

Rangers vs. Wranglers County J. C. Rivalry

The Ranger College Rangers will travel to Cisco to take on the Cisco Junior College Wranglers in their last regular season game Saturday at 8 p.m.

It will be a Texas conference game, but the outcome of it will not affect the conference championship, which was decided last Saturday in a tie between Henderson County and Navarro. They are co-champions of the Conference the second year in a row.

The Wranglers will be trying hard to win this game to break a two year losing streak. This is a traditional rivalry game between the two colleges which has been going on for many years. The Wranglers have failed so far this year to get a victory, but have played some top Junior College very hard fought games. Their lack of depth has hurt them in several cases. They trailed Henderson Co. 8 to 6 going into the fourth quarter, only to have the reserve power of Henderson Co. overpower them in the final quarter 36 to 6. Navarro could only muster 14 to 0 lead until the final minutes of the game when Cisco weakened to let Navarro go ahead

43 to 0. They seem capable of playing anyone a hard fought three quarters. It is possible that if they ever get ahead in the early part of the game, they might find that added incentive to hold on through that fatal fourth quarter.

Ranger is heading toward one of their best years in some time with a 6-4 record, and will be trying to make it 7-4 against Cisco.

The Rangers, who have lost four games this season have defeated some of the top Junior College teams. Paris, Tyler, Murry State of Oklahoma. Their losses came from Cameron, Texarkana, Navarro and Henderson Co.

The Rangers will go into the game Saturday night looking for the services of some of their top performers. Kenneth Hart, who has played both quarterback and halfback has a broken rib and will miss the game; Clyde Smith, center, received a knee injury against Blinn and will sit this one out.

R. E. Duggan, fullback, who has not seen action in the past three games will still be on the injury list. Vernon Singleton, tackle, and Carrell Richardson, guard, will only be ready for limited duty.

Injuries in the backfield have caused Coaches Puryear and Babb to resort to a spread formation to try to give their quarterback a little better protection. Dean Faulkenberry who has played both end and slot back, will probably see some action as the deep man in the formation if it is used Saturday night.

Junior College Back of the Week For the third time this season the Rangers have placed a player on the Dallas Morning News Junior College Player of the Week.

Kenneth Hart, quarterback, made it in the game against Tyler, Jim Hamilton, end, made it in the game against Tyler, and this week due to his fine performance against Blinn, Bill Phillips, halfback was named Junior College Back of the Week.

Phillips had a fine night against Blinn, running with the ball 29 times he picked up 191 yards, caught one pass for 22 yards and threw one pass complete for 15 yards. And in the process of this performance he scored 24 of Ranger's 25 points.

Pventias Gidney, fullback, was named honorable mention back of the week for his performance in the same game, along with James Stanford, guard, as lineman of the week on the honorable mention list.

Ranger College Player of Week

The Ranger College coaches chose Prentiss Gidney as the player of the week for his impressive showing against Blinn Junior College last Saturday night before a cold Homecoming crowd.

His smashing drives through the big Blinn line were a definite factor in the 25-0 victory. This is a true success story, for Prentiss had not been on the starting lineup until the No. 1 fullback got hurt. Gidney has filled his shoes well, though, for in the last three games he has chucked up a good many yards and has come through in the clutch when two or three yards were needed. This week he received honorable mention as Back of the Week in the Dallas Morning News.

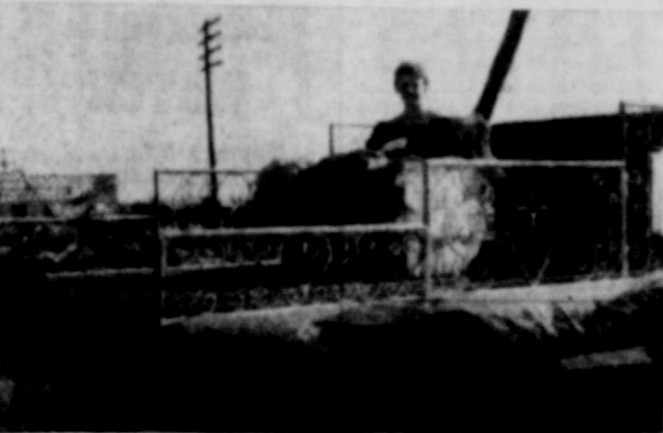
Gidney has the weight, (185 pounds) that is so necessary in the fullback position, and he puts a lot of power and speed in his thrusts.

Cisco and DeLeon Decide Bi-District At Ranger Fri. Nite

The Cisco Lobos will be the favorite at Ranger Friday night when the first round of the State AA grid playoffs begins. The Cisco High School Lobos, champions of 7-AA, and the DeLeon Bearcats, titleholders in 8-AA, will decide who will wear the bi-district crown in a game to begin at 7:30 p.m. in Bulldog Stadium.

