Lakeside Tourney Is Due Record Entry

Golfers Begin Play Friday For Honors

A host of Ranger golfers are making plans to enter the Lakeside Country Club's Invitational tournament this week. The Lakeside Club is Ranger's home club now, due to the Ranger course closing down.

Ranger will enter two of the area's top golfers in the tourney, when Tony Warford and Gary Bradshaw tee off Friday. Bradshaw recently won the Eastland County tourney, and Warford was winner of the County Tourney last year.

A record number of 112 golfers are expected to participate in the Lakeside Country Club's 10th annual invitational golf tournament this weekend. The previous high of 96 golfers was equaled last year, and another flight has been added this year.

Qualifying scores for medalist honors will take place Friday, along with a pro-am tourney. A barbecue is slated for 7 p.m. tomorrow.

Some of the top amateurs in the state are expected to enter the tourney, and two of the top players in this part of the state have already qualified. George Gragg of Breckenridge, winner of the Breckenridge Invitational this year, turned in a 36-37 one-over-par 73 round, and Rodney Brown, also of Breckenridge, qualified with a 37-38-72.

It is not yet known if Jerry Mobley of Abilene, last year's champ, will enter, but the player who carried him three extra holes in the championship finals last year before bowing out, Eugene Byrd, has indicated he will be back. It took a birdie two on the 21st hole for Mobley to beat Byrd last year.

A number of college golfers, including stars from North Texas, Tardin-Simmons, Abilene Christian College and McMurry have announced intentions to have a go at the 3,145-yard Lakeside course.

The Eastland course, despite the need of a good night rain, has drawn praise this year for its good condition and the tourney, with \$1,500 in prizes, always gets more than its share of the L.P. golfers.

W. Q. Verner is this year's tournament chairman. Neil Day will be in his familiar position as starter and George Parrack heads the pairing committee. Elton Ables is prize chairman and O. H. Dick is par course chairman.

Full sets of iron will be given to the winners in each flight and runner-ups will get a set of four matched woods. Consolation winners will receive golf bags and the medalist will get an engraved wrist watch.

Winner of this tournament will join the ranks of some of the state's top players. Other previous winners besides Mobley last year include the late Butch Norrell of Cleburne, 1958; Bill Carson of Abilene, 1957; Darrell Tully of Corpus Christi, 1956; Ray Ferguson of Breckenridge, 1955; Lee Chapman of Fort Worth, 1954; the late Marion Hickey, former North Texas State College great, 1953; Jimmy Phillips, 1952; and Joe Ed Black of Abilene, 1951. No player has ever won the tourney twice. Ray Ferguson, now a pro, came closest when he gained the finals against Butch Norrell in 1958. Norrell played one of the finest games ever seen at the Lakeside course to defeat him.

Tully, the 1954 champion, holds the course record for 18 holes. He shot a 28 in 1955 and no one has come close to it since except John Lively, former pro at the course, who carded a 30.

All competition will be matched play. First round matches will be held Saturday morning. Second round play will be held Saturday afternoon and Sunday will see the semi-finals that morning and the final that afternoon.

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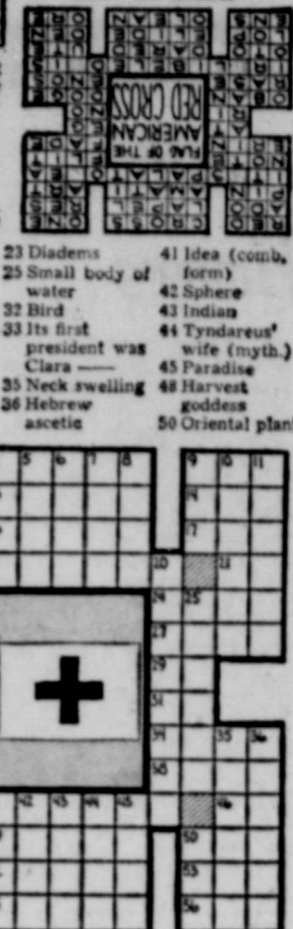
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WEEKLY CROSSWORD PUZZLE

