He caught three passes for good yardage.

## Bulldogs Try 7-AA Favorite In Cisco Friday Night, 8 p.m.

Ranger Bulldog fans who will make the trip to Cisco Friday night will see two of the finest backs in the 7-AA district perform.

Charles Lipsey, Cisco halfback, who has scored 93 points to lead the district in scoring, and Duane Hale, fullback, who is tied for second place honors with 62 points, will lead the Cisco attack. Lipsey has averaged over 16 points per game in the six games this season. Ranger has only 17 points per game counting the whole team. The possibilities of the Bulldogs coming home with a win is very slim.

It would be the upset of the year, and the Bulldogs haven't been much of an upsetting team so far this season.

Cisco is the favorite to win the district crown, and has a season record of six wins and no losses. They defeated Dublin 48 to 20, Comanche 46 to 0, Anson 28 to 0, DeLeon 34 to 6, Haskell 56 to 0 and Ballinger 33 to 26.

Ranger has played two of the teams that Cisco defeated, beating Dublin 38 to 8 and losing to DeLeon 24 to 20.

There is one small weakness that showed in the Cisco unit against Ballinger, and that was the pass defense. Ballinger made 185 yards against Cisco by passing and four touchdowns. Ranger has had a strong passing attack this season until Winters stopped it last week.

### Economist Sees Little Change In Turkey Prices

COLLEGE STATION — Turkey prices for the rest of 1959 will probably not improve very much, if any, over those of the same period in 1958. This price outlook is based upon the indicated record crop of turkeys this year, according to John G. McManey, extension economist. This record crop will probably be five percent above the number produced last year and one percent above the record established in 1957, he adds.

Even though a large number of turkeys have been produced in 1959, a good proportion of this crop has already gone to market. As a result, the number of turkeys to be marketed in the October-December period will be about the same as last year. Another favorable factor is that cold storage holdings on Sept. 1, 1959 totaled 18 percent less than for the same period last year.

In Texas, says McManey, there is an increase of 69 percent in the number of turkeys of the light varieties, and the number of the heavy varieties is down eight percent from last year. However, light varieties make up only 18 percent of this year's turkey crop. Therefore, total production in Texas will be up only slightly from 1958.

The totals for Texas show that in 1958, 3,720,000 turkeys of all breeds were raised. In 1959, this number is indicated to be 3,725,000, an increase of only 5,000 over last year.

Turkeys tested during August in the U. S. for pullorum disease totaled 129,058, down 39 percent from August, 1958. These figures may indicate a trend in the testings during the last quarter of 1959, as they are usually an indication as to what production is likely to be in the year ahead. However, turkey producers and others should not only watch pul-



Mrs. Sandra Shelton Home Demonstration Agt. Miss Willene Sockwell Assistant HD Agent

Last week at the Eastland Civic League and Garden Club, Mrs. Ed Wende from Cisco, served a delicious pumpkin pie for dessert. Since we are nearing Thanksgiving and Christmas, here is the recipe for those who might like to use it.

PUMPKIN CHIFFON PIE

- 1 cup brown sugar
3 eggs
1/2 cup evaporated milk
1/2 tsp. salt
1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spices
1 cup cooked pumpkin
1/4 cup cold water
1 envelope plain gelatin
3 tablespoon sugar

Soak gelatin in cold water. Cook brown sugar, egg yolks, pumpkin, milk, spices and salt over low heat until thickened. Add gelatin, stirring until dissolved. Chill in refrigerator until it begins to set. Beat egg whites until stiff, add 2 tablespoons sugar. Fold pumpkin mixture into egg whites. Fill a baked pie shell. Chill, serve with whipped cream and toasted coconut.

Thanks to Mrs. Wende for this delicious recipe.

Fresh pork, which is rich in nutritional value, is an especially good buy this fall.

Pork ranks high in thiamine and is a good source of other B vitamins (riboflavin and niacin). Like other meats it rates for protein and iron.

Fresh pork has a relatively short storage life compared to other meats. This means a few in the refrigerator and from 3 to 6 months in the freezer. To refrigerate pork, wrap loosely and place in the coldest part of the refrigerator.

Before freezing, trim excess fat from the meat, and package in moisture- and vapor-resistant wrappings. You may want to separate cuts into meal-sized portions before packaging for the freezer. Wrap carefully so packages will be airtight to prevent meat from drying out. Then quickfreeze at zero F. or lower and store at zero F. or lower. Cooked pork can be frozen satisfactorily, but it is not as desirable as pork frozen uncooked.

