now \$39.

Leading Cause Of Accidents Is The Driver

AUSTIN, July 9—What is the leading cause of traffic accidents? Bad Weather? Poor roads? Mechanical failure?

"None of these in themselves," says J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association. "The No. 1 cause of traffic accidents is the man behind the wheel."

"This is clear from recent Texas Department of Public Safety statistics which show that the three leading causative factors in rural fatal traffic accidents are: (1) Driving too fast for conditions, (2) Driving while drinking, (3) Disregarding warning or stop signs."

Musick said that other leading factors were: Driving on the wrong side of the road, did not have right-of-way, improper parking and following too closely.

"Aggressive safety programs, good law enforcement and specially designed superhighways all make an important contribution toward greater safety," Musick said. "But the key to the traffic accident problem is really in the hands of the driver himself."

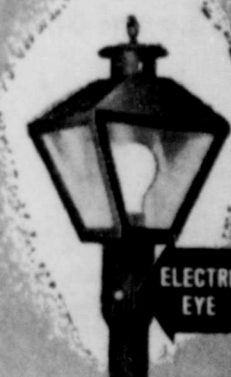

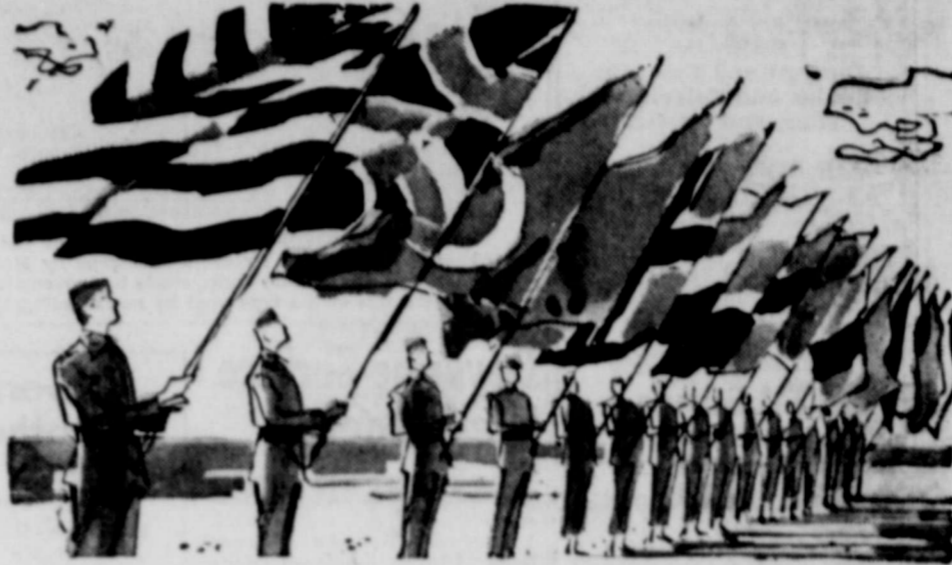

What is NATO? It stands for North Atlantic Treaty Organization, an alliance of 15 free nations, including the United States, which have banded together to protect themselves against aggression. These nations are Belgium, Canada, Denmark, France, Germany, Greece, Iceland, Italy, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Turkey, the United Kingdom and the United States.



What is its purpose? Primarily, NATO is a military alliance, but its great purpose is peace, not war. The 15 members of NATO have pledged that they will regard an attack upon any one of them as an attack upon all. They have also pledged to work together politically and to increase their ability to defend themselves by self-help and mutual aid.



How does NATO function? Each of the 15 member nations is represented in important discussions held regularly. Their main function is to defend a line which stretches from the Aleutians to the Middle East. A line which is manned by Greek patrol boats, Norwegian ski troops, French engineers, Canadian jet pilots—strength to which every NATO country contributes.

Army Field Band Will Perform At Camp Wolters

CAMP WOLTERS, Texas—The U. S. Army Field Band which begins its tour of the Fourth U. S. Army area this week, will give a performance on the lawn of Camp Wolters' U. S. Army Hospital Tuesday at 8 p.m.

The band's program ranges from popular tunes to classical arrangements, and each program includes military marches, some composed by the conductor. Featured during the band's performance here will be a drum novelty act, which has received praise from professional jugglers as well as musicians; vocal and instrumental specialty numbers; the Four Hits, a vocal quartet; and one of the main highlights of the evening's performance, the famed Soldiers Chorus.

The 125 man aggregation, known internationally as "The Kings of the Highway", is under the direction of Maj. Chester E. Whiting.

The band was organized by Major Whiting in March, 1946, and he has been commanding officer and conductor continuously ever since. First known as the U. S. Army Ground Forces Band, it was redesignated the U. S. Army Field Band in April, 1950.

The 180th Field Artillery Band was sent to the South Pacific Theater soon after Pearl Harbor was attacked. Under Major Whiting's

command, the bandmen served in the lines during the Battle of Guadalcanal. He then organized the 180th and another band into the American Division Band, and took part in operations on other islands.

