

Charges Filed Against Three in Ranger Court

Charges of theft of over \$50 were filed against three youths with Ruby Springer in Precinct No. 2 Justice Court Wednesday, reported Don Butler, Chief of Police and Ralph Veal, Constable of Precinct No. 2.

On the night of February 23, a night watchman at Strawn reported the license number of a car that was involved in a theft of \$100 of tools in Strawn, Ben Bradford, constable at Strawn, checked out the license number of the car and found out that it belonged to Donald Latham, 18, of Woodson. The Strawn man who lost the tools went to Woodson and the boy admitted taking the tools and also named James Loyce Buswell, 17, of Breckenridge and Douglas Brown, 17, of Ranger as accomplices. The man recovered his tools but didn't file charges against the trio.

Wednesday evening, Brown was charged with theft of over \$50 and taken to the Eastland County Jail Thursday morning.

Fruit and Nuts Can Be Good Area Crops

Fruit and nut orchards may be good crops for this area, providing food for home use and a good side income too. But, these are specialty crops, and they won't grow just anywhere.

If you do want to plant trees, take time to find your most suitable soil. Years later you'll be glad you did. Here are a few things to look for.

Fruit Trees can be planted on upland slopes, hilltops or lowlands provided that the soil has a sandy surface, and a subsoil that is somewhat sandy and crumbly (but not loose, coarse sand) to a depth of three feet or more. Avoid soils with dense, heavy clay subsoils.

Deep trees require about the same type of soil as the fruit trees, but it must be deeper. Four to six feet is the minimum depth. In addition, they should be in a low or "receiving" position where they will get benefit from additional runoff water. River and creek bottomlands are best, but nearly level footslope areas where extra soil and water are deposited will also be suitable.

Remember that from 50 to 60 percent of a tree is underground. If your tree is to grow to 75-100 feet in height, it must have plenty of good deep soil for a huge root system. When any tree is planted on unsuitable soil, it will grow and do well only until the roots become restricted. Trees on restricted soil will die or partially die during dry years and won't grow vigorously even during normal years, and a tree won't produce fruit unless it is in a healthy and vigorous growing condition.

So spend some time checking your soil before planting; it will be time well spent. Then if you're not sure about soil or if you plan to plant a large acreage, consult your Soil Conservation Service Work Unit. Trained technicians will assist you in choosing the proper land for your crops.

Ten Most Common Questions Asked On Income Tax Problems Are Listed

Tax questions are not new to the employees of the Internal Revenue Service. The well-trained tax employees who answer the telephone and talk to the taxpayers in person at the IRS offices in North Texas answer more than 100,000 questions every year. Even though the tax folks give the same general answer to thousands of questions, they point out that each taxpayer has an individual problem that requires the application of the law to his particular circumstance.

- 1. Do I have to file a separate return Form 1040-A for each W-2 I received? Answer: No you only file one income tax return. You combine all the income reported on the W-2's given you by the employers for whom you worked during the year.
- 2. I am a housewife! What's this community property business? Why can't I file a separate income tax return I earned myself? Answer: Texas is a community property state. The income that the husband earns, as well as the wife, belongs one-half to each husband and the wife in the community. If the husband and the wife both have income they must either file a joint return including all of the income or split all of the community income and expenses. When they file a separate return, each must include one-half of the income and the expenditure for the community on his or her return.
- 3. I am having trouble taking my medical expense deduction. I am over 65. Can I deduct all of my doctor bills and my drugs and medicine expense? Answer: No. You must subtract 1 percent of your adjusted gross income from the amount paid for medicine and drugs before taking the deduction. However, since you are over 65, you may deduct all of your doctor bills without reducing the total expense by 3 percent of adjusted gross income. You are limited to a maximum deduction. The amount varies, depending upon such factors as number of dependents, whether you file a separate return or not, and whether you are disabled.
- 4. I am having trouble on my dependent deductions. I help support my cousin during the year. Can I claim him as a dependent? Answer: No. You cannot claim your cousin as a dependent unless he lives in your home and does not file a tax return himself and you contribute more than half of his support. You should check your tax instructions on claiming dependents. Check (1) support test, (2) gross income test, (3) head of household test, (4) citizenship test and (5) joint return test. All of these tests are set out in the instructions.
- 5. I go to school. I worked during the summer and earned \$500. (Continued on page 4)

Plans to build a new housing development in Ranger were released today by C. B. Pruet. Pruet announced that work is to start on two houses in the development as soon as the weather clears.

