All District Team Is Dominated by Cisco

Cisco completely dominated the District 7-A all-district team, named by coaches from the six circuit schools. The Lobos landed seven men on the first team, Ballinger placed three and Coleman got one spot.

The second team is made up of five Winters players, four from Coleman, two each from Ranger and Eastland and one each from Ballinger and Cisco.

It has been a long time since any district team captured so many first team positions. The Lobos also nailed down five honorable mentions, Winters had five players on the honorable mention list, Coleman and Ranger each placed three, Ballinger had two and Eastland one.

The first team is made up of eight seniors, two juniors and one sophomore. Ends making the mythical team were Jerry Forbes, Coleman senior, and Billy Jones, Ballinger junior. Tackles are Jack Qualls, Cisco senior and Joe

Davidson, Ballinger junior.

Both Cisco guards made the select team. Jim Sitton, a sophomore, and Gerald Darr, a senior, won the berths. Robert Calloway of Cisco is the first unit center. He is a senior. Three senior Cisco backs and one Ballinger senior make up the backfield. Delbert Schaefer is the quarterback, Duane Hale is the fullback and Charles Lipsey and Dalton Hoffman are the halfbacks. Hoffman is the Ballinger contribution.

Work to Begin In June, Smith Says

The Texas Highway Department has approved plans to pave the Lake Leon road and incorporate it in its farm to market roads in 1960. Eastland County Commissioners accepted the State's recommendation Monday morning and Gordon Smith, resident highway engineer, said the work would probably begin in June.

The work will involve 5.4 miles of new farm-to-market construction from the intersection of Farm Market Road 570 and FM Road 2461 south to FM Road 2214. Cost of the project will be approximately \$124,000.

When the road is completed it will give area citizens a paved loop around the 8,000 acre foot lake. It will answer a dream of Eastland and Ranger planners.

The Highway Department also announced plans to spend \$152,000 for capital betterment on the farm-to-market road system in Eastland County during 1960. The two county projects call for improving the North Copper Creek bridge and approaches just east of State Highway 36 on FM Road 587 at an estimated cost of \$12,000. The other project will improve of 10.2 miles on FM Road 2214 from FM Road 570 south-east to FM Road 571 at an estimated cost of \$120,000.

The capital betterment or perpetuation money is in addition to the regular construction and maintenance program.

The Highway Commission has approved the appropriation to improve existing highways in the county and little or no additional right of way requirements are called for, Robert J. Milligan, District 23 engineer explained. A total of \$67,400 was allotted to the nine counties in the district.

Rangers Climax Season With Orange Bowl Win

The Ranger College Rangers finished their 1959 season Saturday by defeating the Monterrey Tech and Nuevo Leon University All-Stars 49 to 31 in the Mexican Orange Bowl, before a crowd of 8000 spectators.

The Mexican All-Stars threw a passing attack at the Rangers that they couldn't stop in the first half and matched touchdown for touchdown and led at the half 25 to 21 over the Rangers. The second half, James Stanford led a second-half defense that stopped the All-Stars for only one touchdown while the Rangers, led by Bill Phillips, Prentiss Gidney and Jim Hamilton, rolled up 28 points.

It was a clean, hard-played game and well officiated. The All-Star team gave the Rangers an "Ole" well done cheer as they left the field.

The offensive duel broke loose in the middle of the first quarter with Ranger scoring the first touchdown. Bill Phillips broke into the open on his own 12 yard line and went 88 yards for the score. Kenneth Hart kicked the extra point.

Five plays later the All-Stars got their first score when Raul Anaya, quarterback, hit Arturo Zepeda, end, with a pass. The try for extra point was no good.

The Rangers scored again in the first quarter with a play that went 74 yards. Hart pitched out to Phillips and he in turn lattered back to Hart who then threw a pass to Jim Hamilton who went all the way for the score. The try for extra point was no good.

On the first play in the second quarter the All-stars hit pay dirt again when Anaya threw to Alfonso Serna 36 yards and the score. The try for extra point was no good.

