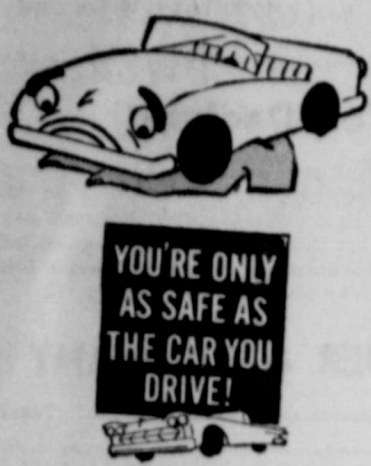

Chocolate flavored milk favorites are popular with most children. Grownups not only like them too, but the added food value from milk and a fortified chocolate flavored syrup gives every reason to enjoy these same treats at home.

Chocolate Nut Sundae
2 scoops ice cream
2 tablespoons Bosco chocolate flavored syrup
Sweetened whipped cream
Chopped nuts
Cherries

Put two scoops of ice cream in serving dish. Pour on Bosco syrup. Add a dollop of whipped cream; sprinkle on nuts; top with a cherry. Makes 1 serving. Allow 1 quart ice cream for six servings.

Chocolate Ice Cream Soda
1 tablespoon Bosco
2 tablespoons milk
1/2 cup carbonated water
2 scoops ice cream

Pour Bosco and milk into a tall glass; mix until well blended. Slowly add about one-half the carbonated water or fill glass about 3/4 full, using a thin stream from a carbonated beverage dispenser. Stir until well mixed. Float in the ice cream; stirring

slightly. Slowly fill glass to brim. With a little practice you'll get a high foam on each glass with no spilling. Makes 1 soda.

Banana Split
1 banana
2 scoops ice cream
2 tablespoons Bosco chocolate flavored syrup
2 tablespoons corn syrup
Chopped nuts
Whipped cream, evaporated or dry milk
Cherries

Peel banana, slice lengthwise into halves. Place halves cut side up, side by side in a semi-circular saucer or bone dish. Use a large deep saucer if bone dishes are not available. Place scoops of ice cream side by side in the center on top of banana halves. Pour corn syrup over center scoop of ice cream and Bosco syrup over other two scoops. Top with whipped cream, nuts and cherries. Makes 1.

There is a new killer in our midst! Actually it isn't so new. There have been deaths from this cause for a few years now.

The tragic thing about this new killer is he strikes at infants and toddlers—children—the ones that can't protect themselves!

This killer comes in several forms. He appears as a crib sheet, pillow case, bib, and worst of all, a TOY.

However, this killer is easily recognized by grown ups. It is the clear plastic that is used for so many purposes these days.

Take shirts. Bags made out of this plastic are just perfect for protecting the shirt from dust and at the same time displaying the product.

But when such plastic materials are used as crib sheets?

Last year in Texas, three infants, eight, seven and five months old suffocated because they accidentally pulled the plastic sheet over their face.

Pillow cases too, are just as deadly. Early this year a four month old child was found in bed with its head buried in a plastic pillow case.

A month later a plastic sheet claimed another victim. And still another month later a five month old infant playing with a plastic bag pulled it over her head and suffocated.

In addition one baby suffocated from a plastic bib, and just the other day a fifth 1959 victim died—suffocated by a crib sheet.

Already the total has almost equaled last year's toll.

Plastic bags have an important and useful place in modern life IF they are used correctly.

You wouldn't let an infant play with a pistol. You don't use a razor for a teething ring. So why put

something as dangerous as a plastic bag into the hands of an infant. When pressed to his face, the plastic clings. When the infant tries to breathe it clings all the tighter. The result is suffocation, because the little tike is unable to tear the material from his face.

So, protect little children from exposure to such plastic materials.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas
State Sometimes "Inherits" Property

Made your will? If not, the State of Texas may wind up as owner of your estate upon your death. Under our statutes, the estates of persons having no heirs who die intestate revert, or "escheat", to the State.

Such provisions have been carried over from the English common law. There, under such circumstances, the estate escheated to the British crown. The theory of the process is that the sovereign (or State), having been the original owner of all lands before they were parceled out to individuals, is entitled to a return of such lands when the possibilities of legal inheritance have been exhausted.

This idea has been expanded to include personal property as well as real estate. It also applies in the case of a person absent for a term of seven years and not known to exist who leaves no heirs and no will.

Presumably, there is hardly a person who does not have some individual or charity that he would prefer to have his estate, rather than have it go to the State by default, so to speak. Yet, surprisingly, estates worth many thousands of dollars escheat to the various states from time to time.

Now, before you shrug the matter off with the idea that these statutory provisions could not possibly apply to you, better think a minute. Suppose you and your spouse have no heirs besides each other and your children. Many people do fall into this category.

In event of a catastrophe resulting in death for you and your entire immediate family, no legal heirs would remain. Therefore, if you had no will, your property would go to the State. In preparing a will, it is possible to provide for such an eventuality.

In this hypothetical case, you would probably want to designate some friend as executor, to take care of all necessary arrangements and then distribute the estate according to your wishes.

On the other hand, if you have plenty of possible heirs, a will could be used to designate which of them shall participate in the division of the estate. And even if you wish your property to be distributed entirely in accordance

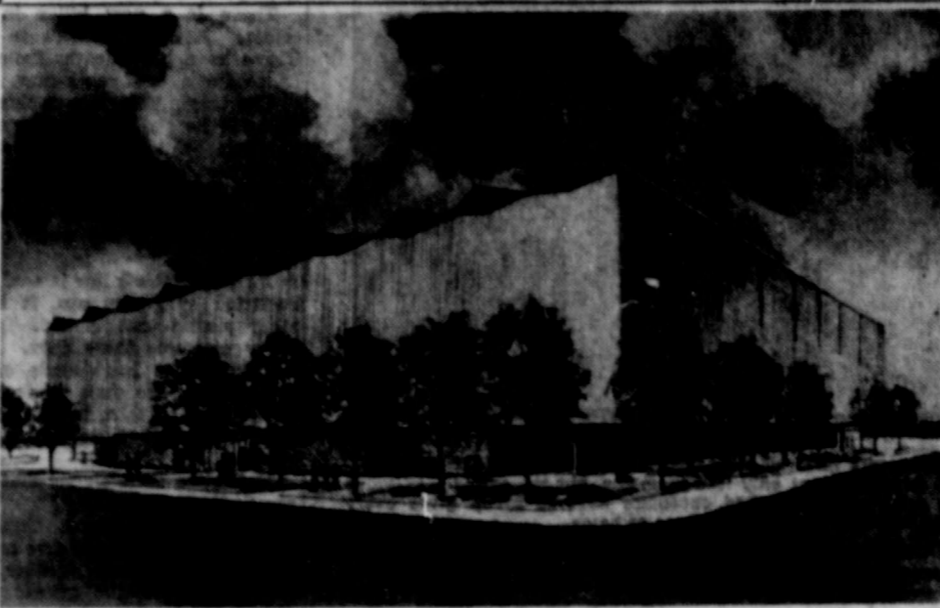
