Rangers Stop Mountaineers On Goalline

A change up in the Ranger College Rangers backfield, put the needed fire and desire back in the club and gave them a 26 to 6 victory over Eastern Oklahoma College of Wilburton, Okla., Saturday night in Ranger.

The change saw Kenneth Hart move from quarterback to halfback, Jim Brock running quarterback and Jimmy Knickerbocker as slot back and R. E. Duggan remain in the fullback position. This combination operated smoothly together until Jim Brock was taken out of the game with a twisted ankle. Jackie Waggoner was sent into the game to pilot the Rangers through the rest of the game and the 26 to 6 win.

The fired up Ranger defense led by the outstanding work of big Vernon Singleton, stopped five drives by the Oklahomans on the 16, 3, 1, 8 and 10 yard lines. He slowed the only scoring drive momentarily on the four, but a penalty gave the Mountaineers a new start and the lone score.

The Rangers offense led by Brock and Waggoner kept the Oklahoma line in line so tight that they could move the ball real well. The mixing of running plays and passes worked to the extent that led to four long scoring drives of 80, 74, 32 and 65 yards.

Kenneth Hart and R. E. Duggan collected the 26 points that Ranger scored with Hart getting the first score after an 80 yard drive. Hart scored off of a four yard pitch-out from quarterback Jim Brock.

Hart added the extra point with a kick through the uprights.

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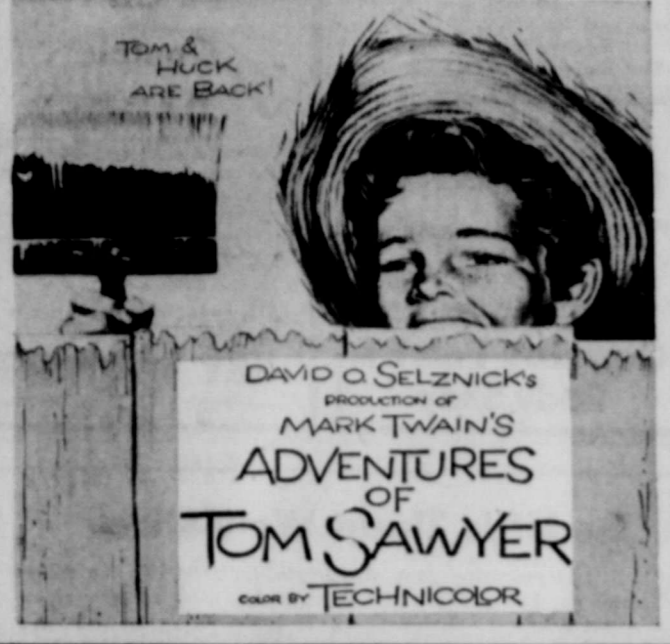

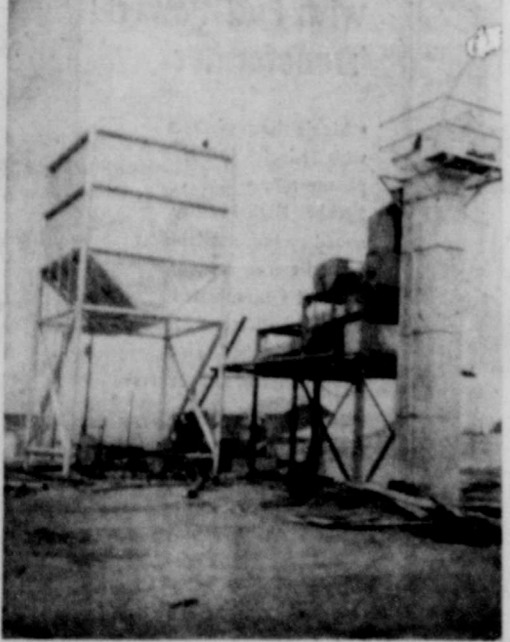