The All-Stars went ahead following a short Ranger punt that gave the ball to the All-Stars on the 40 yard line. The scoring play was a pass from Anaya to Zepeda, good for 6 yards. Jose Orendain kicked the extra point.

The Rangers regained the lead minutes later when Jim Brock threw to Prentiss Gidney on a screen pass that covered 36 yards. Kenneth Hart ran the extra points to make the score 21 to 19.

The All-Stars came back shortly before the half with a pass to Serna which set up the touchdown on the one-yard line. Orendain carried over from the one. The try for extra point failed and the All-Stars led at the half 25 to 21.

Following the half Bill Phillips scored on two plays carrying 40 yards and seven yards for the score. Hart threw to Wayne Cronser for the extra points.

The All-Stars came right back with Anaya hitting Garcia in the end zone with a pass. The try for extra point was no good.

Ranger took the lead seconds later when Brock completed two passes, one to Hamilton for 40 yards, and the other to Gidney for the final 16 yards and the score. Gidney ran the extra points.

The All-Stars threatened to score again when an interference penalty gave them a first down on the 9 yard line. But the Ranger crew finally got their defense tightened up and held them for

Two Die and Five Injured In Accidents

Two persons were killed and five others injured in four separate Eastland County highway accidents Sunday and Monday.

The dead are Archie Herbert King of Farmersville, who was killed in a one car crash east of Ranger, and William A. Alsbrook of Gorman, who died in a one-car accident east of Gorman.

Here are details of the four accidents.

Archie Herbert King, 49, of Farmersville, Texas was killed and two others injured at 6 p.m. Sunday when their car went into a ditch 15 miles east of Ranger. The three had been deer hunting.

Injured were the dead man's brother, John M. King, 44, of Farmersville, and the driver of the car, P. B. Turner, about 45, of Alto, Texas.

Texas Highway Patrolman Les Strawn of Eastland, who investigated the accident, said that the brakes on the car apparently went out. The driver, in an effort to miss an upcoming bridge, swerved to try and direct the car through an open gate on the other side of a large ditch. When the car reached the gate there was no bridge and it tumbled into the ditch.

Turner and John King were in Ranger General Hospital Sunday night. Turner is in serious condition with cuts and bruises and in-

ternal injuries. King is not believed seriously injured.

In another Eastland County accident, William A. Alsbrook, 68, of Gorman, a retired mechanic, was killed and his wife injured in a one-car accident 3.5 miles east of Gorman at 12:30 a.m. Sunday.

Investigating Patrolmen Les Strawn and E. M. Watts said that the car apparently went out of control. James Alsbrook, son of the dead man, came upon the wreck and carried his parents to the Gorman Hospital where Mr. Alsbrook was pronounced dead.

Mrs. Alsbrook is being treated in the Gorman Hospital for cuts and bruises and internal injuries.

Funeral for Mr. Alsbrook is pending at Higginbotham Funeral Home in Gorman.

Survivors include the widow; two sons, James of Gorman and Edward of Phenix, Ariz.; one brother, Estes of Oklahoma; one sister, Mrs. Lexie Carter of Kerrville; and one grandchild.

The other two accidents occurred Monday. The first involved a 1959 Chevrolet driven by Mrs. Elizabeth Brown Bush, 18, of Ranger, and a 1955 Cadillac driven by Morris Pryster, 66, of Strawn.

Ranger Police Chief Don Butler, who investigated both accidents, said Pryster had pulled his car off of Highway 80 and was

