At least five Eastland County Farm Bureau members will attend the 26th annual convention of the Texas Farm Bureau in San Antonio Sunday through Wednesday.

County delegates include Glen Justice, Mrs. Justice, B. O. Spiegle, A. W. Wright and R. L. Hicks. In addition there are four alternates, Mrs. Joe Bob Browning, Melvin Adams, John Lovelace and Mrs. A. W. Wright. Justice, president of the Eastland County FB, will head the delegation.

Other speakers include Mrs. Robert Crane of New Jersey, vice-chairman of the AFBF Women's Committee; and Herman Aaberg, Chicago, livestock expert for the AFBF.

A high-light of the convention will be the state finals of the Texas Farm Bureau Queen Contest. Thirteen queen candidates, all winners of district eliminations, will compete for the state crown on the evening of Nov. 3 in the Grand Ballroom of the Hilton Hotel Annex.

Another special attraction at this year's meeting will be Talent Find entertainment on the opening day of the convention, Sunday, Nov. 8.

The convention will end Wednesday afternoon, Nov. 11. The final day official voting delegates from the counties meet in business session to debate and amend or reject or adopt tentative resolutions which have been forwarded.

Attempt to Murder Charge Faces Berry

Charges of assault with intent to murder have been filed against a 58-year-old Eastland man following a shooting Wednesday afternoon.

H. C. Berry, who lives north of Eastland, is in Eastland County jail today in lieu of \$5000 bond set by Peace Justice C. E. Owen. The man he allegedly shot, M. G. Brock, is in "satisfactory" condition at Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Brock was shot once in the middle right chest with a .22 calibre automatic rifle. Five persons were eye witnesses of the shooting, which occurred at about 1:15 p.m., according to Sheriff J. B. Williams.

Brock is foreman of a Lone Star Gas Co. crew. The crew was working near the Texas Lightweight Aggregate Co. plant on the southwest outskirts of Eastland when Berry drove up in a pick-up truck, climbed out and announced he was going to shoot Brock, witnesses told Sheriff Williams and Chief Deputy Johnny Boyd.

Other members of the crew were Ben Howard, Lavoyce Hale, Harold Ewing, Wayne Simpson and Floyd White. Berry was overcome and the gun was taken from him. Brock talked to him for several minutes, trying to "cool him off."