The teams met earlier in the season (October 2) and the Lobos came out on top, 34 to 6—a score not entirely narrative of the hard fought contest. Since that time, both have come through district play undefeated, the Lobos now owning a 10-0 record, and the Bearcats with an 8-2 mark.

The Bearcats' only other loss was to Eastland, also early in the season. They wound up the regular season's play last weekend, trouncing Granbury 30 to 0. Other victims include Ranger, Cross Plains, Gorman, Goldthwaite, Dublin, Hamilton and Comanche.

They operate from a variation of the T-formation and draw a good deal of strength from a large, speedy backfield, headed by 175-pound Stanley Kirk; and a strong defensive line.

At the helm of the Bearcats is Bill Little, who pushed his team into the runner-up spot in the 8-AA wars of 1958. His assistants are John Baskin, Charles Clary and James Perkins.

The Lobos have in their favor one of the outstanding AA backfields in the state, and a high-geared offense that has totaled 427 points this season. Heading the quartet are Charles Lipsey, who captured the area scoring title with 169 points, and Duane Hale, who has gained 1,918 yards this season in 138 carries.

They are coached by Zac Henderson, who is in his second year as head mentor, assisted by Jerrell Rice, Keith Miles and James Shanks, all in their initial year in that position. Henderson guided the Lobos to a bi-district title in 1958, losing to Stamford in regional play.

The Lobos, who will be looking for their eleventh straight victory of the season in the game,

after defeating DeLeon, Dublin, Comanche, Anson, Haskell, Balinger, Ranger, Eastland, Winters and Coleman. The 49 to 6 victory over Coleman clinched the district crown for the Lobos.

Cisco also has a formidable defense (on the ground), allowing an average of only 89.6 yards rushing to 10 opponents. On the other hand, the Lobos had nine touchdowns passes thrown against them in district play alone.

The Bearcats have obviously improved since the last meeting of the two, and a slam-bang ball game is expected. DeLeon will be the official home team, by virtue of a coin flip as officials met to make plans for the contest.

The winner Friday night will meet the winner of the Quannah-Stamford contest—scheduled for Friday afternoon at Quannah. Stamford holds a previous 46 to 6 win over their bi-district opponent. Tickets for the Cisco-DeLeon skirmish went on sale in both Cisco and DeLeon early Wednesday. Charges at the game will be \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for students.

TAX-MAN SAM SEZ:
Well, the tax people have a new income tax form out this year. They call this new form the 1040-W. It doesn't replace the old Form 1040 or the 1040-A card form. It is a single sheet, buff colored form printed on both sides. The title of the form tells what it is for—

Optional Form for Wages and Salary Income and Not more than \$200 of Interest and Dividends

You can itemize your deductions on this form as well as the 1040. You can't itemize deductions if you use the 1040-A card. You can take the standard deduction on any of the three forms. All of the forms will be available at the Post Offices and the Internal Revenue Service in January.

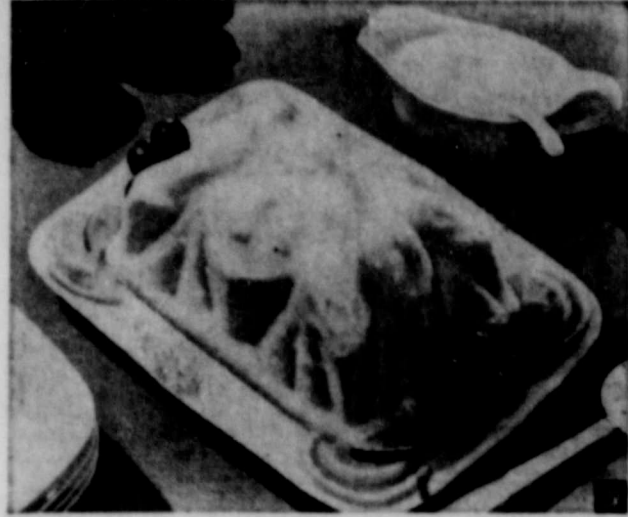

For this low-calorie treat use any favorite fresh, canned or frozen concentrated fruit juice. Orange, lemonade or limeade are excellent flavor choices in the frozen juice line-up. The preparation calls for the softening of unflavored gelatine in a little cold water; dissolving the gelatine over boiling water; stirring in sugar and the concentrated juice. When the mixture is chilled until lightly thickened, egg whites are added and the whole mixture beaten until tripled in volume. The snow can be chilled until firm in a decorative mold or in individual serving dishes.

