County Pecan Show Plans Announced

Plans are nearing completion for the Seventh Annual Eastland County Pecan Show to be held in the Rawson Furniture building, 416 Ave. D, in Cisco, December 11-12 according to officials in charge of the show.

The show is being sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Cisco Chamber of Commerce according to Sam Kimmel, Cisco, Chairman of the Agriculture Committee of the Chamber of Commerce. Oscar Schaefer, Cook Community, is president of the pecan association.

Entries for the show will be accepted from growers not only in Eastland but also from adjoining counties. It was explained, however, that entries are limited to one entry each of the papershell varieties but with no limit on the number of entries of seedling or native pecans.

A quart of pecans constitutes an entry. The nuts are shown on paper plates and this amount fills up a nine inch paper plate it was explained. All entries must be entered by 9:00 a.m. on Dec. 12. They can be left at the County Agents office in Eastland or at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce office prior to this time, it was said.

The nuts that win first place will be sent to the state pecan show to be held at A&M College sometime in January. In the past Eastland County has won her share of the honors in the state show according to County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper.

A pecan queen contest will again be held in connection with the show. Mrs. Peggy Gallagher, Cisco, will have charge of the contest.

The County Home Demonstration Council will have charge of the pecan bake show also to be held in connection with the show.

Rangers Blast Blinn 25 to 0

The Ranger College Rangers got the homecoming fever Saturday night and pounced on the Blinn Buccaneers for a 25 to 0 victory in a cold wind blasted Bulldog stadium.

It seemed that Bill Phillips, halfback, and Prentiss Gidney, fullback, figured the only way to keep warm was to keep moving, and move they did. Gidney, the leading ground-gainer, carried the ball 28 times for 192 yards, and caught one pass for 18 yards for a total gain of 210. Phillips carried the ball 29 times for 191 yards and caught one pass for 12 yards for a total of 203 yards. Phillips scored 24 of Ranger's 25 points. Dean Faulkenberry, slot back, received four passes for 56 yards, and Jim Hamilton caught three passes for 33 yards.

The fighting Rangers line led by James Stanford and James Hoskinson kept the Blinn offense bottled up through the entire game, allowing the Buccaneers only four first downs and never allowing them to get past their 20 yard line.

The Rangers got the scoring parade started about mid-way in the first quarter when Bill Phillips went over from six yards on a quick-opener to climax a 65 yard drive. The try for the extra point was no good.

Prentiss Gidney got the next scoring drive underway by intercepting a pass on the Rangers 43 yard line. A pass interference penalty and a 24 yard run by Gidney moved the ball down to the Blinn 20 yard line only to have the ball go over to Blinn on downs. James Hoskinson rushed the Blinn quarterback and caused him to fumble the ball and recovered it on the Blinn seven yard line. Phillips found a hole on a trap play that gave him clear sailing into the end zone. Kenneth Hart kicked the extra point to give the Rangers a 13 to 0 lead at half time.

Following the kickoff after halftime Gidney picked up 20 yards on four carries, then Phillips found himself clear on the 49 yard line and outran the Blinn secondary to the goal line. The try for extra point again was no good.

The remainder of the third and fourth quarter until there was just three minutes left to play, was a punting contest, until the Rangers took over on their own 42 yard line following a 53 yard quick kick by Blinn. It was Phillips again getting the score from nine yards out, following the powerful

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Ham With Beer Glaze
1 smoked or ready-to-eat half ham (6 to 8 pounds) Whole cloves
1/2 cup brown sugar 2 tablespoons prepared mustard
1/4 cup beer or ale
Place ham, fat side up, in shallow baking pan. Bake in a slow oven (325° F.). If smoked, bake 25 minutes per pound, or until meat thermometer registers 160° F. If ready-to-eat, bake 14 minutes per pound, or until meat thermometer registers 130° F. Forty-five minutes before ham is done, take from oven and remove rind, if necessary. Score fat surface and stud with whole cloves. Mix together brown sugar and mustard; stir to a paste. Gradually add beer, stirring until blended. Brush part of mixture over ham. Continue baking, brushing frequently with remaining mixture.
Note: If desired, glaze may be doubled for a whole ham.

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Meat Pie, Idaho Style



There's nothing like Mashed Potatoes to make a little go a long way. Like stretching yesterday's stew to make a second hearty meal simply by ringing the casserole with meat and gravy with a halo of creamy-white, light-as-a-cloud mashed potatoes.

But good they must be, blessed with the distinctive flavor only fine potatoes can give. So have a care in your shopping. "Idaho" of baking fame mash to a snowy fluff whether your choice is the russet-skinned beauties in the vegetable stands or the packages found on your grocer's shelves of "quick mashed" made from Idaho-grown potatoes, as labels will show.

For this dressed-up favorite, place in a casserole the stew made of beef, lamb or veal partnered with peas and carrots and plenty of good brown gravy. Cover with lid or foil and heat through in a 350 degree F. (moderate) oven while whipping up the mashed potatoes.

When the potatoes are like you usually serve with the main course, place them as a border just inside the casserole. If desired, dust with grated Parmesan cheese. Return, uncovered, to a slightly hotter oven for a final heating. Serve piping hot with a salad of crisp greens, butter-toasted French bread, warm apple pie and cheese... M-m-m!

For the best of mashed potatoes, peel "Idaho" just before ready to cook. Put in shallow wide kettle with 1 inch of cold salted water. Cover. Bring water to boiling point rapidly. Reduce heat to simmer. When potatoes are fork-tender, drain off liquid saving it for soups and gravies. Shake kettle of potatoes over low heat to dry off any remaining liquid. Mash by hand or electric mixer until free of lumps. Add hot milk with butter melted in it, salt and pepper to suit taste. Whip until light and fluffy. If mashed potatoes must wait any time, place kettle in pan of near-boiling water, using a folded dish towel between kettle and cover to absorb steam. When using packaged quick mashed potatoes, follow directions on package. Additional milk and butter may be used, if desired.
