



TRAINS travel at a maximum speed of 45 MPH, or 66 feet per second through the city limits of Ranger. The average time for an automobile to clear the Main Street crossing from a full stop is 5 seconds. A train will travel 330 feet in five seconds. A driver must have an unobstructed view of 370 feet of the main track for a safe crossing. A box car on the center track must be at least 250 feet from the crossing to give this view.

**Omar Burleson Seeks Re-election** To U.S. Congress

Gateway To Famed

Lake Leon

On January 11, 1960 applicatio was formally filed by Congress-man Omar Burleson for his name to appear on the ballot for the Democratic Primary Election on May 7.

"My bid for reelection to the Congress of the United States is, of course, based on my record of service," Burleson states. "I make o claim of perfection. Doubtless, mistakes have been made, as is usually the case in all human endeavors, but two guiding princi-ples have been constantly follow-ed, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest possible degree in my actions in the Con-gress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect my constituency and our Nation.

Burleson was born and raised on a farm between Anson and Stamford in Jones County. He attended rural school, graduated from Anson High School, attended Abilene Christian College, Hardin-Simmons University, and graduated from Cumberland Law School, following which he had postgraduate law at the University of Texas. He married Ruth DeWeese, daughter of Reverend R. D. DeWeese, who pastored Baptist Churches in West

and South Texas. He served as County Attorney and County Judge of his home County of Jones. Later he became a Special Agent for the F.B.I. He served three years in the United States Navy in World War II mostly in the Pacific Ocean Area. After the war he was elected to the 80th Congress and has been reelected to succeeding Congress es. He is now Chairman of the House Administration Committee in the U. S. House of Representa-

Burleson points out that many vital issues have had to be faced in the years he has represented the 17th District in the Congress. "Many more loom before us. With constancy, I have striven to face these problems with the courage and good sense required," he says. "As the record will, definitely







tary environment free of disease organisms; ample heat-enough that the birds are comfortable. a well-balanced all-mast ration; plenty of fresh, clean water; and plenty of fresh air. If the brooder house has been thoroughly cleaned and d'sinfected and the above requirements met, Atkinson said very few d fficulties should be encountered

during the brooding period. The poults should be started on a well-balanced, highly nutritious and highly fort fied all-mash prestarter ration. Atkinson said the pre-starter should be fed for the first 10 days. It should contain 32 percent portein, have a calorie rotein ratio of about 30 to 1, be well fortified with vitamins, min erals and antibiotics and should contain a good coccidiostat.
