Junior Colleges In Line For More State Aid

Texas Junior Colleges will receive an average six per cent increase in state aid in 1960-1961, the Joint Conference Appropriations Committee report shows.

It may be changed as the 10 House and Senate members begin meeting again. Their last agreement showed \$10,090,556 to be distributed among the colleges. Most colleges were increased.

A new provision also will require junior colleges to maintain program standards equivalent to those in 4-year state senior colleges.

Ranger College will receive \$62,356 in state aid, according to the report.

The steel strike presents a situation which could have a heavy and adverse impact on our whole economy.

An industry that is basic to our economic welfare is locked in a bitter struggle. Each of us has a direct, personal interest in a solution of this grave dispute.

Our government depends for its financing upon taxes collected from wages, profits and other sources. If wages and profits decline, so does the revenue moving into the government treasury.

Because of this I wrote the Secretary of the Treasury. I asked for the best estimate available as to the effect of the steel strike upon Treasury revenue.

The reply made clear the major impact that is threatened.

The Secretary of the Treasury made his estimates in terms of the steel and related industries. He said loss in revenue to the government could go as high as \$45 million a week, if the strike is prolonged. But this is not all.

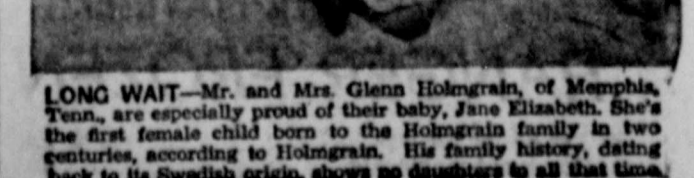
To this \$45 million estimate must be added losses in revenue that will result from the impact of the steel strike upon our entire economy.

This loss is difficult to estimate. However, I'm told it could easily equal the losses in steel and the directly related industries.

I am not suggesting we can approach a dispute such as this solely on the basis of its effect upon the Nation's Treasury.

There are questions of justice and equity and fair dealing that must be resolved. But the tremendous losses in revenue underline the clear public interest in the shutdown of the steel industry.

Every American has a personal interest in a just solution. I believe that no controversy is ever so deep that cool heads cannot reason together. I believe that no dispute is ever so bitter that common ground cannot be found.

Dr. Ted Nicksick Speaks to Lions

Dr. Ted Nicksick, President of Ranger College, spoke to the Lions Club on testing of talents at Thursday's luncheon. Dr. Nicksick said that it had been proven through research that it is possible, through various aptitude tests, to test children as early as the sixth grade, and learn what their interests are. He went on to say that these tests are not entirely accurate, the motivation or desire of the individual will have some bearing as to whether they follow their interest into later life.

The Doctor did research on a group of 500 young people who had been tested, and gone on through college and entered the various professions. Eighty per cent of the group tested were working in the field of work that the earlier test had shown that they had an interest in.

There is an average of one out of four college freshmen that change their studies after they have been in school for awhile. These tests, if given to all college freshmen would lower this average he believes.

These tests range from the sixth grade level to, and through college level. There are various types of tests for testing interest, aptitude, IQ, and many other fields.

Dr. Nicksick plans to use a series of these tests at Ranger College this fall.

August 9 - 15 Is Agriculture Teachers' Week

Declaring the importance of agriculture and agricultural occupations, Governor Price Daniel recently designated the week of Aug. 9 - 15 as "Vocational Agriculture Teachers' Week." During that week the Vocational Agriculture Teachers of Texas will meet in Fort Worth for their annual state conference.

Beverly Dudley Jr., Vocational Agriculture teacher at Ranger High School plans to attend the conference.

In issuing the official memorandum, Governor Daniel emphasized the increasing importance of training in agriculture and took note of the important function of the vocational agriculture teachers of Texas in agricultural education.

During the week, the states nearly one-thousand vocational agriculture teachers, teacher trainers, members of the state staff and friends will review accomplishments, study new techniques and ideas in both technical agriculture and teaching methods, and hear from leaders in the fields of agriculture, farm organizations and education.

Night Life Of A Bass Is Told

The largemouth bass has been called a lot of names—some respectful and some unprintable. However, no one has yet come up with a label to describe its nocturnal roving, a habit shared by experienced fishermen.

Bass, and most of their aquatic cousins, are notorious nighttime carousers, notes a well known outdoors motor company. During summer, especially, bass spend the day in deep, cool waters, lying practically dormant and unresponsive to the most tempting hook-laden proposals. But when the sun slips over the horizon, these wily gamesters go on the prowl and the tempo of fishing picks up.

When evening cools the surface, bass move upwards and feed off the top waters. And, at such periods, they may hit with reckless abandon. Night feeders rarely follow a lure as they often do during the daytime. Instead, they strike quickly and with great force.

The best technique for catching fish by starlight is to cast surface plug with a loud splash right next to the shore. Let it lie motionless for 30 seconds, then retrieve with a jerky motion. "Old linesides" will investigate this "goody" with about as much caution as a yanking lot attendant displays when jockeying cars into position.

While this night life of bass is well known, the exact feeding times cannot be predicted. It may occur during any period from dusk until dawn, and may last only a few minutes. So, when you try your hand at night, be prepared to stick it out. Fish long and patiently, you'll hit the jackpot before the night is over.

County Citizens to Feel New Sales Tax

Eastland County citizens, along with Texans throughout the state, will feel a heavier tax load during the coming months.

The \$93,000,000 a year tax bill passed by the Texas Legislature Thursday sets an all-time state high, with most of the money due to come direct from the man on the street through sales taxes.

Rep. Paul Bradshaw and Senator Floyd Bradshaw, who represents this county, both voted in favor of the tax bill.

These taxes are contained in the bill as finally passed: Cigarettes, increased 3c a package to 8c, estimated additional revenue, \$64,458,000 for two years; Cigars and other tobacco except snuff, approximately 25 per cent of the wholesale price, \$14,500,000;

Corporation franchises, 75c more per \$1,000 taxable assets the first year and 50c the second year, \$32,500,000;

Motor vehicle sales, raised from 1.1 to 1.5 per cent, \$15,500,000;

Utilities gross receipts increased 20 per cent, except telephone and telegraph which already have a higher rate, \$3,100,000;

Boats and motors, 1.5 per cent, \$2,800,000;

Air-conditioners, 3 per cent, \$7,675,000;

Radios, television sets, phonographs and component parts, \$8,200,000.

Furs, precious stones and precious metals, 3 per cent over \$25, \$5,000,000.

Natural gas severance beneficiary tax, 1.5 per cent of value at well, \$15,600,000.

Hotel-Motel occupancy, 3 per cent, \$6,600,000;

Liquor, from \$1.408 per gallon to \$1.68 and wine increased 20 per cent, \$6,334,800.

Other tax laws are recodified. Legislators expect to add \$4,000,000 in two years by improved collection of taxes generally through stronger enforcement features, plus \$300,000 from special motor fuels now escaping taxation.

The bill also contains nearly \$700,000 of tax reductions for the two years. About \$50,000 of this will be on theatre admissions and the remainder on an assortment of taxes where collection costs almost as much as the revenue.
