Eastland County residents who oppose the proposed beer election in Cisco threw out a warning to wet supporters Monday night that they would run advertisements in every county newspaper revealing the names of all persons who sign a beer petition.

The threat came at a county-wide organizational meeting held in the First Baptist Church in Cisco. Some 500 persons attended the meeting and elected a slate of officers to head the campaign.

"Our main purpose," a spokesman said, "is to head off this election before it can come to a vote."

Charges of murder without malice were filed Monday against Melvin Larry McMinn, 45, of Olden, who is accused of the hit-and-run death of Homer Hopper, 62.

McMinn, who was arrested Saturday and charged with failure to stop and render aid at the scene of an accident, a felony, thus faces even a sterner charge now.

AT COMMISSION MEETING

Railroad and Highway Proposal Is Approved

The City Commission passed motions Monday night to accept the Texas and Pacific Railroad Company's proposal of improvement of the safety of the Main Street crossing and to enter into an agreement with the Texas Highway Department to take over the maintenance of FM Roads 101 and 717.

The improvement of the railroad crossing, when installed by the railroad will include reamping of the present signal system, provide a set distance from the crossing to be kept clear of parked cars on both the passing (center) track and switching (east) track, and installation of additional flasher signals at the crossing.

The clearance provided for in the proposal calls for 150 feet north of the crossing on the switching track on the north. And 150 feet on the switching track south of the crossing and 200 feet on the passing track. A signal will be set up to activate if a car is left parked within this clearance. This will prevent cars from being left in this area.

The plan proposes to move the signal switch north of the crossing within approximately 1575 feet north of the crossing. This will eliminate the unnecessary flashing of the signal when a train is switching on the Ratliff Feed switch. Also if a switch train trips the signal while switching 1 h e signals will automatically go off for two minutes and will not go on again until the train gets to within 300 feet of the crossing, or until a thru train hits the signal block at 1575 feet from the crossing.

Additional flasher signals will be installed at the crossing, one set on the right side of the road when going west, and also a set on the right side when going east.

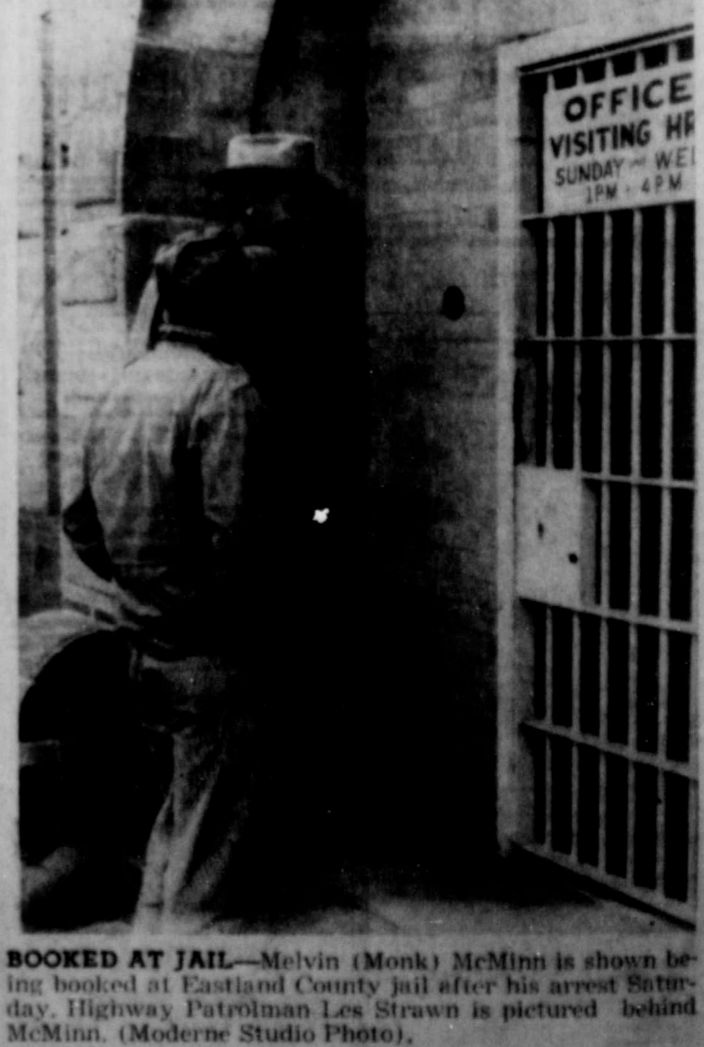

Ciscoans Seek Beer Election

An application for a local option beer election petition was filed this week by a group of Cisco men. Sought is an election to legalize the sale of beer for off-premises consumption in the City of Cisco.

The petition signed by 11 Ciscoans, was accepted by County Clerk Johnson Smith, who issued dated forms Friday morning. Only 10 names were needed for the petition to be issued.