Drugs Available To Wipe Out TB, Expert Declares

Drugs that fight tuberculosis in the individual patient can wipe out the disease in Texas—if every person with active disease is treated adequately with drugs now available.

This statement was made by Zeb Rike, president of the Texas Tuberculosis Association, as he called for an intensified campaign against the disease that yearly kills more than 12,000 Americans. A total of 4,246 new cases of tuberculosis were reported in Texas last year.

President Rike's statement is the first reaction among state TB control authorities to the announcement of national recommendations for a stepped-up campaign against TB throughout the country. The recommendations were made by 18 of the nation's leading experts in public health and tuberculosis control who met recently at Arden House, Harri-man, N. Y. They urged that chemotherapy (drug treatment) be used nationwide as the spearhead for a knockout assault on tuberculosis in the U. S.

"In Texas we have 2600 people in our State TB Hospitals, others in private and Veterans Hospitals, others under private medical care at home, and many, many more who are not under any type of medical care," Rike commented. "You can see the danger in this. The Arden House findings indicate that drugs, used in proper combination over an adequate period of time in the treatment of active TB patients and selected former patients in Texas are going to be the most effective tool for wiping out the disease here."

Rike reported that this new approach—"detect and treat"—calls for bold and decisive action in order to bring all of our TB patients to successful treatment. "In cooperation with the Texas State Department of Health, our TB Association Board of Directors is studying the recommendations to determine how best to apply them in our communities," he concluded.

Houses may be financed through the First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Ranger. Homes in the price range of \$10,000 to \$13,500 can be purchased for a three percent down payment. The closing cost, downpayment and insurance will run from \$450 to \$550, and can be financed for as much as 25 years at five and three-fourth percent interest. Homes above the \$13,500 range will require a larger down payment.

Pruet invites all prospective home owners to come out to the new development and watch the new homes under construction.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

LEGAL ANSWERS REQUIRE RESEARCH

Perhaps you have been in a courtroom and heard an attorney argue forebodingly to the court that such and such a case clearly governs the case at hand. But did you ever wonder about the intricate processes that have been directed toward finding that case which is often referred to as a "controlling precedent?"

The lawyer's training received in law school enables him to recognize and analyze problems. In most law schools he will have studied what is known as the "case method." In the standard three-year course usually following his graduation from a four-year general college education, the law student will read hundreds and sometimes thousands of cases especially selected to illustrate the various phases of the law.

The case method of study enables the lawyer to recognize and classify problems by the relationship of real persons to each other. It also emphasizes that the outcome of each case depends upon the application of principles of law to its own peculiar facts.

When a client seeks legal advice from his lawyer, the lawyer's mind immediately classifies the problem. Sometimes the problem is such that they may be able to give an immediate specific answer. However more often the problem will

It may take hours, and in many instances, days, of research to unravel a knotty legal problem. The process is involved. Cases must be found, analyzed, compared, and checked to determine whether they have been overruled by later decisions, before counsel can stand before the court and say "Your Honor, we believe that our case is controlled by the case of such and such."

On which income taxes were withheld. I have a refund coming but my Dad tells me he is entitled to my exemption and I must claim zero exemptions on my income tax return. Joe took the income tax course at school. He says we can both claim my exemptions. What about it? Answer: Joe is right. Your Dad is entitled to your exemption since you are a school child. The individual filing a tax return always claims his own exemption. There are no zero exemption tax returns. Read your instructions carefully since the double exemption in this case is fully explained there.

ring during 1959. Can I claim a tax deduction? Answer: You cannot deduct your losses of cash or other personal property. You can deduct their theft or embezzlement losses in the year of discovery.

