

## BOATING THRU RANGER WITH ON...

BEANS, TOBACCO and BASEBALL are the subjects of this column. Just thought we'd tell you now so you'd know if you wanted to read it or not. Might as well read it anyway.

Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Brummett of Ranger grow beans 24 and one-half inches long in their spare time. California seeds placed in Texas soil, produce the long green beans—called yard-long beans. They're supposed to be good to eat.

Ranger grows bigger and better beans, peanuts, pecans and figs.

TOMORROW (Friday) will mark the birthday of this old man who NEVER tells his age correctly. He's been smoking since 16 or 17 (just a few years back), but wouldn't advise anyone to do likewise.

However, our research department came up with the following interesting items on tobacco:

The most-printed picture in the world has ever known is fast disappearing from the pockets of some 65,000,000 Americans, who have been carrying it around daily for years, most of them without ever realizing it. The picture is a portrait of DeWitt Clinton, former Governor of New York, on the little blue tax stamp which until recently the law required on packaged cigarettes.

Printed up to April were 496 billion Clinton stamps. That's 22 billion a year!

In colonial Virginia, clergymen were paid in tobacco, an average salary of 16,000 pounds, then equal to about 80 pounds in money. Their fee for a funeral service was 400 pounds of best leaf; for a marriage ceremony, 200 pounds.

Mrs. Andrew Jackson and Mrs. Zachary Taylor, the first ladies of the land, were said to be heavy pipe smokers.

More than three million members of U. S. farm families—three out of every 20 farm residents in the country—depend on tobacco as their most important cash crop.

The 18th century was the great Age of Snuff, with no less than 200 brands available. And fortunes were spent on snuff boxes.

Tobacco can be grown successfully in some parts of East Texas, but there has never been any production in Eastland County so far as it is known.

And Ranger fans will have an extra treat in store for them—beginning July 23—when they will have a chance to see lots of baseball in the Area 3 Little League Tournament here.

## First Federal Assets Listed At Record High

Assets at First Federal Savings & Loan Association of Ranger are at a record high, it was announced by Lester Crossley, secretary and treasurer, Monday.

At the close of business June 30, assets and liabilities each totaled \$294,624. This is an increase of \$87,109 over assets listed at \$207,515 December 31, 1958.

First mortgage loans totaled \$819,647 and other loans a r e listed at \$69,685. U. S. Government bonds and obligations total \$67,500. Other assets include stock in the Federal Home Loan Bank in the amount of \$14,800 and \$18,054 cash on hand and in the bank.

Liabilities include a savings capital of \$897,851. General re-

serves are listed at \$68,882 and other liabilities at \$11,108. A \$9,948 surplus is also noted.

Listed December 31 are mortgage loans in the amount of \$755,129 and other loans of \$54,324. U. S. Government bonds and obligations were then \$47,500. Stock in the Federal Home Loan Bank totaled \$14,500. Cash on hand and in the bank was \$35,576.

A savings capital of \$820,834 was noted. General reserves on Dec. 31 totaled \$64,159, and other liabilities were \$9,976. The surplus was the same.

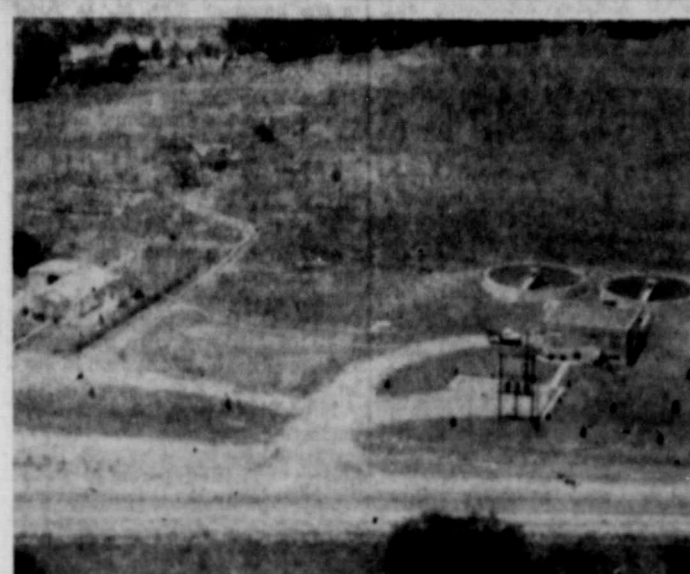

## 1,800,000 Gallons a Day ...

## Filter Plant Provides Ample Water for Area

Water is used by local citizens numerous times every day of the week.

They wash with it; clean dishes; keep plants and vegetables, trees and shrubs growing; and they drink it.

At the present time, in fact, Ranger and Eastland are consuming water at the rate of about one million 800,000 gallons a day without thinking about where this water comes.

In the West Texas area water is a pretty scarce substance. In fact, many a rancher would rather discover a water well than oil. They know that water is needed to raise sheep and cattle, to grow feed and crops. It can be used in irrigation, stored in stock tanks and utilized in growing industries.

Water is certainly a necessary item. Necessary to life and to a better way of life.

Millions of gallons are consumed locally by residents who never stop to think about the value of water. But many occasionally stop to remember the days before Lake Leon was completed when pure water was hauled into town by the barrels. However, that is a different story.

And this is the story not of Lake Leon but of the lake filtration plant. Completed shortly after the lake filter plant is operated under the Eastland County Water Supply District. Jess White, who lives at the plant with his family, has served as plant superintendent every since operations were begun on July 16, 1955.

Over an average period of 24 hours, about 100 pounds of alum (aluminum sulfate) is added to the lake water. Another 50 pounds of lime and about 70 pounds of chlorine are also used. These chemicals are added in the purification processes that make the water fit to drink.

It is consumed at a tremendous rate. During the first six months of this year, Ranger has used over 132 million gallons of water and Eastland has consumed over 84 million gallons. During the first six months of '58, Ranger used over 106 million gallons and Eastland 73 million.

The reason, White believes, Ranger consumes more water than Eastland is because Lone Star Gas Co. receives water from the Ranger line. Water flooding projects are now in progress in the Ranger area, also accounting for much water. Water flooding is used in the secondary recovery of oil. Olden receives its water supply from the Eastland line.

Last month, for example, Ranger used 29 million 867,000 gallons of water—compared with 17 million 920,000 gallons for Eastland. Ranger used more water than a year ago, but Eastland used less. However, in every other month, both Ranger and Eastland consumed more water during each of the first six months of this year than last.

There is no danger of the water supply diminishing or becoming exhausted for many years in the future, believe directors of the county water supply district, Lake Leon has a capacity of 28,000 acre feet of H-2O.

Ranger and Eastland, together, used over 47 million 700 thousand gallons of water last month. In June of 1958 this figure was a little over 42 million, 658 thousand and 600 gallons.

July is usually the top month of the year for water consumption. Last year, however, more water was used in August—a total of 54 million 640,000 gallons.

### Nazarene Church Appoints New District Supt.
