

This idea has been expanded to nclude personal property as wel as real estate. It also applies in the ase of a person absent for a term of seven years and not known to exist who leaves no heirs and no

erson who does not have some in ividual or charity that he would prefer to have his estate, rather than have it go to the State by de fault, so to speak. Yet, surprisingy, estates worth many thousands of dollars do escheat to the various

tates from time to time. Now, before you shrug the mat or off with the idea that these statutory provisions could not possibly apply to you, beter think a minute. Suppose you and your spouse have no heirs besides each ther and your children. Many peo ple do fall into this category.

In event of a catastrophe re sulting in death for you and you entire immediate family, no legal heirs would remain. Therefore, it you had no will, your property would go to the State. In prepar ing a will, it is possible to provide for such an eventuality.

In this hypothetical case, you would probably want to designate ome friend as executor, to take care of all necessary arrange ments and then distribute the estate according to your wishes. On the other hand, if you have plenty of possible heirs, a will could be used to designate which of them shall participate in the division of the estate. And even you wish your property to be dis tributed entirely in accordance