10. Can I claim depreciation on my car which I drive back and forth to work? Answer: No. This is a commuting expense, like bus fare. You can claim depreciation on a car used in your business for that percentage of the car used for business purposes. However, if a business automobile is used to commute to your place of business, the cost must be determined and eliminated from business expenses. Read your instructions carefully on depreciation. If necessary seek professional tax help. The tax folks are always willing to answer your questions but advise a careful reading of the tax instructions. Taxpayers having more complex individual problems can purchase a 144-page booklet called "Your Federal Income Tax" for 40c through any Internal Revenue Service office. Businessmen may also purchase a copy of the "Tax Guide for Small Business", covering business problems, for 40c.

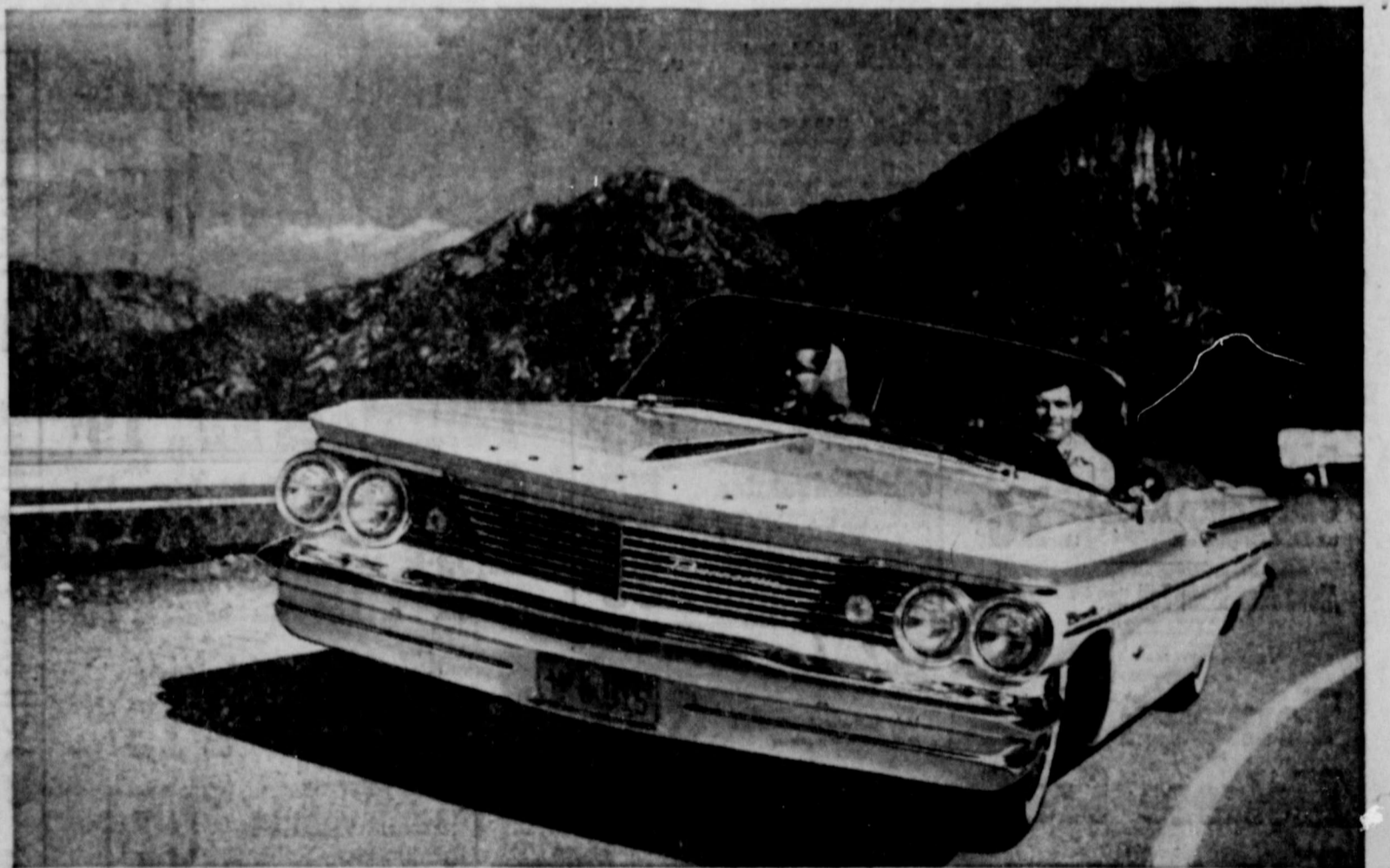

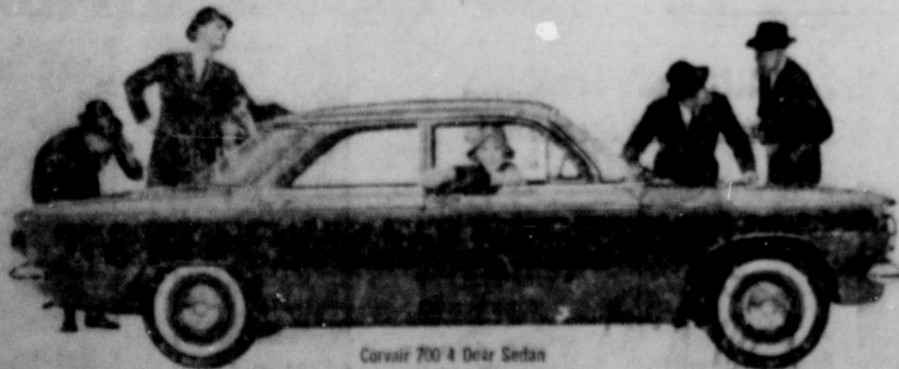

Tagged for Travel

The atomic age has come to dinner, and the dinner story is about some—scientific—circle tours. The tours are the routes taken by the foods we eat as they are changed into energy and body cells. Values of many foods may be more readily studied since the discovery of those scientific laboratory tools—radio active minerals. When the scientists add minute amounts of a radio active element to a food, he dubs the act, "tagging."

