Mrs. M. H. Hagaman Dies Thursday, Services Pending

Mrs. M. H. Hagaman, 86, a pioneer resident of Ranger, passed away at her home near Ranger, at 8 a.m. Thursday.

She was born December 14, 1873 in Milan County, and moved to Ranger in 1880 and has lived on the Hagaman Ranch on Tiffin Road for the past 70 years.

The former Emma Whittington, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Whittington, who were charter members of the First Baptist Church of Ranger.

She married M. H. Hagaman June 24, 1890. He preceded her in death September 8, 1949. Mr. Hagaman was the first mayor of Ranger, and was instrumental in making Ranger what it is today.

Mrs. Hagaman was the first president of the 1920 Club and helped with its organization, and served two other times as its president, and was the last charter member of the club.

Survivors include one son, Fred W. Hagaman of Conway; one daughter, Mrs. Edward F. Horrigan of Ranger; one daughter-in-law, Mrs. Leslie H. Hagaman of Ranger; two foster children, C. K. West of Breckenridge and Mrs. Hamilton Meres of Midland; two sisters, Mrs. C. E. Chastain and Mrs. Samuel Butler of Eastland; one step-in-law, Mrs. A. G. Whittington of Houston; six grandchildren, Mrs. W. A. McGrath of Dallas, Mrs. T. R. Doebbler of Austin, John Hagaman of Ranger, Patrick Horrigan of Huntsville, Whit Hagaman of Conway and Kathleen Hagaman of Conway; one great-grand child, five nephews and three nieces.

Funeral services are pending from the First Methodist Church, with the Rev. Evelyn Brown, pastor, to officiate. Interment will be in the Evergreen Cemetery. Arrangements will be by Killingsworth Funeral Home.

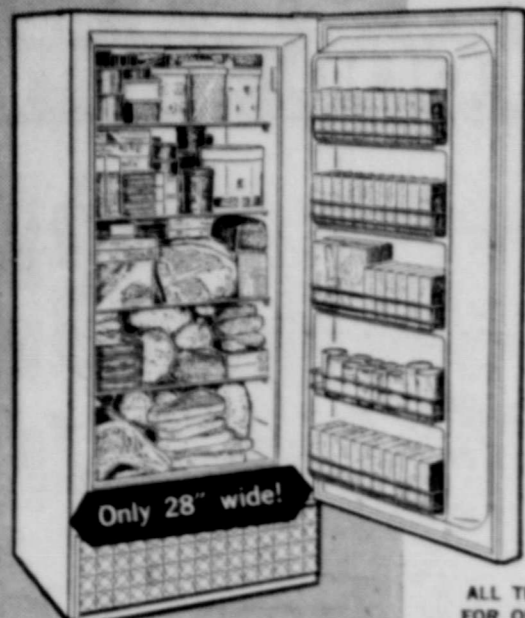

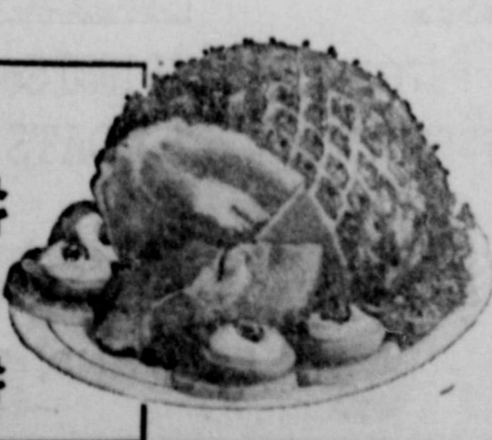

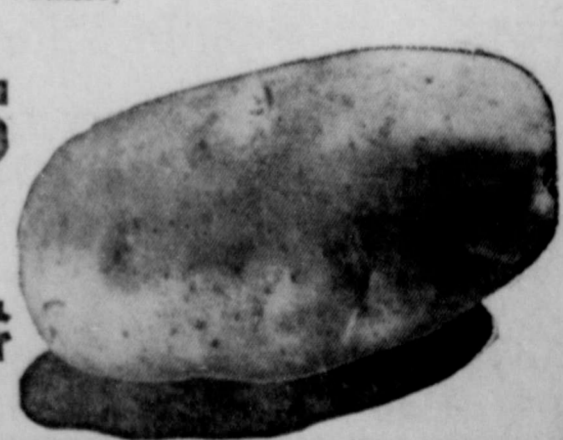

**Rabies Reported in Many Areas Of Texas**  
 Many reports of rabid animals—chiefly foxes and skunks—are coming in from over the State, says Edwin Cooper, extension wildlife specialist of College Station. Since complete eradication of

animals subject to carrying rabies is almost impossible, everyone should be aware of methods which lessen the possibility of contracting the disease, Cooper continues. Contrary to popular belief, rabid animals do not have "running fits" nor "froth at the mouth." A rabid animal is usually characterized by symptoms of paralysis and loss of their usual fear of humans or natural enemies. Therefore,

Cooper says children should be cautioned to avoid any animal which appears to be acting strangely. Foxes, strange dogs and skunks especially should be avoided. Rabies also can be carried by domestic livestock, bats, squirrels and several other mammals. Rabies may occur during any season of the year, Cooper emphasizes. A "dead-end" pet squirrel, for example, may be a dangerous creature to have around, in spite of the

### West Indies Barbecue Sauce

- 4 broiler-fryer chickens, halved or quartered
- 4 tablespoons monosodium glutamate
- 3/4 cup prepared mustard
- 3/4 cup unsulphured molasses
- 1/4 cup lemon juice or vinegar
- 2 tablespoons corn oil
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon Tabasco
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Wash and dry chicken. Sprinkle each chicken with one teaspoon monosodium glutamate. Place chicken, skin side up, on grate set 12 inches or more from heat. Combine mustard and molasses in remaining ingredients. Brush chicken with barbecue sauce. Cook slowly until tender, turning frequently and basting each time. (Total cooking time: 1 hour to 1 hour, 15 minutes.)

Yields 2 to 16 servings, depending on weight of broiler-fryer chickens.

**FOLLOW SIMPLE RULES IN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT**

Vacation time is near. Soon millions of people will be driving about the country, and automobile accidents will occur with increasing frequency. What should a person do when involved in an accident?

At such times it is hard to keep your wits about you and know just what to do. It is therefore a good idea to plan in advance just what you would do in event of a smash-up. Here are a few simple rules that every driver should commit to memory:

1. Stop! Failure to stop can result in serious criminal consequences.
2. Render Aid. If anyone is injured: (1) Render first aid. (2) Stop bleeding. (3) Call a doctor or an ambulance or both. (4) Do not move an injured person in any way that could possibly add to his injury.
3. Protect the Scene from Further Damage. You may be liable for damages to approaching drivers, unless they are properly warned. If the highway is obstructed at night, have someone turn his headlight beams on the wrecked vehicles.
4. Call an Officer. Policemen, Highway Patrolmen, Sheriff's and their deputies are trained accident investigators whose testimony may be invaluable in establishing your civil claim for damages.
5. Gather Information. Write it Down. Don't trust your memory. Don't guess—be specific. Measure skid marks; step off distances. Be sure to obtain names and addresses of witnesses. You are required by law to exhibit your driver's license to the driver—and he must do the same.
6. Be careful What You Say. Even if you feel you probably