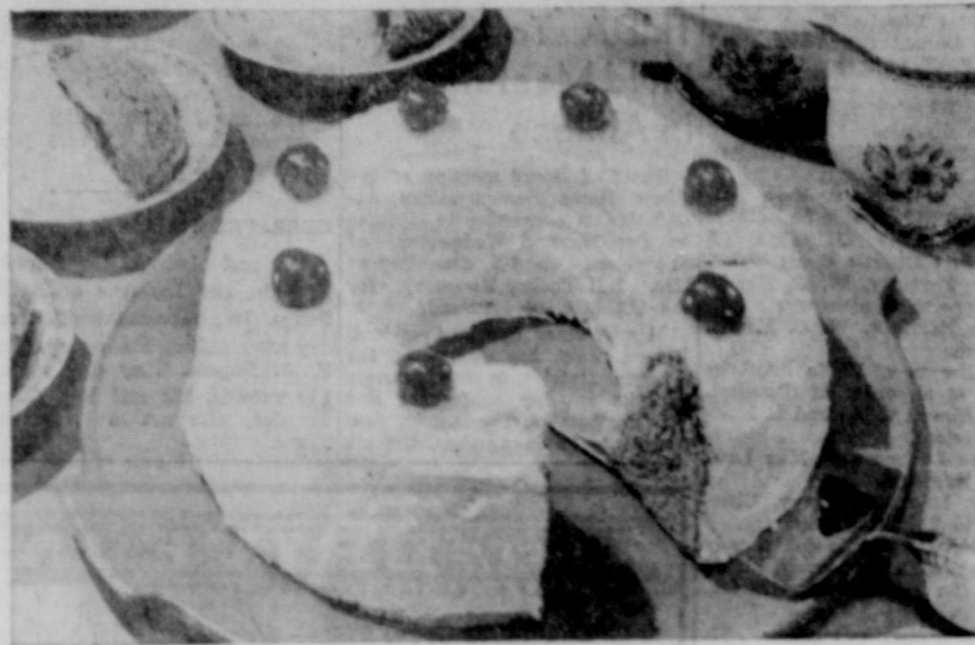

Spice and cherry holiday cake rounds out yule menu.

The holidays call for gayly decorated cakes. When friends drop in to exchange greetings, when the children entertain, and for the Christmas dinner, there is nothing more appropriate than a beautiful and hospitable cake.

Spicy Holiday Cake Ring

One 1-pound, 1-ounce package pound cake mix, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/4 teaspoon allspice, 1/2 cup milk, 2 eggs, 1/4 cup maraschino cherry juice, 1/2 cup finely chopped maraschino cherries (about 15 cherries), 1/4 cup butter or margarine, softened; 3 cups sifted confectioners' sugar, 3 tablespoons maraschino cherry juice, maraschino cherries. Combine pound cake mix,

cinnamon, nutmeg, allspice and milk; beat well. Add eggs; beat well. Add 1/4 cup cherry juice; beat well. Fold in 1/2 cup finely chopped cherries. Turn into lightly greased and floured 9-inch ring mold. Bake in slow oven (325 degrees F.) 1 hour, or until cake tests done. Cool. Turn out on cake rack. Blend butter or margarine, confectioners' sugar and 3 tablespoons cherry juice until smooth. Spread on cake ring. Garnish with cherries.

Cherry-Banana Cake

Two cups sifted all-purpose flour, 1 teaspoon baking soda, 1/4 cup butter or margarine, softened; 1 1/2 cups granulated

sugar, 2 eggs, beaten; 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/4 cup vinegar, 1 cup mashed bananas, 1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries, well-drained (about 20 cherries), sifted confectioners' sugar.

Sift together flour and baking soda. Combine butter or margarine and granulated sugar. Beat until light and fluffy. Add eggs, vanilla, vinegar and bananas; mix well. Add flour mixture and cherries to batter or margarine mixture; mix well. Turn into greased and floured 9-inch layer cake pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 45 minutes, or until cake tests done. Cool. Sprinkle with confectioners' sugar. Both recipes make a 9-inch cake.

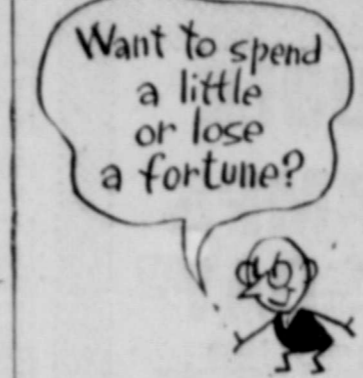
