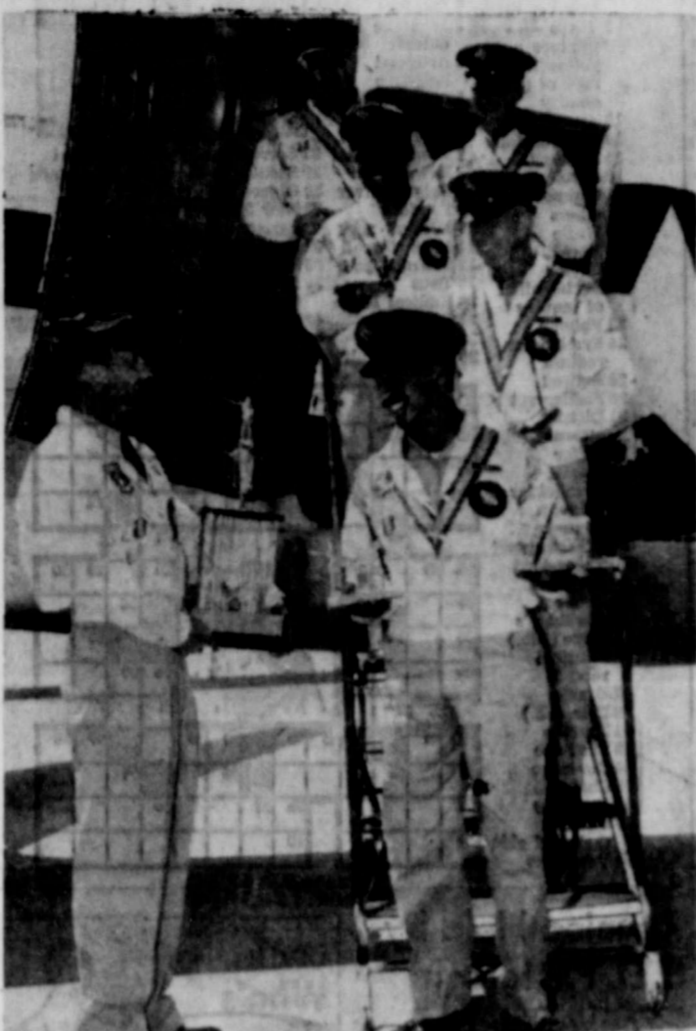
Giants And Yankees Take League Wins

Election Saturday to Decide Five Key Issues

Eastland County voters will return to the polls Saturday and there are several issues they will decide in the second Democratic primary.

There is only one statewide run-off race, but there is also one county race, two precinct run-offs and one district campaign to be settled.

The state race matches incumbent Lloyd Davidson against W. T. McDonald for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals. McDonald led in Eastland County in the first primary, getting 1,544 votes to 1,728 for Davidson, who ran third here. Jim Duzner got 1,888 votes in this county in the first election, and McDonald will probably be favored to lead the ticket again in Eastland County.

The sheriff's race is still drawing key billing here, however. Two good vote getters are matched off in this one. J. B. Williams, seeking re-election, trailed Lee Horn in the first primary. There were four men in the first race and Horn failed to get a majority vote.

The polls will open at 8 and close at 7. Voting will be in Eastland, Ranger, Olden, Gorman, Carbon, Desdemona, Kokomo, Carling Star, Okra, Pioneer, Nimrod, Cize and Scranton.

Paul Brashear and Scott Bailey are seeking the 76th District state representative's post. Brashear is asking re-election, and he led the first primary in all three counties in this race.

Also at issue Saturday will be two of the county's four county commission seats. In Precinct 1 (Eastland, Ranger and Olden), J. B. (Tip) Artner, the incumbent, faces O. R. (Ott) Ervin. Artner got 1,141 votes in the first primary to Ervin's 744. The run-off was forced by the 566 votes polled by E. W. (Bud) Griffin of Olden.

The other commissioner's race matches Mark Clark and L. J. Collins in the Precinct 3 (Carling Star) race. Clark and Collins earned run-off positions in a seven-man race. The winner will take a seat on the court now held by Bob Carter, who ran fourth in the first primary. Clark led the ticket. Collins barely got his name on the ballot, edging Ervin Hull by one vote after a recount of the ballots broke a second place tie.