From Washington University come reports of how iron "tagged" for travel in various foods is used by the body. "Tagged" iron, also called radioiron, was introduced into iron-rich foods. These then became a part of the carefully controlled diets of a group of 50 healthy young people and also patients with iron deficiency anemia.

The "tagged" iron was added to foods by putting it in poultry

rations, by including it in the water solutions in which some vegetables are grown, and by adding it to flour from which enriched bread is made. When these foods were included in the diet, the scientists were able to study the fate of the iron with equipment similar to that used by uranium prospectors. The radio activity revealed the location of the "tagged" food iron and the amount of radio-activity served as an index of the amount of iron present.

They found that people deficient in this mineral used more of the dietary iron than those who had sufficient stores of iron. It was also learned that iron was absorbed equally well from each of the "tagged" iron-rich foods. The absorption of iron from enriched bread was the same as that from the eggs, poultry or vegetables—natural sources of iron.

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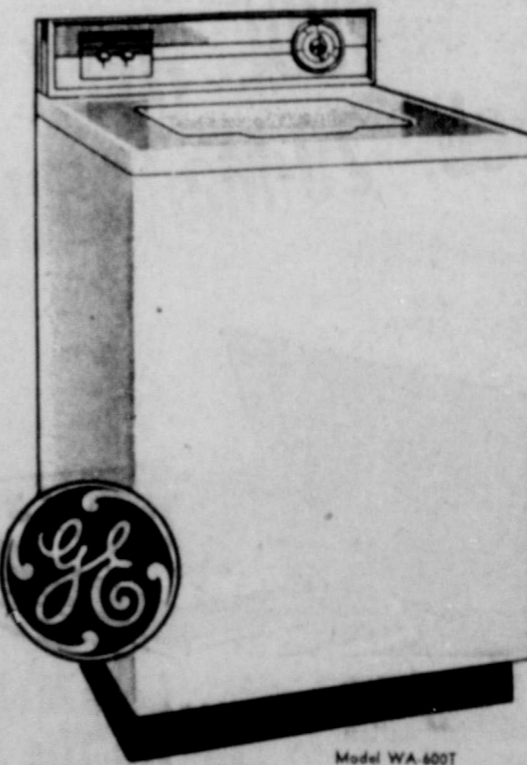
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
