Here are some other new rules: If the farm had a tenant in 1958 or 1959 there will have to be a tenant on the farm in 1960 and he must share in the conservation reserve payments.

Fair rental rates value of the land will help determine the soil bank per acre rental rate to be established for the farm.

Dove Shooting Begins Sept. 1 In North Zone

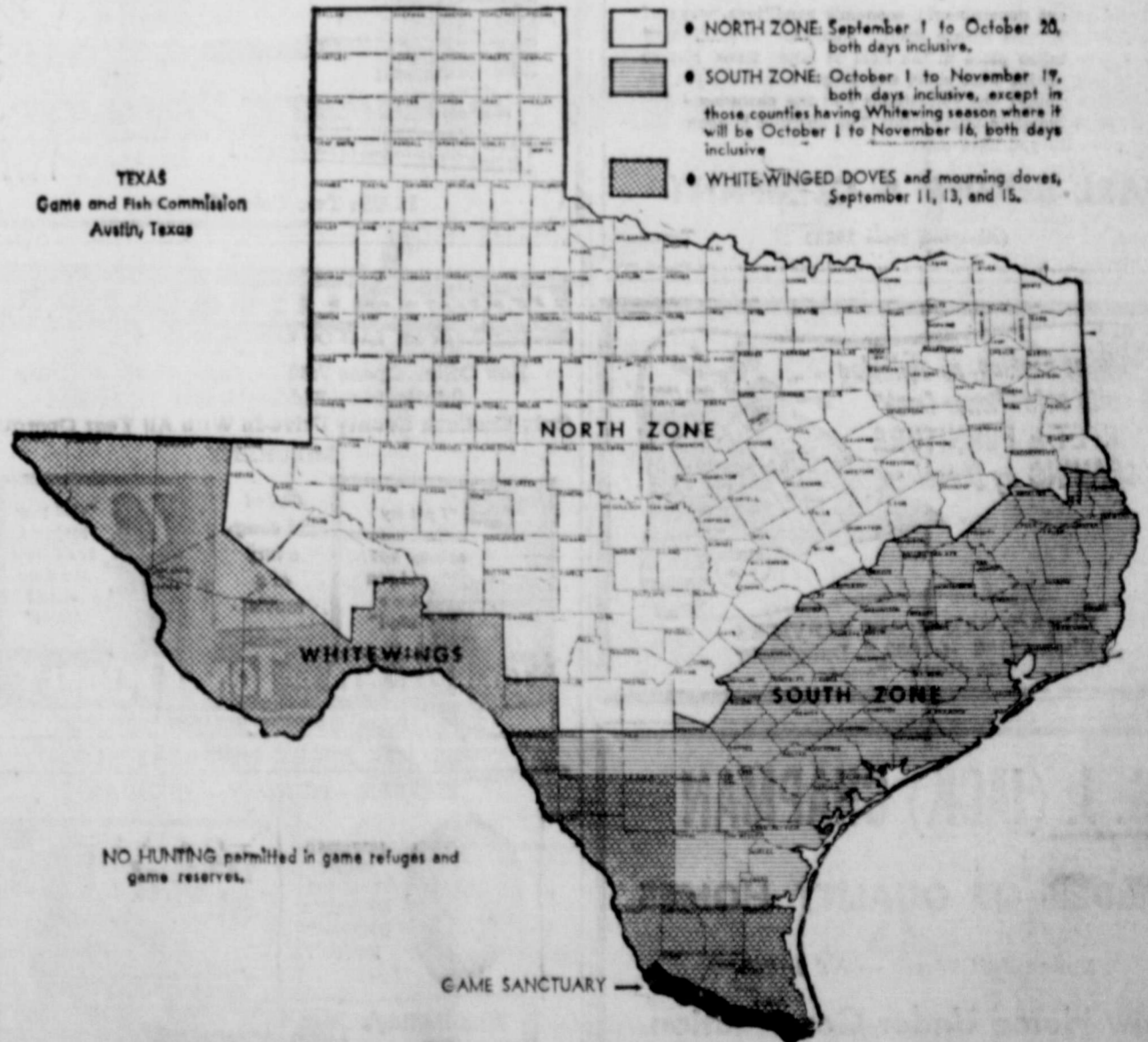
Jill was appointed by a committee selected by the president. She accepted the appointment Thursday at the Lions Club luncheon.

MOURNING DOVE - WHITE-WINGED DOVE Open Seasons 1959

MOURNING DOVES: Daily bag limit—10. Possession limit—not to exceed 20.

WHITE-WINGED DOVES: Daily bag limit—10. Possession limit—10.

NOTE: When both mourning doves and white-winged doves are possessed—Possession limit—20, in the aggregate, and not more than 10 may be white-winged doves.