Fruit Snows
1 envelope unflavored gelatine 1 can (6-ounces) frozen concentrated fruit juice (orange, grapefruit, grape, limeade, lemonade)
1/2 cup cold water 1/2 cup sugar
3/4 teaspoon salt 2 unbeaten egg whites

Sprinkle gelatine on cold water in top of double boiler to soften. Place over boiling water and stir until gelatine is dissolved. Remove from heat; add sugar and salt; stir until dissolved. Add frozen concentrated juice and stir until melted. Chill until mixture is the consistency of unbeaten egg white. Add egg whites. Beat with electric or rotary beater until mixture begins to hold its shape. Turn into a 6-cup mold or individual molds; chill until firm. Unmold and serve with *Custard Sauce which utilizes the remaining 2 egg yolks. Yield: 6 servings.

***Custard Sauce**
1 1/2 cups milk 3 tablespoons sugar
1 whole egg 3/4 teaspoon salt
2 egg yolks 1 teaspoon vanilla

Scald milk in top of double boiler. Beat whole egg and egg yolks in sugar and salt. Gradually add small amount of the hot milk, stirring constantly. Return to double boiler and cook, stirring constantly, over hot, not boiling water, until mixture coats the spoon. Remove from heat; cool. Stir in vanilla.

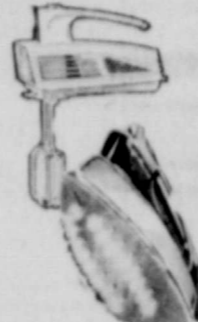

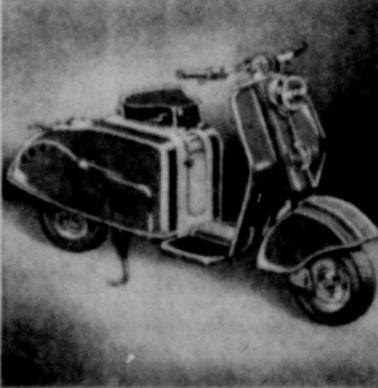

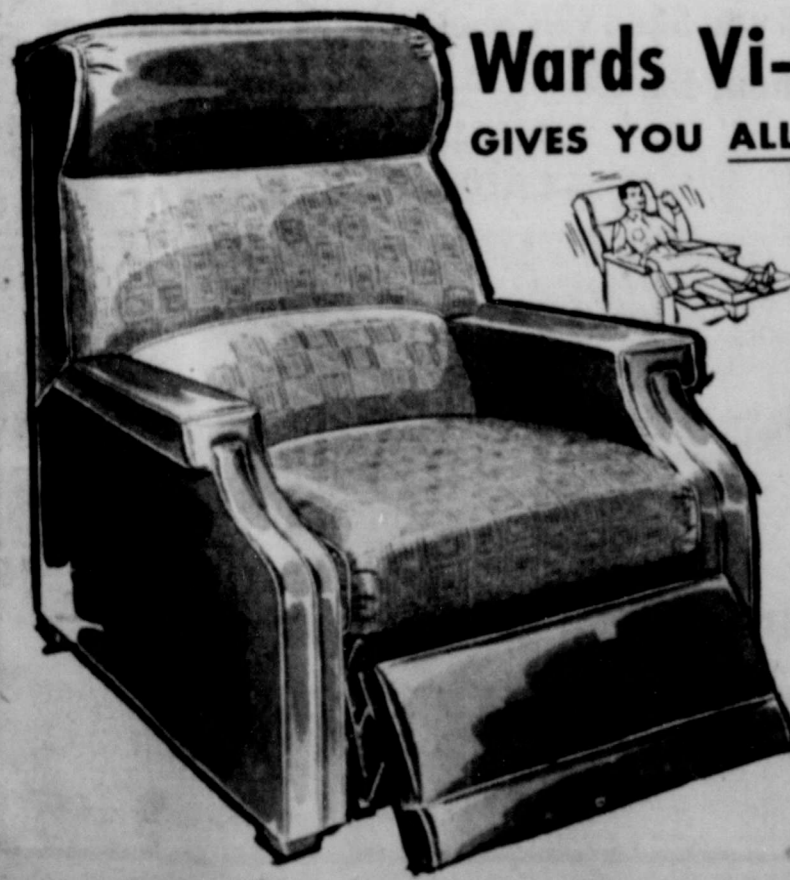

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

"LAWYER TALK"
Many persons feel that the "whereases", "aforesaids", and other legal verbiage used by lawyers are intended only to confound and confuse the layman. Nothing could be further from the truth. In drafting legal documents, the lawyer attempts to

draft them in such a way as to exclude all ambiguities. In the last analysis, a legal document means what some court at some future time shall declare that it means. As a consequence, it is the lawyer's duty to his client to attempt to draft the instrument in such a way that it can mean only one thing.