IRS Announces Examinations for Taxpayer Agents

The Internal Revenue Service announced the second annual examination for special enrollment to practice as a taxpayer's agent before the Internal Revenue Service. This written examination will be held on Sept. 8 and 9, 1960, simultaneously in designated IRS offices throughout the country.

Internal Revenue gave the first special enrollment examination in June of 1959, according to A. E. Fogle Jr., Administrative Officer of the Abilene office. Approximately 2500 applications to take the examination were received throughout the country and of that number 2188 persons were found to be qualified and allowed to take the examination. Of those participating, 1264 or 58 per cent passed the examination.

Fogle explained that the purpose of this examination is to test the technical competency of persons who seek enrollment as agents.

Ford Foundation Praises Central School Ideas

The Ford Foundation has praised the tri-district study being conducted by representatives of Eastland, Ranger and Olden school districts.

Here is a letter received by Dr. James Whittington from Phillip H. Coombs, program director for the Foundation's education division:

It is gratifying that the various school boards take pride in the good work being done by their present high school but, as you pointed out, it is clear that today's children are going to need a far better education than ever before if they are to live effectively in the increasingly complex world that lies ahead. Therefore, the central issue is not whether the existing schools are doing a reasonably good job but what can be done to do an even better job. Superficially, at least, there would appear to be considerable advantage in some form of cooperative effort among these neighboring communities toward getting the best possible educational results out of the financial resources available.

It would appear that a hard-headed appraisal of the alternative possibilities by a cooperative study group, such as the three school boards have agreed to, ought to be an effective step. I am sending along, under separate cover, several recent documents which may possibly prove helpful to the study group and to the several school boards and their administrators as they explore the future possibilities. I assume that you are all familiar with Dr. James Conant's treatment of the question of high school consolidation in his book last year on the American high school.

I wish you well in your efforts to improve educational opportunities for the young people of Eastland County.

Here's the Answer

Bagworm Control Time is Here

Bagworms are, or soon will be, active in all parts of the State. The time to obtain good control of these pests is when they are young, as chemicals applied after the worms are grown, have no control, says James Hawkins, assistant extension entomologist of College Station.

After hatching, the larvae immediately start to feed on the foliage of ornamental plants. The young worms spin a silken bag about themselves and as they feed attach bits of foliage to this bag. The worms carry this bag with them as they move about. When the worms are grown, this bag is one and a half to two inches long and affords the worm almost complete protection.

In September the female worm deposits her eggs in the bag and then dies. The bags should be picked from infested plants and burned because the eggs for next season's worms go through the winter inside the bags.

Hawkins recommends 10 percent toxaphene or 4 percent malathion dust as a control. Lead arsenate, toxaphene or malathion spray can also be used. Remember, the entomologist concludes, these chemicals are effective only if used when the worms are young.

Dairy Cow Walks With Man Through Pages of History
 The story of man is closely related to the story of the dairy cow. A. M. Meekma, extension dairy husbandman, said today in a June Dairy Month tribute to the nation's greatest industry.
 It's a story that goes back to the very beginning of civilization, as far back as recorded history. There is evidence that the ancestors of modern man followed the ancestors of modern cows from pasture to pasture many thousands of years ago.
 In the oldest writings known to man, the Vedic hymns written in Sanskrit on tables of stone, it says that the earliest known form of the cow was a Gopatis or Lord of the Cows. Gopatis was the cow but milking was a sacred rite. One priest stood at the cow's head. Another held her tail. The third priest was of the highest ranking and did the milking.
 Gopatis referred to the moon as the "milk goddess of the night." The stars were defined as 5-horned cattle. As Gopatis watched the cow-studded Heavens another visible proof of the holiness of the cow appeared. Across the sky there flowed a great river of soft whiteness which to this day is called the "Milky Way."
 The great Greek physician Hippocrates prescribed milk as a medicine 500 years before Christ was born.
 Without the dairy cow more than half the colonists who first came to America's shores from England in the years 1608-1610 did not survive. They imported food but their supplies of butter and cheese were entirely inadequate. The first shipment of dairy cattle arrived at Jamestown, Virginia in 1611.
 From that time forward, says Meekma, the health and wealth of America was on the upswing. As man moved westward across the continent, the cow was tied to the tailboards of the covered wagon and her brothers, the oxen, furnished the pulling power.