SPECIAL NOTE: Unlawful to take white-winged doves or chachalacas South of U.S. Highway 83, formerly State Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas, marked on map as "Game Sanctuary."

SHOTGUNS: Must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity, may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.

SHOOTING HOURS: Mourning doves, 12 noon to sunset—except in areas having whitewing season, where the shooting hours will be from 2 p.m. to sunset on September 11, 13, & 15, only. White-winged doves, in season, 2 p.m. to sunset.

Clear Plastic Cover To Grass Establishment
COLLEGE STATION — Better grass establishment on yards, earth dams, and terrace channels and ridges is possible on the Plains with the use of plastic covers according to the results of experiments conducted at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station at Bushland, Texas in 1958.

E. B. Hudspeth, Jr., agricultural engineer of the USDA's Agricultural Research Service, said the plastic covers aided the retention of soil moisture and insured better stands of grass. He added that the tests were conducted on Pullman silt clay loam soil which covers an area of approximately 12 million acres of medium to fine-textured soil, commonly referred to as the "hardlands" of the Texas Panhandle and adjacent states. In this type of soil, the top 1/2 inch usually dries rapidly.

Clear and black polyethylene plastic sheets, 6 and 4 mils thick, respectively, were compared on non-replicated 2-by-2 foot wooden frames. Each frame had a 2-inch metal strip fastened around each side to prevent evaporation loss and a 4 d precipitation infiltration around the edge of the plastic.

Blackwell switchgrass was used for the tests. Seed were placed approximately 1/2 inch below the soil surface. Two rows of seed with 40 seed in each row were planted in each treatment. The seed were covered with dry soil. Adequate moisture supplies at depths below the seed zone were obtained by well in advance of each seeding trial. Moisture content in the 3 to 12-inch depth averaged 21 percent in all trials, said Hudspeth.

The plastic frames were kept over the plants 5 to 7 days, a period long enough to insure germination of most of the viable seed, stated Hudspeth.

Under the clear plastic and on uncovered plots normal grass seedlings emerged and continued to grow as healthy plants. The seedlings under the black plastic were abnormal and had little survival ability. They lacked proper chlorophyll content and were spindly. These studies showed, Hudspeth added, that except during the hottest months, June, July and August in the Texas Panhandle, clear or translucent plastics will create an environment favorable for grass seed germination and emergence.

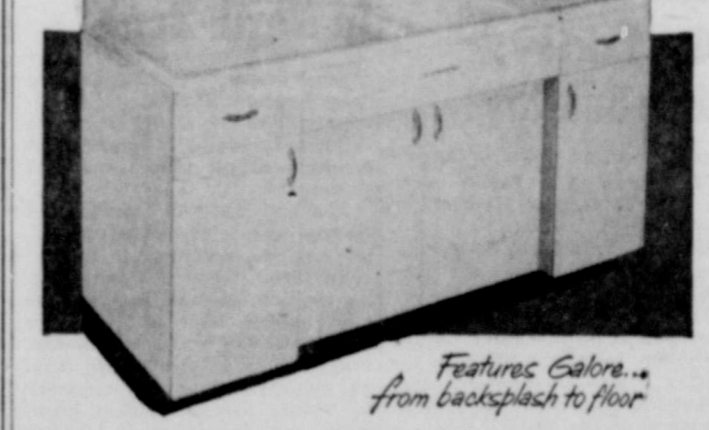

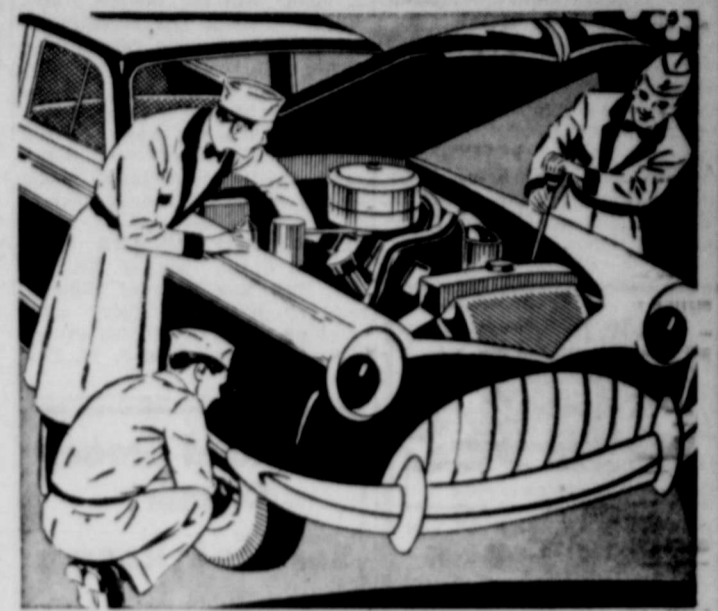
