





ASC Guarantees Tenant Rights in **Wheat Program**

the Castro County Agricultural Sta- June Belknap. bilization and Conservation Service Office called the attention of county grain farmers to four key provision in the regulations, which concern the relationship between farm owners and tenants in the 1962 wheat stabilization program and barley

eed grain program. ASC Secretary Charlie Hill said n the statement that these rule and regulations of the new law are as important to the landlord as they are to the tenant. He said that Gov ernment forms, to be signed by farmer participating in either of the programs, cannot be approved the County Committee if any

of the provisions are violated. The first provides that the land lord or operator shall have give the tenant full opportunity to parti ipate in wheat and feed grain pro

Secondly, the rules state that the county committee cannot give its approval, if it determines that the landlord has, in anticipation of the program, reduced the number of tenants on his farm.

Thirdly, approval cannot be given for a farm to participate in the program if it is found that there exists between the landlord and the tenant any agreement or contract unfairly exacted, or required by the landlord because of the land lord's prior knowledge of coming participation in the program.

Under the above regulation, andlord could not force a tenant to turn over to him payments earned under the program; the tenant' status could not be changed, which would preclude him from receiving payment due him; the size of is acreage could not be reduced; his rent could not be increased; nor could his share of the crop

reduced. The fourth rule says that the County Committee shall withhold ts approval of participation in the program if it finds that any other scheme or device has been adopted which would deprive the tenant of any payment which might otherwise be coming to him as a result of his taking part in the pro-
