County Savings Bonds Sales at 70% of Goal

Savings Bonds sales during September totaled \$25,931, in Eastland County. Guy Parker, chairman of the Eastland county Savings Bonds Committee, announced today that sales for the first nine months of 1959 were \$381,817 or 70 per cent of the yearly goal.

E and H bond sales in Texas amounted to \$115,170,643 during the first nine months of this year. This figure represents 63 per cent of the yearly sales goal. "The new improved interest rates on E and H bonds will aid thousands of Americans who are already buying savings bonds and will help induce others to purchase the new 'best ever' savings Bond," Parker pointed out. "All bonds purchased since June 1 of this year now earn an attractive 3-3/4 per cent interest when held to maturity and old bonds earn at least 1/2 per cent more than before. Considering the safety, ease of purchase and the new attractive interest rates savings are truly the 'best buy ever,'" Parker concluded.

Barefoot Boys Give Pups Hard Race At May

The Ranger Junior High Pups defended the May Junior High Thursday night 14 to 8, but had a hard time containing a couple of barefooted halfbacks from May. Ranger only made five first downs in the entire game, but rolled up 166 yards and two touchdowns on three passes to stay ahead of the fleetfooted May halfbacks. May scored in the second quarter on a slant off of right end, and ran the extra point for an 8 to 0 lead.

Ray Newnham of Ranger took the May kickoff on the five yard line and ran it back to the 30, and from there Newnham hit Jesse Renteria with a pass good for 70 yards and the score. Newnham ran the extra point to tie the game, going into the half. In the third quarter, after an exchange of punts, Ranger got possession of the ball on their own 26 yard line. The pass play from Newnham to Renteria was again good for 74 yards and the score, to put Ranger ahead 14 to 8. The try for extra point was no good.

In the fourth quarter Newnham intercepted a May pass and ran it back to the Ranger 39. A 22 yard pass to Lee Aushorn carried to the May 29, but Ranger was forced to punt from there. May then took over and began a goalward march but time ran out, leaving Ranger with the 14 to 8 victory. May picked up 10 first downs in the game. Ranger received four penalties for 30 yards while May had one for 5 yards. Arthur Mendoza, Douglas Browning, Gary Harris and Billy Mathews turned in outstanding play on defense, leading the assault against the barefooted boys from May.

Four Ranger Citizens to Attend State Convention

Four members from the First Baptist Church of Ranger will be among the 6,000 persons from virtually every town and city in the state expected to attend the 74th annual Baptist General Convention of Texas Nov. 3-5 in Corpus Christi's municipal auditorium. They are Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Bruce, John Usery and Rev. Ralph E. Perkins.

Official messengers to the convention, representing more than 1 1/2 million Texas Baptists, will take action on what some Baptist leaders term "the most significant proposals in the history of Baptist in Texas." The messengers will vote on the board's recommendation to leave the 191-member BGC executive board. Meeting in Dallas Oct. 2, the board voted to recommend that the convention completely reorganize the state administrative organization, establishing two new commissions, the State Mission Commission and Human Welfare Commission, and reorganizing an existing commission, the Christian Education Commission.

The messengers will vote on the board's recommendation to leave Wadley Hospital in Texarkana, rather than accept the hospital as a gift from the institution's board of trustees. The hospital, built with the aid of \$1 1/2 million federal Hill-Burton funds, was offered with no strings attached to the denomination, but some critics argued that accepting the gift might violate the Baptist stand on separation of church and state. Other Baptist leaders say that since the government had not accepted by the hospital's board long before the gift was offered to the denomination, there would be no violation of the principle involved in the transaction.

In other action, the denomination will vote on a record \$12,880,000 Cooperative Program budget for world missions and will elect more than 250 pastors and laymen as trustees or members of boards of directors to Texas Baptist institutions and organization. Convention officers will also be elected. (Continued on Page Two)

Something nice happened in your Red Cross office today—a thank you note from a seaman stationed on the West Coast. The beginning of the story began recently with a telephone call from the Red Cross chapter of Memphis, Tenn. Westland Eastland County Chapter please meet the west bound bus due in Ranger at 9:00 a.m. and deliver a message to BTJ Donovan M. McCollum, also to make him a loan and see that he started back to Memphis as soon as possible. His father had dropped dead an hour prior to the call. The father that had never been ill in his life; the father that had told his soon-to-be less than 24 hours before the telephone call. The sad message was delivered and the seaman was taken to a private home in Ranger to wait until the next East bound bus was due. As the usual case the young man had very little money, just enough to eat on if nothing more than coffee and a hamburger was

ordered. Seemed he did not want to tell his father just how broke he was. A ticket was purchased, an extra five dollars advanced for meals enroute back, a telephone call to his mother in Memphis, all possible because you support your Red Cross through the Community Chest. The loan has been repaid and the money is back in the chapter treasury waiting to help another person in need.