Most any paragraph of non-legal language contains numerous ambiguities. When a lawyer refers to the "deed aforesaid", he is attempting to make it clear beyond question that the deed he is referring to is the deed mentioned in a prior portion of the instrument. Likewise, when he prefixes a legal document with a long list of "whereases", he is simply reciting pertinent details to

show the facts of the situation that lead to the execution of the instrument. The difficulty with drafting a document in layman's language is that to the trained analyst such language is susceptible of several meanings, and consequently is likely to lead to litigation. It is the draftsman's purpose to avoid litigation which is usually expensive for the client.

Another reason why lawyers use legal language is historical in nature. Thus most deeds declare that the grantor "by these presents does grant, sell, and convey" the land in question to the grantee. Each of the words recited has a technical meaning. The words together have frequently been construed by the courts and consequently the lawyer knows in using them that their meaning is settled, and that they will operate to properly transfer the title. He would be inviting litigation for his client, if instead of using these words, he devised new language to express the same purpose. He could only say, "While I think the language that I have used will accomplish the purpose, I cannot be sure of it."

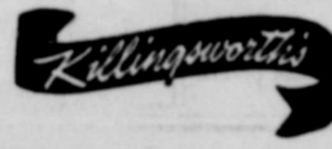

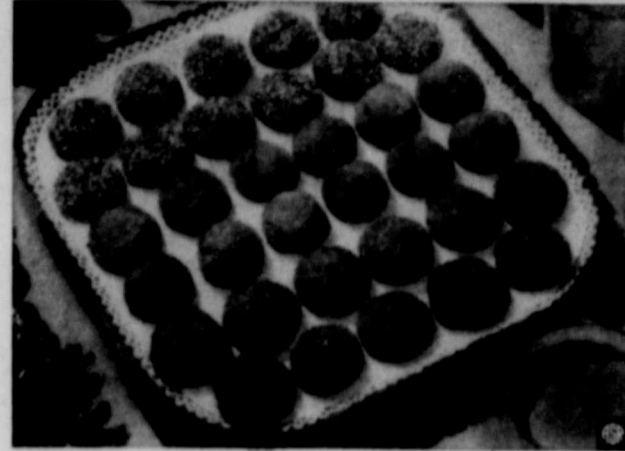

The molasses-and-raisin flavor of spicy Ginger Nuts will make a hit with youthful cookie connoisseurs on your holiday guest list. Baking and eating holiday cookies are two activities children love. Plan your baking sessions so the youngsters can help mix, bake and decorate.
 Even if your helpers eat all they make, you'll know that cookies made with enriched flour give important amounts of three B-vitamins and food iron. When guests arrive, nothing brings as much pleasure as a tray of assorted holiday cookies, your own home-baked specialties and your baker's.

Ginger Nuts

3 cups sifted enriched flour
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 teaspoon soda
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
 1/2 cup dark molasses
 1/2 cup melted shortening
 1 egg, beaten
 1/2 cup raisins
 1/2 cup plain or colored sugar, or decorating (2 1/2 ounces)

Sift together flour, sugar, soda, salt and spices. Add molasses and shortening to beaten egg. Add raisins to flour mixture and stir to coat raisins with flour. Add liquid to dry ingredients and stir with a spoon, then knead by hand until well blended. Roll dough into pieces the size of large marbles. To decorate, roll each piece in plain or colored sugar or multi-colored decorating. Place on ungreased baking sheet and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 10 to 12 minutes. Makes 6 to 7 dozen cookies. These will keep up to 4 weeks.
 Cookies may also be left plain before baking. Then, while cookies are still oven-warm, shake them in a paper bag with confectioner's sugar until coated. These make attractive cookie "snowballs."

tients. Formerly they were sent only to tubercular hospitals, but this year they will be made available for patients in mental hospitals and special schools.

Wherever possible the hides should be sent to L. M. Rathbone, Austin taxidermist, who will handle them out to the tanneries.

Hunters should rub salt on the green hides before sending them in. If the hides cannot be delivered direct to the taxidermist they should be left with the nearest frozen food locker plant. These locker plants then will route them to Austin over motor freight lines which have agreed to handle them when they are marked "charity"

On hides west of the Pecos, they should be routed to the Russell Williams Frozen Food locker on N. Grand Street, Odessa. From there they will be picked up by Omar Dreiling of San Angelo and routed into Austin.

From Austin they will go to tanneries, and then be sent to the hospitals for use of patients in handicraft.

The entire operation is on a cost-free basis, under direction of the Board of Hospitals and Special Schools.