The executive officer and assistant conductor of the band is Capt. Robert L. Bierly. Captain Bierly was assigned to the band soon after it was organized in 1946.

Narrator of the band is Paul V. Henry, who has been with the organization since August, 1946, and since August, 1947, has been principal narrator.

The Soldiers Chorus, composed of 30 bandmen - vocalists, which is featured on every program of the band is under the direction of Specialist 7 Eugene W. Coughlin.

Formed in 1947, the Soldiers Chorus is considered to be one of the best large voice groups on the concert stage.

The Four Hits, featured quartet of the band, are former Oklahoma State University students who had gained considerable fame as a vocal group before they joined the Regular Army in July, 1957.

The band is under the control of the Chief of Information, Department of the Army. The Fourth Army concerts are part of a four month tour which will take the band throughout the Middle West, South Western states, and Alaska.

Admission to the Camp Wolters concert is free and the public is invited to attend. For those visitors who are unfamiliar with the post, directional signs will be placed along the main roads. At the concert site, sufficient parking space will be available and military policemen will be on hand to direct traffic.

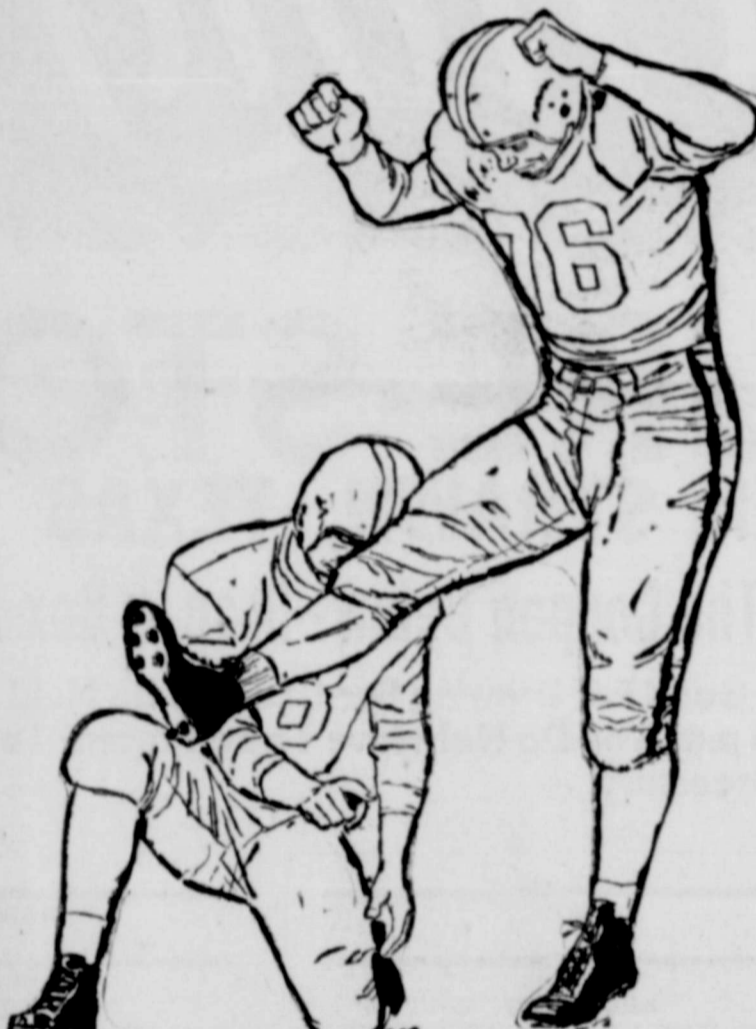

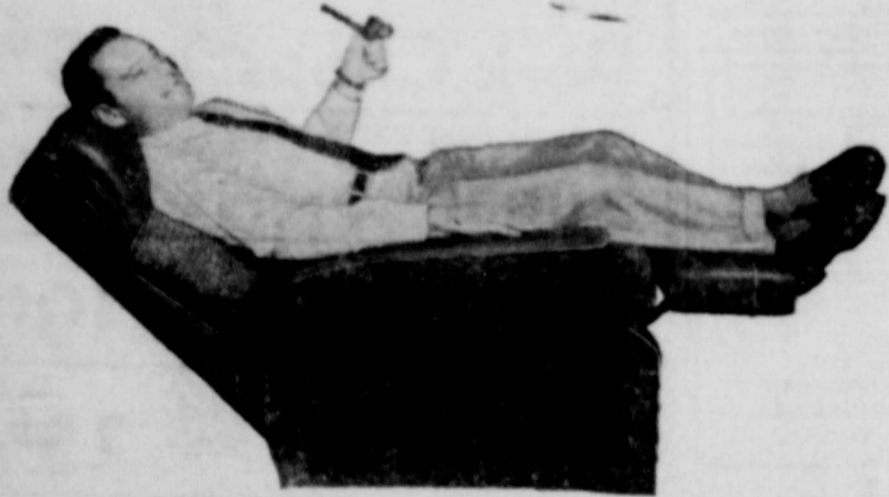