Fresh pork sausage, like most ground meats, is highly perishable and loses quality when kept in the refrigerator for longer than a day or two. However, it will keep in a freezer at zero for a few weeks. Uncooked cured pork cannot be

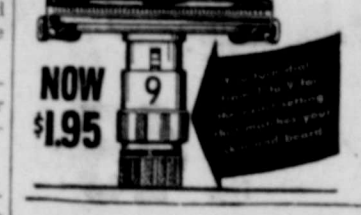

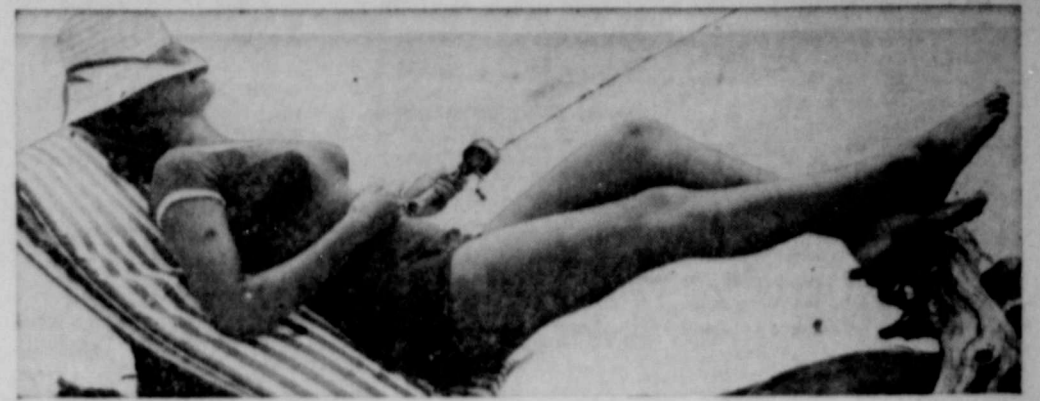

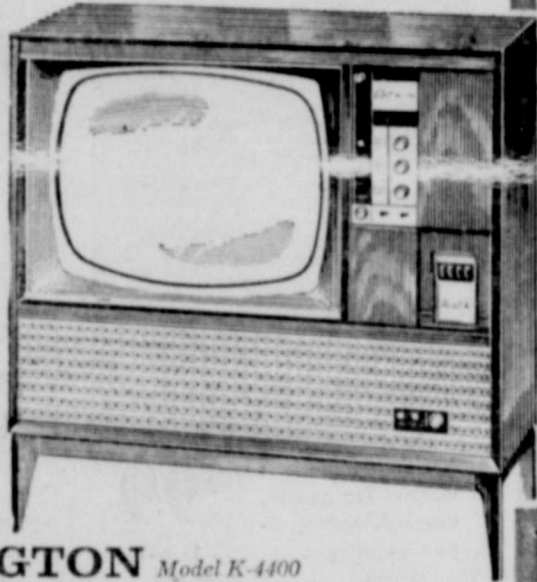

Take the case of Mr. S. Some time ago he went into his lawyer's office and laid in front of his attorney a will which had been prepared for him about a year previously. He said that he had made a few changes in it and wanted to know whether his attorney thought the changes were all right.  
Mr. S. was attempting to change two items of his will by drawing lines through certain words in these items and interlining, in his own handwriting, the changes he wanted. He was not attempting to revoke his entire will, but merely trying to change these two items.  
If Mr. S. were to die with his will in that condition, the probate court would not recognize the changes that he had made, but would probably probate the will as it was originally written. Mr. S. was surprised to learn this and immediately requested that a new will be prepared.  
After the will has been once executed, changes cannot be made legally by crossing out parts of a will and interlining corrections or additions. To change a will, an entirely new will must be written and properly executed—or an addition by way of a codicil must be executed.  
Since a will does not take effect until the death of the person making it, the provisions of the will should be reviewed by the maker at least once a year to be sure that changing conditions and circumstances have not been such as to require a modification of the will. It is very easy to postpone doing a thing of this kind, but failure to do so may result in the intentions of the maker of the will being thwarted.  
There are many changing circumstances which would be brought to his attention if a person would review his will at least once a year in the light of circumstances at the time.  
Such things as deaths among the legatees or devisees named in his will, births, marriages or divorces in the family, accidents or which make it desirable to increase sickness among the close relatives or decrease the amount given them, substantial increase or decrease in the value of the estate of the person making the will, death of all witnesses to the will

and many other factors may cause a person to want to execute a new will or add a codicil to his old one.

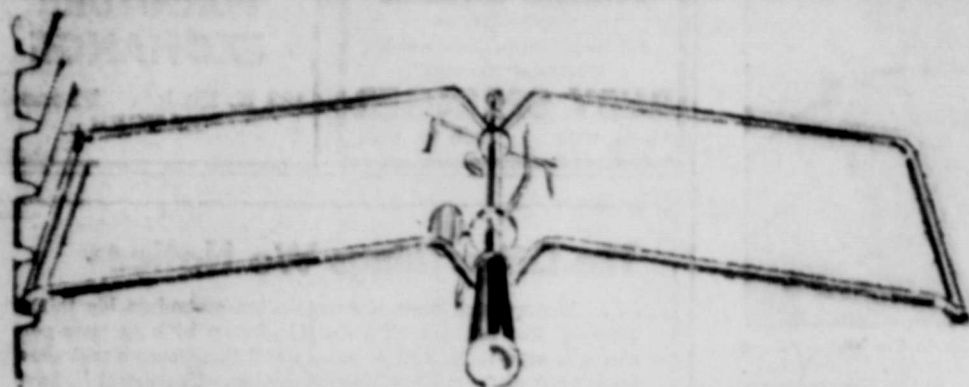