Under state law bearers of the petition must get 25 percent of the number of qualified voters who voted in the governor's race in 1956 to sign the petition before an election can be held. Records show that a total of 1,559 vot-

Census Takers To Attend Training Sessions

Census takers who will visit every dwelling unit in the area during the 1960 Census of Population and Housing which starts April 1 will participate in four training sessions next week. District Supervisor Max V. Mossholder announced today.

The training sessions, to be conducted by the crew leaders, will be held on March 27, 28, 29, and 30. Each census taker will receive a total of approximately nine hours of instruction. Emphasis will be placed on the importance of a systematic, thorough canvass of every dwelling unit during the census to insure a complete count. Class room training will cover proper manner of asking questions, use of the Census questionnaire, Census definitions, and map reading.

Map reading is an important census-taking technique since, without maps, defining the limits of each district to which a census taker is assigned, the job would be a matter of confusion. About 250,000 maps have been prepared for the 1960 Census. This provides an individual map for each of the 250,000 districts into which the country has been divided for the census. Every census taker will be furnished with a map of his district. As they make their rounds, census takers will be required to canvass every street and road and visit every housing unit within the boundaries of their assignments shown on these maps.

Helpful Hints on Easter Egg Dyes, Table Decorating

Coloring eggs at Easter is family fun. Children love it, particularly adding fancy or funny designs, and they should be a part of the activity. Doing Easter Eggs together makes for a fine family tradition to carry on over the years.

All packaged egg dyes on the market are made according to the U. S. Food & Drug Administration's standards. The dyes are certified to be pure and are safe and harmless to use on eggs or in food.

To prevent the shell from cracking in the water, pierce the rounded bottom end (not the pointed end) with a needle or pin. This releases pressure from a small air pocket located at the bottom of the egg which otherwise would crack the shell.

Do not let the eggs be unrefrigerated for too long a time, especially if they are to be used in sandwiches, salads or other dishes after the holiday. For attractive Easter centerpiece, arrange the colored eggs in a low bowl or basket. Encircle these with cute animal figures made of colored hard-boiled eggs as the bodies and cut-out pieces for the heads and stands. Or these can be used as place favors with names written across the eggs.

Coloring and decorating material for the eggs shown is available in PASS Easter Egg Coloring Kits on sale at super markets, grocery, drug and five and ten cent stores everywhere.

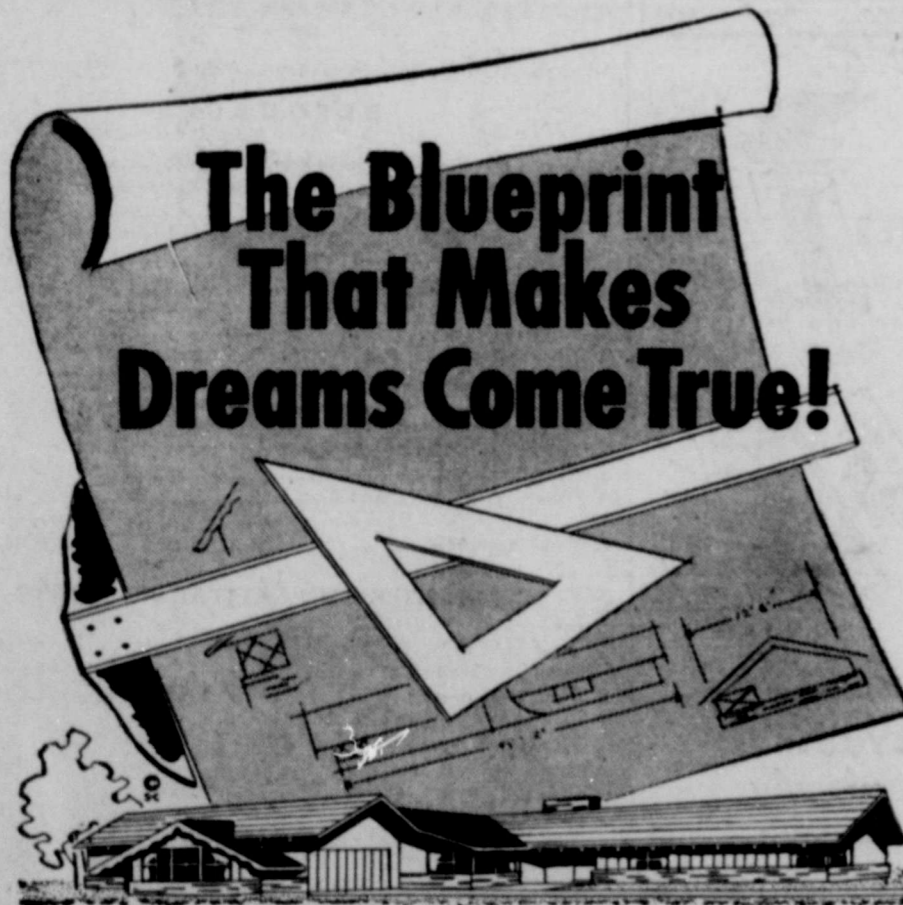