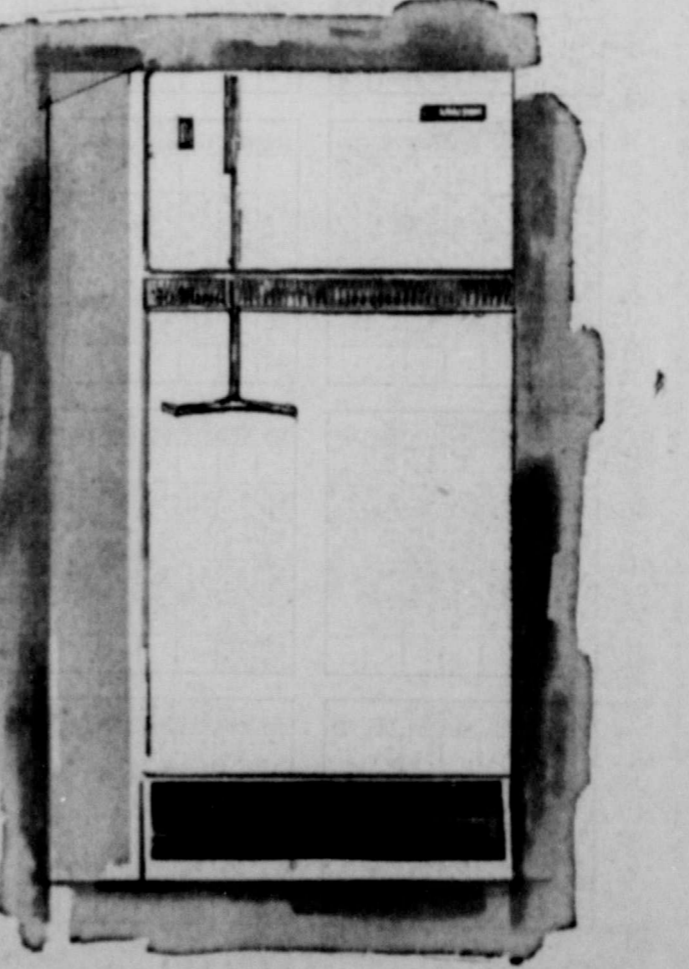

Marked Decline in Rabies Noted in Texas

Both wildlife and domestic animal rabies showed slight declines in May, according to Texas State Health Department animal disease figures.

State Health Department veterinarians attribute the decline to a seasonal drop and the effects of local rabies control programs now active in several Texas areas.

Forty examined heads proved positive during May compared to 48 positive heads examined in March and 48 in April.

The number of heads submitted for examination is also declining. In May 409 heads were prepared for examination—a decrease from 411 heads prepared in March.

Whole heads are sent to the State Health Department laboratory in Austin where the brains are carefully prepared for microscopic examination for presence of "Negri bodies," indicating rabies infection.

A breakdown of positive animal heads examined for May shows 10 dogs and three cats. Also there were nine foxes, 15 skunks and three bats.

Statistics show that domestic pet rabies is running only one-third as high as the five-year median while bovine rabies is just half as much as the five-year median figure.

At the same time wildlife rabies is running ahead of the usual incidence level.

The high rate of wildlife rabies makes control measures among domestic animals more important than ever, public authorities say. They warn against possible outbreak at any time or place.

An unprotected domestic animal population—especially—could mean exposure to humans during an unexpected outbreak before emergency controls could be enacted.

Heads submitted for examination to the State Health Department laboratory include almost every species of wildlife—rabbits, rats, squirrels, flying squirrels, mice, raccoons, gophers, and hammers.

Laboratory technicians ask that heads sent for examination be packed in ice, but separated from ice in a smaller container.

Whole heads should be submitted instead of just brains to avoid accidental infection during removing of the brain by untrained persons.
